## Dorval Olympic Competitor Returns From Rome

A relatively new resident in Dorval, tall 6'2" sandy-haired, 26 year old athlete Don Stringer has recently returned from Rome where he represented Canada in the Olympic Games paddling events. He brought back to his home on Malcolm Circle in Dorval first hand impressions of the Olympic Competitions.

Picked at the Olympic Trials in Ottawa last June, he was one of the six paddlers who represented Canada, and the only one to qualify in Rome for the finals. In the finals of the 1000 Metres Single Paddling events Don ranked seventh.

Mr. Stringer, commenting on the showing of Canadian athletes in the trials, said that he was able to see 4 days of track, 3 nights of swimming, all of the rowing and the water polo and soccer games. "Canadian athletes are good for 'half a race', and show potential and keen competitive spirit, but they haven't the stamina which comes with full time training and government and industry supported athletes." Canadian are obliged to hold full time jobs and have no opportunity to put themselves in first class condition.


Don with three other friends trained during the winter with



weight lifting in a basement room to increase heart and wind efficiency. He pointed out that Russian paddlers had been on the lake in Rome for three months ahead of time, in strict training. He also commented that Canada is far from the manufacturing centres of paddling supplies and behind in their knowledge of latest equipment.

In Paddling Don has a long list of championship achievements behind him, starting with the Canadian 1950 Juvenile Singles (16 years and under), the 1951 Junior Singles, 1952-1953-1954-1955 Senior Singles in the 10,000 metres. He also took the North American Singles, 1000 Metres, in the years 1953 to 1957. He competed in the Olympics in Melbourne Australia in 1956.

Don is a graduate in Science from Bishop's University where as hockey, basketball, and football players he took awards for best all around athlete. Employed by Northern Electric, he has lived in Dorval since Easter. The Stringers have one small boy--whom neighbours refer to as "little paddler". They seem happy to be settled in Dorval and mentioned especially the kindness of neighbours during Don's absence in Rome. This community which showed such enthusiasm for visiting Olympic swimming champions will be following future success of this athlete and will welcome his example and leadership in sports in Dorval.

## Quebec Province To Act On Lake Pollution

Mr. A. Gouturier M. D., Quebec Minister of Health announced today that combating the pollution of Quebec Waters was at the top of his departments list of projects, along with Hospitalization Insurance. The announcement was contained in the telegram to the Dorval Chamber of Commerce replying to that sent to the Premier last week. The Minister also stated that he hoped to announce in the not to distant future a "Satisfactory solution for everyone with appropriate legislation."

Dr. C. A. Kirkland M. I. A. for Jacques Cartier when asked to comment confirmed his own and the government's concern about water pollution and the governments intention to bring down legislation for its elimination.

Ross Smyth, Chairman of the Water Pollution Committee discussing the telegram said that he and his committee were most encouraged by the reflections of the governments interests in the problem. "We believe provincial legislature to be the answer in combating the increased pollution of our waters by the municipalities bounding them and it appears that this will be forthcoming", he said. He added, "that the Dorval Chamber of Commerce would submit a brief containing its suggestions as to what the new legislation should contain. Meanwhile, we are continuing our campaign to acquaint the public with the problem and its possible remedies", stated Mr. Smyth, "and to foster cooperation between municipal, provincial and federal authorities".

## International Work Impressive

No country is too small, no need too great that the Junior Red Cross cannot help.

This week we recognize the million and a half young Canadians who through their untiring efforts, their enthusiasm and their desire to help even the most out-of-the-way areas, are held up as a symbol of man's inherent decency to man.

The Red Cross, since its inception 101 years ago as a dream in the mind of the Swiss Henri Dunant, has strived to be an aid when disaster and calamity strikes.

Just as the parent Society lends its help through medical aid, relief, technical assistance, clothing and self-help, so do the children through the Junior Red Cross help young people like themselves.

Last year Junior Red Cross members, through their fund for International Help and Understanding, contributed assistance valued at \$67,917 to the children of 25 countries.

In terms of cold cash, this is impressive. In terms of where it was used and what it is doing, it is doubly so.

Part of the money is being used for body-building milk for Algerian refugee children in Tunisia and Morocco. Homeless waifs flooded out in the Argentine were supplied with clothing and in the Sudan cotton cloth and ready-made clothing were sent for flood victims.

When typhoons took their toll in Japan and Korea, Juniors sent educational and recreational equipment and knitting yarn for relief work, as clothing they made themselves.

When earthquakes struck in Chile, 3,500 health kits and 510,000 worth of children's new clothing were sent by free air lift, on behalf of Canadian young people, within one week of the disaster.

Children in Morocco, paralyzed by consuming adulterated cooking oil, are getting treatment from Canadian physiotherapists provided by the Canadian Junior Red Cross.

To Gaza, to Ghana, to Greece, to Korea and to Haiti have gone socks, scarves, clothing, health kits, baby clothes and school supplies. More than 12,000 items, all contributed by Canadian children and valued at \$14,000, were sent to needy children abroad in 1959.

These are but a few of the distressed areas to which the Junior Red Cross swiftly, send its help and understanding during the past year.

Their work should not go unheeded any more than will their efforts, cease on behalf of children around the world.



Refugees of many lands are grateful to the volunteer workers of the Canadian Red Cross for the clothes they wear. Materials and patterns are chosen to suit the needs of the country where the clothing will be used. Cool cotton garments are sent to tropical countries while warm flannelette pyjamas and nightgowns are earmarked for cold weather regions.

Last year, volunteers of the Women's Work committee of the Montreal Branch completed 9,402 sewn garments and 3,480 knitted articles.

THIS HAS BEEN a bad deadline day. In the first place it was most discouraging to return from the Blood Clinic without the nice red button they give out to donors, and carrying a sample of pills recommended for tired blood, a nice polite rejection slip. And I am having another one of those "mad" days regarding cereal manufacturers. These days come to my mother who lifts up a big box of cereal which has been delivered by the store and should be put in the cupboard, the only hitch being that, between the two operations, come the small children in search of junky prizes who neatly slit the bottom of the boxes. (They know that the prizes go to the bottom!) I don't want my cereal on the floor; I want it in the box — and without flags, plastic cowboys or treasure maps.

WHAT IS IN A NAME? Behind the naming of Dural Products there is a remarkable little story. Mr. D. Debnar, new in Canada, with little money but eager to start a business in his own line (glue) had been told that in this country product names were popular. He found, left behind by a man who had started a chrome handle manufacturing business in that basement apartment where he mixed up first samples, some stationery bearing the letter-head Silver Dural. He laughs now as he remembers giving the instructions to his family. "Paper we need, Dural we can use, so with a black pencil you are crossing out 'Silver'." And that is how a name was found for the company which has accomplished outstanding expansion in Dorval in ten years. The astute frugality of a man who has never missed his opportunities was showing in these earliest years .... Seen at the Dural opening ceremonies — she is employee number one, Mrs. F. Ganley, mother of ten, and hardworking community worker. She had some memories of the Dural Plant going back to the time when Mr. Debnar used to use their phone, the only one on Marshall Avenue. She said that Mr. Debnar has never lost interest in the family which formed one of his first contacts in Dorval .... An old European custom was carried out in the presentation which was made to Mr. Pratt at the opening ceremonies at Dural; he received as a gift from Mr. Debnar the ribbon cutting scissors, a beautifully crafted sterling silver pair by Birks.

SERVICE FAULT NOTICES with big red-letter complaints were arriving frequently at one Dorval home last week. Customers and Gazette Office did not know that the paper boy was sick and his father doing the rounds. There is now one Dorval father who has changed his mind about the strict rules which he thought Gazette paper boys should follow. It is so easy at six in the morning to walk across the lawns, deliver the paper with a slight toss, and to swipe apples from trees. It is embarrassing to be greeted at the door by a business associate who informs you that he is used to having his paper by twenty to seven, but pleasant to stop for coffee with an early rising acquaintance. (That is the morning you did not get your paper until after seven, Mr. Balenok). And perhaps, now that the boy in the family has recovered, one should not consider giving up the paper route after all!



aim to start a business but in 1948 when the Communists took over and nationalized the country, including his factory in Bratislava, he decided to come to Canada.



The decision was made and the land purchased, a lot 45' by 90' for \$60. (Mr. Debnar ruefully admitted that four lots for extension in the same area were purchased recently for \$15,000!) The first building was a 400 sq. ft. shed "built with my own hands."

The amazing growth of the company since that time, during which the building has been enlarged nine times, and the number of products has increased from one to 150, has included a number of other successes for Mr. Debnar. He is pleased that he has pioneered as a Canadian Co. expanding through a subsidiary in the United States. He is also enthusiastic regarding his success in the export field because he knows that Canada will benefit from this type of growth.

Mr. Debnar whose company has carried out most extensive experiments in the manufacture of allied adhesive products has great faith in chemical products which can be controlled to achieve greatest efficiency. He is a man whose sincerity is evident when he speaks of his pride in good products carrying a Canadian trademark here and in other countries. He rises at six in the morning and works long hours at the plant, often taking work to his home.
