### Airline Passenger Numbers Climb as More Tucsonans Use Home Airport

Airline passengers using Tucson International Airport (TUS) have increased by 4.9% to more than 2.1 million so far in 2018.

Continuing what is now a 25 month streak, July passenger numbers totaled 274,373, an increase of 5.6% over July 2017.

Helping to spur on this year's growth has been new airline flights this summer to Austin, Charlotte and San Jose.

Through July, TUS has served 2,126,374 passengers, up from 2,026,566 a year ago. The year is on pace to be the busiest at the airport in six years.

#### American Airlines adds new routes

American Airlines Cargo posted a 9.7% increase in volume between the second quarters of 2017 and 2018, and a 19.4% increase in cargo revenue.
