Saturday October 9th was the day we officially dedicated the gift of the heron sculpture Tribute" to the Museum. The day was blustery enough to make the beak decoration revolve, and the rain came mainly just after the dedication. About 60 attended, and enjoyed snacks and fresh-pressed cider. Afterward, artist Todd Spalti spoke on how he managed to get the huge cedar log from southwest Washington to Orcas, and the process of carving it into the beautiful sculpture now enjoyed by many. He also invited local artists to submit their own ideas for the removable beak decoration, which is now occupied by a piece made by Todd. Board President Bill Buchan thanked the many volunteers who helped with the foundation and landscaping, especially local businesses Sea Island Sand & Gravel for donated concrete, Dave Hall's boomtruck for hauling and placement, and Michael Budnick of Northwest Concepts for cutting the brickwork to make an attractive border for the sculpture base. Above all, our thanks to the anonymous project sponsor who funded Todd's work to make this magnificent addition to the Museum possible.



From the President...

First I must start with the unhappy news that our Treasurer, Lois Cornell, has had to resign from the Board for a time due to health reasons. She has done a fantastic job keeping our finances on track, and got next year's Budget prepared and approved by the Board before starting her medical treatment. We wish her a recovery as speedy and complete as possible, and look forward to her rejoining the Board as soon as she is able.

I am pleased to report the addition of George Garrels to our Board. George has been active with the Library, Orcas Center, Camp Orkila and Kiwanis, and you may know of him for the beautiful children's toys he makes. Welcome, George!

A few more words on the 2011 Operations Budget, which does not consider funds solicited and dedicated to specific projects, such as cabin restoration, the Bison project and, this past year, Journey Stories. We anticipate spending (budgeted for) over \$89k in 2011, very close to the same as will end up being spent in 2010. Major Operations expenses are salaries for Irene and Kay, utilities, insurance, supplies (including exhibits), building maintenance, newsletters, information technology, loan repay-

ment, and bookkeeping. In 2010, we raised just over \$90k, but \$18k of this came from two timely but one -time cash bequests. For 2011, we are budgeting income of over \$76k, for a shortfall of \$13k. We do anticipate receiving at least \$80k from pending building sales as the remainder of the aforementioned bequests, so we are not in financial trouble. But we want to be able to apply as much of that as possible to paying down the final \$98k of our capital improvement loan. Bottom line: We need to be as successful as possible in fund-raising, both through Museum-sponsored fundraising events, and also through donations from the community and members. If we are successful, we can anticipate the day when the Museum is debt-free, and can move on to other longer-term goals such as hiring a director and/or curator.

I will close by once again thanking our wonderful group of volunteers who are the face of the Museum to visitors. This past summer's Journey Stories exhibit, to which so many of you contributed time as docents and in other ways, really elevated the Museum in the eyes of the community. Thank you all.

The 2010 Journey Stories Historic Boats Quilt



Many visitors to the Museum who have seen this quilt have commented that it should be included in the Museum's archives! Hand-embroidered by island craftswomen in commemoration of this year's Journey Stories exhibit, it features twelve panels of boats that have been significant to the history of Orcas Island. Bison Antiquus may come out of hiding in 2011



There is movement afoot to get our Bison Antiquus skull (now carbon dated to approximately 13,600 years

old) reproduced and on display. After one disappointment with an expert who agreed to make a casting, who then had to withdraw his offer, we are making arrangements with a well-reviewed company in California to have a casting made. This will allow the Museum the choice of displaying the original and using the casting for educational purposes, or to just display the casting. We are currently looking into the possibility of creat-

ing a suitable display environment for the original bones. We will likely have some of the other bones cast also, those which some paleontologists say show evidence that our bison was slaughtered by humans. This is the point which has caused such a stir in the scientific world because it calls into question the current theories on when humans inhabited this area. After visiting the Burke Museum earlier this year, we can attest to the fact that our bison skull is an excellent intact specimen and is, in our opinion at least, better than any the Burke possesses.

Did You Know ... ?

The year 2011 will be the 60th anniversary of the founding of the Orcas Island Historical <u>Society</u> which was conceived of in 1951. The Museum itself was founded five years later in 1956, when Miles Bobst made the largest single gift offer up to that point: a complete pioneer cabin, the original home of the John Boede family which had been built in 1885. In years to come five more historic cabins would be dismantled and reassembled at the Museum's location in Eastsound, with all the work done by volunteers. But 1951 was when the ball started rolling.
