Christ is risen!



Sharing God's Bounty

Keeping Our Eyes on the Prize

If a runner in a race takes his eyes off his goal for even a fleeting moment, he risks losing his focus and, along with that, the race. So it is with the Christian who must be diligent to keep his focus on his stewardship. If he takes his eyes off his heavenly goal and directs them toward his possessions, his worldly aspirations, or his temporal difficulties, he loses his focus and risks losing the race. The words of Paul provide encouragement for us: *"Forgetting what is behind and straining toward what is ahead, I press on toward the goal to win the prize for which God has called me heavenward in Christ Jesus"* (Philippians 3:13). Focusing on our Earthly circumstances can lead us in two directions ... both of them deadly! We may either find things of the world to be so attractive, they become the prize toward which we strain, or we find things to be so dismal that we despair.

Our Chief Steward, Jesus, our Savior, focused on the prize. We are exhorted to follow his example: *"Let us fix our eyes on Jesus, the author and perfecter of our faith, who for the joy set before him endured the cross, scorning its shame, and sat down at the right hand of the throne of God"* (Hebrews 12:2). Talk about keeping focus! *"Consider him who endured such opposition from sinful men, so that you will not grow weary and lose heart"* (Hebrews 12:3). Talk about running a race! And he did it for us, *"so that [we] will not grow weary and lose heart."*

And look at the prize he won! He ascended into Heaven and now sits *"at the right hand of the throne of God."* Heaven is our prize, too ... a prize beyond compare. Christ's promise is this: *"Be faithful, even to the point of death, and I will give you the crown of life"* (Revelation 2:10b). Should we falter, as we are certain to do, we claim another of his promises: *"The one who calls you is faithful and he will do it"* (1 Thessalonians 5:24).

Whistle, Clap, and Sing

Music is one of God's most amazing gifts. Think about it: what would it be like to live in a world where the birds never sang, the wind never whistled through the trees, and people never sang or clapped their hands? What would life be like without music and rhythm and dance? When he got older the composer Beethoven could no longer hear; but he still heard music deep inside his head. That's how powerful music is! It helps us express things that words alone cannot say.

There is one book in the Bible filled with nothing but songs: the book of Psalms. That book is one of the oldest hymnals there is. People have been singing the psalms for over 3000 years! There are all kinds of psalms. Some are psalms of praise and thanks to God. There are psalms written by people who were sad, afraid, and even angry. Those psalms ask God to fix things immediately!

In church we use many different kinds of music. We also use many different instruments, like the organ, piano, guitar, flute, drums, bells, and the human voice. Sometimes one person sings; sometimes a choir sings; and sometimes the whole congregation sings. What instruments make music at your church? After worship ask the church musician to show you how to make different sounds on an instrument. Maybe you and the musician can sing another hymn together!

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From the Bench

May 2021

Come, Holy Spirit!

On May 23, we will celebrate the festival of Pentecost. This is the day we remember the sending of the Holy Spirit to the disciples following Jesus' resurrection and ascension to heaven. The Greek word Pentecost means fifty; Pentecost is celebrated fifty days after Easter.

Ten days after Jesus ascended into heaven, many disciples gathered together in Jerusalem for the Jewish harvest festival Pentecost, which was celebrated on the fiftieth day of Passover. While they were indoors praying, a sound like rushing wind filled the house and tongues of fire descended and rested over each of their heads. This was the outpouring of the Holy Spirit promised by God through the prophet Joel (Joel 2:28-29). The disciples were suddenly empowered to proclaim the gospel of the risen Christ. They went out into the streets of Jerusalem and began preaching to the crowds gathered for the festival. By a miracle of the Holy Spirit, they spoke in the native languages of the people present, who had come from all corners of the Roman Empire. This created a sensation. The apostle Peter seized the moment and addressed the crowd, preaching to them about Jesus' death and resurrection for the forgiveness of sins. About three thousand converts were baptized that day. (You can read the Biblical account of Pentecost in Acts 2:1-41). We sometimes call Pentecost the birthday of the Christian church: the day when the gospel was first proclaimed to people of all lands in all languages.

How will the Holy Spirit come to us today? I find a lot of meaning in the text of the hymn, "Come Down, O Love Divine." Written by Bianco da Siena in the late 14th or early 15th century, it was translated from Italian by Richard Frederick Littledale in the 19th century:

¹Come down, O Love divine, seek thou this soul of mine
And visit it with thine own ardor glowing;
O Comforter, draw near; within my heart appear,
And kindle it, thy holy flame bestowing.

²O let it freely burn, till earthly passions turn to dust and ashes in its heat consuming;
And let thy glorious light shine ever on my sight,
And clothe me round, the while my path illuming.

³And so the yearning strong, with which the soul will long
Shall far outpass the power of human telling;
For none can guess its grace till Love create a place
Wherein the Holy Spirit makes a dwelling.

The Holy Spirit is a gift of God, promised to us at our baptism. Take some time this month to meditate on good texts, asking God to fill you with his Spirit – and then watch for the signs that the Spirit is with you, as God promised!



CREATION STATION

In Psalm 104 God is praised for creating the earth and all that lives upon it. God has created a majestic world, yet we so often take it for granted. God has charged us to care for creation. The ideas below can help your family develop appreciation for God's marvelous creation and explore ways to care for it.

Take a walk in your neighborhood or at a park. Pause to listen to the sounds in nature. Take along magnifying glasses and binoculars to look for the detail in God's creation.

Read aloud Psalm 104 or portions of the chapter. Craft a creation banner based on the psalm. Provide a large piece of fabric for a background. Supply fabric and trim scraps, scissors, and fabric glue. Invite older family members to help younger ones fashion sky, rivers, grass, animals, trees, and people. Staple or glue the top of the banner around a dowel to hang it.

Create a fabric-backed praise poster that combines leaves, dirt, and other natural materials with a Bible verse from the Psalm. Choose a verse and copy it onto a piece of construction paper. Arrange the natural objects and the verse as you want them on the fabric, glue them down, and display the poster in your home.

Share the beauty of God's creation with others by making flower or spice sachets to give as gifts. Cut 5" circles of fabric with a pinking shears. Place spices (cinnamon, cloves, allspice) or flowers and leaves (lemon verbena, roses, lilacs) in the center of the fabric. Gather the edges of the circle to the top and tie them together with ribbon. Print the reference Psalm 104:1 on a small tag and attach it to the ribbon.

Talk with your family about ways to pursue ecological concerns from a Christian standpoint. Organize a recycling center at your home or church. If your congregation has a coffee hour, encourage members to bring their own ceramic cups to use. Make a sculpture from recyclable materials. Glue it to a wooden or cardboard base, and print Psalm 104:31 on the base as a reminder to care for creation.

Pray a litany prayer based on Psalm 104. Have one family member read one line at a time from Psalm 104. After each line the rest of the family can respond, "Thank you, God, for your marvelous creation."

Money Matters

Personal Financial Stewardship

Living Within Your Means

Since it is unlikely that you have an unlimited income, your spending must be planned so you can give generously, save aggressively, but still live comfortably. If you typically spend all of your income on your wants and desires, you will find it difficult to live within your means. Spending is easy, whereas giving and saving require self-discipline. Your ability to give and save is made possible by your willingness to control your spending. Improper spending habits are the biggest hindrances to living successfully within your income.

When you intentionally buy fewer things than you can afford, you are choosing to limit your lifestyle. “Self-limitation” decisions are based not on the premise of what you can afford, but rather on what you need. You must ask, “Do I need this certain thing or does God have need of my money to help others and the church?”

What lifestyle does the Bible suggest? Living comfortably is not a sin. God does not condemn being rich, but speaks against the self-centered attitude wealth can cause. Living in opulence without any regard for others does not please the Lord. However, if you love the Lord and serve him and others with your money and time, you are free to live in comfort. Jesus said “But seek first his kingdom and his righteousness, and all these things will be given to you as well” (Matthew 6:33). Certainly, there is a tremendous amount of diversity among Christians and what they own, but your lifestyle should reflect your relationship with Jesus.

According to Russ Crosson in his book *A Life Well Spent*, we have increased our standard of living at the expense of our lifestyles. He points out:

“We have increased our lifestyles, but in the process haven’t we also lost our ability to really live?

- ✝ We have amassed wealth, not wisdom.
- ✝ We have given our children toys, not time.
- ✝ We have children who have been taught to consume rather than work.
- ✝ We have fathers who don’t know their children, and marriages that do not work or last.
- ✝ We have been in a rush to run a race without understanding the finish line.

Could it be that we are being robbed of our very lives because we are not thinking correctly about why we have money and what we are to do with it?”

Our culture promotes monetary wealth. We need to spend wisely, save and give proportionally to our income and be careful not to become a victim of the foolish desires money can create.



Lay Reader Message

WHAT'S THE WORRY?

Jesus knows our nature. He knows we're prone to worry. Perhaps that's why he warned:

"Therefore, I tell you, do not worry about your life, what you will eat or drink; or about your body, what you will wear. Is not life more important than food, and the body more important than clothes? Look at the birds of the air; they do not sow or reap or store away in barns, and yet your Heavenly Father feeds them. Are you not much more valuable than they? Who of you by worrying can add a single hour to his life?" (Matthew 6:25-27)

In spite of these words of both admonition and assurance, Christians still tend to worry. Sometimes worry about the ability to provide for our families takes over our lives to such an extent that it guides our thoughts and actions. We put off giving to the Lord through our church – "temporarily," we say – until we feel secure in our financial situations. Life, as you know, seems to throw one crisis after another at us, and, often, that financial security never comes.

We have the same worry when it comes to serving. We complain that we just don't have time. We work long hours, and then we have commitments to our families. How can we go to meetings or make meals for a family whose mom is sick?

Later, we tell God and even ourselves. Later, when the college tuitions are paid and the kids are out of the house. Then we'll have time and money. But then, after all that hard work, don't I deserve to get away and take a nice, long cruise?

We reap what we sow, we read in 2 Corinthians 9:6. What are you sowing? Proverbs 11:18 reads,

"He who sows righteousness reaps a sure reward." Matthew 6:19-21 records Jesus' words, "Do not store up for yourselves treasures on Earth, where moth and rust destroy, and where thieves break in and steal. But store up for yourselves treasures in Heaven, where moth and rust do not destroy, and where thieves do not break in and steal. For where your treasure is, there your heart will be also."

Is it forgetfulness of God's promises or lack of faith that keeps us stuck in this pattern of giving all for our physical, temporal lives instead of storing up treasures in Heaven. Take God at his Word: give generously, serve without reward, take time to help others, and watch him satisfy your every need.

Love on the Loose


Think of someone you love a lot. How do you let that person know about your love? Do you draw pictures or use words? Are you extra helpful or kind? During Holy Week, the week before Easter, Jesus shows us how to love each other and how he has loved us. One day especially made for this is Maundy Thursday. That's the Thursday right before Easter. The word "Maundy" comes from a Latin word which means "command." So, Maundy Thursday is the day we remember Jesus' command: "Love one another as I have loved you."

In worship on that day, people often do two things to show that love. One is a special ceremony for washing feet. That action doesn't mean the same thing to us that it did for people in Jesus' time, because we usually wear socks and shoes. But in Jesus' time, people wore sandals and they walked everywhere. Their feet got very dusty and dirty. It was a servant's job to wash guests' feet when they visited someone's home. On Maundy Thursday, people's feet are washed to remind us that we show our love by serving each other.

Another way Jesus shows his love is through a special meal called Holy Communion or the Lord's Supper. It may not seem like much to eat or drink, but it's a very important meal. At this meal Jesus is present—just as he has promised. At home on this day do an act of loving kindness for someone in your family. Call or write a letter to a grandparent or to someone in the hospital or in prison.

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I give you a new commandment, that you love one another. Just as I have loved you, you also should love one another. By this everyone will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another." John 13:34-35






