

42. Further Description of Important Features (Continue on reverse if necessary) This simple, front-gabled house has a central ridge, brick chimney and shallow, overhanging eaves. It has a 3-bay front elevation with the entrance located in the east bay. On the eastern eave wall is a recessed side entrance covered by a continuous roof projection. The doorway is set within a further recessed stoop, supported by a single turned column on the outside corner. Both front and side entrances contain glazed doors.					
43. History and Significance This small resident/winery is part of an enclave on the island's west side of large holdings of former vineyards. The vineyards of Otto Dodge (ERI-1735), and the Schaedler-Rhein Winery (ERI-1703) were immediately adjacent, with those of J. Titus, Dan Maag (ERI-1543), Otto Brown and F. Hauser of Sweet Valley-Monarch Wine Co. (ERI-1618), and C. Fisher Winery (ERI-1617)					
44. Description of Environment and Outbuildings Located on a slight, artificial rise, the house is surrounded on the east and west by apple trees. Open fields, some fallow, some overgrown lie to the south and east. Access is provided to the west bay road by a small unimproved

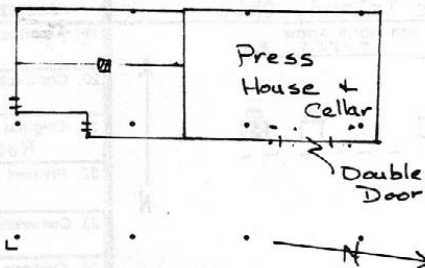

A press house is attached as a single-story rear wing. The press house is slightly longer than the residential portion of the building and is built over a $\frac{1}{4}$ basement. Utility access is gained through double doors placed in the eastern eave wall. The building retains its original 6/6 windows (including a single 4/4 window) and plain trim elements that consist of frieze, end, and water table boards.

extending to the east and south. An historic photograph shows vineyards extending as far as the camera could show. Most of the owners of these lands were closely related, either by family ties or business associations. Frederick, born in Hessen, Germany, in 1831, and his wife, Sophia Dodge, born in Hanover, Germany in 1839, were married and came to the United States the same year (c.1856). They probably came with Sophia's brother, Otto, as records show they both came to the island between 1860 and 1870, settling on the west side and building identical houses side by side, and setting out vineyards. C. 1870 Frederick built a small winery and press house onto the rear of his home, and by 1872 his cellar had a capacity of 2,500 gal. In 1887 he merged the products of his vineyards with those of R.R. Moysey, Henry Trieschman, A. Miller, and Otto Brown to form the Sweet Valley Wine Co. (ERI-1618). After the death of her husband, Sophie and her nephew, Otto Jr., continued to operate the winery. Later, probably at the onset of Prohibition, Otto converted it to rental property. Ownership of the property remains in the hands of descendants.

44. (Cont'd.) lane to the south. A large barn with board and batten siding lies to the N of the house; the chimney and foundations of an old house (possibly of log) is on the W, with a corn crib to the east. A privy sits to the northeast corner of the house.
