Hazzan's Notes

Dear Friends,



At the end of this month, we will celebrate the last of the major festivals of our religious year with the *Regel* (Pilgrimage Festival) of *Shavuot*. It comes after 7 long weeks of counting the *Omer* from the 2nd night of *Pesah* until *Erev Shavuot*. It is also *Hag Heasif* (the "continuance" festival) because it continues our journey as a people out of slavery in Egypt to becoming a real people with codified laws stipulated here at *Shavuot* when we again read the 10 Commandments. We all reenact being at Mt. Sinai when we stand to hear these laws reads to us each year at this festival observance.

Shavuot is also remembrance of our ancestors' harvest of wheat celebration at this time of the year. Whereas Pesah was an ancestral celebration of the barley harvest, this celebration acknowledges how important wheat was to our diet as a people. It gave us many abilities to create bread and cake which have nourished our people for millennia.

Shavuot is especially remembered as a festival of eating dairy products which include milk, cheese, yogurt, etc. The study of *Torah* and anything connected to it have been compared in the *Talmud* to milk and its purity qualities. Thus, borscht, schav, blintzes, cheesecake, rugelach, etc. all are traditionally eaten at this festival. Some of these traditions come from northern Europe and Russia and cheesecake, rugelach, and others from the German and central European states.

Yizkor has been attached to our major festivals including Yom Kippur, Sh'mini Atzeret (Sukkot), Pesah, and Shavuot for hundreds of years now and it gives us pause at the end of each of these auspicious times in our calendar to remember those who would have celebrated these festivals with us in years gone by who are no longer here to do so. We miss them and remember them, so they are never far from our reality even though they no longer are here in corporal space.

We hope you will want to join us for both our *Erev Shabbat Shavuot* service on May 26 and our *Shabbat Shavuot* Morning *Yizkor* service on May 27 where we will read the 10 Commandments and recite those *Yizkor* prayers.

Shavuos/Weeks

The festival of "Shavuos" occurs on the sixth and seventh days of Sivan. In current English that is the month of May 26th and 27th in the year of 2023/5783. It is the holiday celebrated at the end of seven full weeks of counting the "Omer" from the second day of Passover. It was about six weeks after our people left Egypt in a place called Sinai. After talking with G-d, Moses gathered the Israelites together for this message from G-d: "you have seen what I did to the Egyptians and how I bore you on eagles and brought

you to myself. Now, therefore, if you will listen to my voice and keep my covenant then you will be a treasure to me among all peoples: for all the earth is Mine. And you will be to Me a kingdom of priests and a holy nation" (Shmos 19-4-6).

The people heard the message from G-d and accepted the covenant. They promised to obey all the laws without question. At that moment 600,000 Israelites and their families heard a voice from G-d proclaiming the first and second commandments. "I am the Lord your G-d who has brought you out of the land of Egypt from the house of bondage. You shall have no other gods before Me" (Shmos 20:1-2).

Since "Shavuos" is a harvest festival, it is customary to decorate both the home and synagogue with tree branches, fruits and flowers.

<u>Dairy Meals</u> Eating dairy products rather than meat for the main meal is a popular custom on this holiday. The reason for this is that in Israel at this time of year dairy products are plentiful

Reviewing the Torah On the first night of "Shavuos" it is customary to review selected parts of he Torah and Oral Law. This is to renew our appreciation of this precious gift from G-d.

Akdomus On the first day of "Shavuos" in all synagogues it is customary to read after morning service, just before reading the Torah, a Hebrew poem called Akdomus. It tells of the following: 1. The greatness of G-d and his creations; 2. The joy of our being G-d's chosen people; The heroism that our people exhibited and their sacrifices for upholding of the Torah.

Book of Ruth On the second day of Shavuos "the book of Ruth" is read after the (Shacharis) morning service. It is a story of the devotion she had to her mother-in-law, Niomy, and above all to the Jewish religion. She was rewarded in her lifetime with her marriage to the wealthy and loving Boaz, but even more so in later generations, for it was her great-grandson David, who became the second king of Israel. Just as our ancestors stood around Mount Sanai, took it upon themselves to obey the Torah, so many years later, Ruth took it upon herself the same obligation. It is the same for all Jews to this very day. In essence, true happiness and a rewarding life can be achieved by living according to G-d's law and obeying His commandments.

<u>Vizkor</u> On the second day of "Shavuos" the special menorah prayer "VIZKOR" is recited before the "Musaf" service. This same prayer is recited on each of the three pilgrimage festivals: "Succos", "Pesach", and "Shavuos" and also on "Yom Kippur".
