STILL LOOKING FOR SOMETHING TO DO TO HELP OTHERS?

Many of you who attended the membership meeting when Gail Marlow of Motor City Mitten Mission (www.motorcitymittenmission.org) was our speaker. She described their Plarning Project to make mats and pillows for the homeless. This is not an official Soroptimist project; however members have been happily involved during this downtime when we volunteers miss volunteering.

You can even watch TV, listen to an audio book or music while doing it!

The first step in Plarning is to collect plastic bags from the grocery store. Those are always needed and can be delivered to the porch of SIGP member Maddy Colavito at 926 Nottingham, Grosse Pointe Park. PLEASE CALL HER FIRST (509-551-1695) SO SHE CAN RESCUE THEM BEFORE THE WIND PLAYS HAVOC WITH THEM.

The second step is to cut the bags into strips and make them into balls. It takes 30 balls to make one mat. The only supplies needed for each Plarn ball are 20 plastic store bags and a pair of sharp scissors. (If your bags are 2 weeks old or have been wiped clean, it is unlikely they still harbor the virus.) It doesn't matter if you have different color bags. And, if you don't quite have 20 bags, you can just add onto your Plarn chain as more bags become available to you.

Completed balls can be delivered to the porch of Diana Langlois, 561 Hollywood, Grosse Pointe Woods. PLEASE CALL HER FIRST (313-690-1515) SO SHE CAN RESCUE THEM BEFORE THE WIND ROLLS THEM AROUND HER NEIGHBORHOOD.

If you go to the MCMM website (noted above), you will find Gail's tutorial on how to make the Plarn chain that becomes the Plarn ball.

MYRA GOLDEN'S WORK CONTINUES AT SOROPTIMIST INTERNATIONAL OF NORWICH, ENGLAND

The work of SIGP member Myra Golden, who passed away in May, continues to ripple—this time all the way across the ocean to Norwich, England! When Myra's friend, Frances Moss, moved to England, Frances joined the Soroptimist International of Norwich club near London. Myra kept in touch with Frances and the projects in her new club. Myra, who collected "Dimes for Dreams," suggested we donate the \$152 to SI of Norwich's project called Freedom Charity.

SI of Norwich was founded in 1952, in Norwich, England. Like our club, they are now conducting their meetings via ZOOM. There are many similarities between our clubs.



SI of Norwich has many "Programs of Service." They support:

- Opening Door, a self-help group for people with learning difficulties.
- 4Women is a resource center for women released from prison, or who are on probation.
- EACH stands for East Anglia Children Hospices.
- They work at Leeway Women's Refuge and provide prizes for local primary school children for attendance.
- They also pick up litter on local walk and bike paths and
- They donate toiletries and food to Food Banks, a local organization.

Besides Opening Doors, they donate to Blood Bikers, Norwich YMCA, and the UN Association in Norwich. Their international projects include Education in Hillcrest, South Africa, and Empowering Girls in Nepal, Hamara Sahaas in Jodphur, India, and Kori in Sierre Leone.

A few years ago, they inducted a new member, Sarita Prem, into their club. Sarita is the mother of Aneeta Prem, the founder of Freedom Charity. Aneeta founded Freedom Charity in 2010 in London to raise awareness of forced marriage and dishonor-based violence in the United Kingdom (UK).

Aneeta was born in London to Indian parents and became a magistrate. In her magistrate job she served in adult, youth, and family law courts in London. She discovered many young girls were spending their summer vacations in either Africa or India. Some would return victims of female genitalia mutilation (FGM) or arranged child marriages.

Aneeta became instrumental in making forced marriage a crime in the UK. She wrote two books for children 9 years and older. *But It's Not Fair* is a fun, easy read about forced marriage showing a window into different cultures. It offers courses of action to help victims. *Cut Flowers* is an informative, witty book about FGM. It illustrates the danger and ways to prevent it.

In addition to these two books, Aneeta has developed an accredited professional training program for teachers, police, judiciary, NHS, and social services. It provides guidance on how to spot signs of violent and dishonor-based crimes, how to support and protect young people at risk, and how to educate and support young people about forced marriages, FGM, and dishonor-based violence.

SIGP is now another proud supporter of Freedom Charity per Myra's dedicated involvement In helping women and girls.

We will reopen school on the 22nd June 2020

We wish you God's blessings and protection throughout this pandemic period.

What is the Laurel Society?

It was established in 1994 by Soroptimist International of the Americas (SIA) to honor individuals who contribute \$1,000 or more or make SIA their charity of choice. Since inception, nearly 7,000 Laurel Society members have given more than \$12 million to help economically empower women and girls though our Dream Programs.

How is the money used?

For nearly 100 years, Soroptimist has been improving the lives of women and girls in local communities and throughout the world. Because of the unique membership structure of Soroptimist, while dues pay for member services, governance, and administration, your charitable contributions are used for fundraising and programs.

How can you become a member of The Laurel Society?
