→ From the Pastor →

¹ In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. ² He was with God in the beginning. ³ Through him all things were made; without him nothing was made that has been made. ⁴ In him was life, and that life was the light of all mankind. ⁵ The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness has not overcome it.

John 1:1-5

This is a dark time of year. Although we know we are gaining a little bit of light each day, it still feels dark. When we have to turn on the lights at 5 p.m. and look at the long, dark



evening ahead of us, it can get depressing! This disorder, where we are severely suffering from the early onset of darkness, is known as seasonal affective disorder. • Annual Meeting: The church will have it's annual meeting on Sunday, January 28th, after the worship service. We will review the events and activities of 2023, elect a council moderator, select committee members and prepare for church operations for 2024. All members and friends of the church are welcome to attend.



- Free Friday Suppers Resume: The church will host a free dinner on the last Friday of the month January through April. For this period, the dates are Friday, January 26th and Friday, February 23th. We will be serving from 5 6:30 p.m. The meal is free and open to all in the community, so come and enjoy some good food and fellowship. If you wish to sponsor a meal, or help with preparation or serving, please add your name to the sign up sheet in Fellowship Hall or contact a church member to offer your assistance.
- Ash Wednesday: Lent begins on Wednesday, February 14th. The church will hold an Ash Wednesday service at 6:45 p.m. All are welcome.
- Lenten Bible Study: Pastor Sue leads a Bible study for Lent covering the Gospel of Mark. The group will meet after the worship service beginning February 18th and meet February 25th, March 10th, March 17th and March 24th. Each session will be about an hour. There is no sign-up list for the Bible study, please feel free to just come after the service. Pastor Sue hopes to see you there and looks forward to joining in the study and discussion.
- News From the Trustees: The trustees are updating security at the church and are installing doorbells at the two main entrances. In addition, for our safety, the door leading to the Route 5 & 20 parking lot has been upgraded to have a safety exit. These improvements will aid in the security and safety of our members and friends.
- Women's and Men's Breakfast Dates and Times: Both the women's and men's breakfast gatherings are permanently changed to Mondays at 9:00 a.m. The women will meet on the first Monday while the men will meet on the last Monday. Both groups will meet at Brady J's restaurant here in Bloomfield (at 24 Maple Avenue). Please note these gatherings are not just for members of the church; all are invited.
- Christian Education Fundraising: Christian Ed chose to have our major fund raiser be for something local. We chose, for 2023, to help the children from our school district and did so. With the aid of the Bloomfield Elementary School social worker, we decided to provide funds for snacks for the children without the means to bring their own to school. These are the children that receive back pack foods on Fridays to help them get through the weekends. We had an outstanding response from the congregation and were able to provide the program with over \$1000, which was so very appreciated. Our heartfelt thanks go out to the congregation who donated so generously.
- Annual Stewardship Campaign: The campaign ended successfully (with two new pledgers joining the congregation) and the trustees planned our church budget for 2024. Our thanks to all the people who pledged to support the church and its mission for the year 2024. Blessings to all.

the church is not a requirement. Due to the holidays, the women will meet only on **Monday**, **February 5th.**






Amazon synopsis:

In 1954, sixty-three-year-old Maine farmer Annie Wilkins embarked on an impossible journey. She had no money and no family, she had just lost her farm, and her doctor had given her only two years to live. But Annie wanted to see the Pacific Ocean before she died. She ignored her doctor's advice to move into the county charity home. Instead, she bought a cast-off brown gelding named Tarzan, donned men's dungarees, and headed south in mid-November, hoping to beat the snow. Annie had little idea what to expect beyond her rural crossroads; she didn't even have a map. But she did have her ex-racehorse, her faithful mutt, and her own unfailing belief that Americans would treat a stranger with kindness.

Annie, Tarzan, and her dog, Depeche Toi, rode straight into a world transformed by the rapid construction of modern highways. Between 1954 and 1956, the three travelers pushed through blizzards, forded rivers, climbed mountains, and clung to the narrow shoulder as cars whipped by them at terrifying speeds. Annie rode more than four thousand miles, through America's big cities and small towns. Along the way, she met ordinary people and celebrities—from Andrew Wyeth (who sketched Tarzan) to Art Linkletter and Groucho Marx. She received many offers—a permanent home at a riding stable in New Jersey, a job at a gas station in rural Kentucky, even a marriage proposal from a Wyoming rancher. In a decade when car ownership nearly tripled, when television's influence was expanding fast, when homeowners began locking their doors, Annie and her four-footed companions inspired an outpouring of neighborliness in a rapidly changing world.


price of her art skyrockets, and she, the silent patient, is hidden away from the tabloids and spotlight at the Grove, a secure forensic unit in North London.
