RESEARCH: DATA CODING OR MANUSCRIPT DRAFTING

Kimya N. Dennis. "Being black, a woman, and childfree: The intersection of race and gender"

First known study solely conducted for childfree-by-choice people of African descent. International study with 62 respondents, 59 women and 3 men, in 6 nations: Kenya, London, Sweden, Switzerland, United States of America, Canada. Respondents expressed freedom to choose childfree life regardless of why they do not want to have children; and resources needed for physical and mental health, healthy sexuality and reproductive rights. Race and ethnicity and gender are among the demographic and cultural components discussed in the interviews—some respondents are rejected by African diaspora institutions and families.

Study currently has 21 respondents, 19 men and 2 women, all in the United States. Two women were interviewed to express their experiences with African diaspora men.
