

Magnet School Lotteries Performed!



The Northwest Suburban Integration School District Magnet Lottery for the 2018-19 school year was performed the first and second weeks of January 2018. NWSISD placed over 860 students from over 1,250 applications into 24 magnet schools. Letters were successfully mailed to all applicants. Families had until February 9 to contact schools and enrollment centers of their intentions to keep their assigned placement or to go back into the waiting pool for the Tier 2 lottery. Blaine CEMS, Coon Rapids BioMed, and Anoka MS for the Arts had earlier assignment deadlines due to class registration which happened earlier than the NWSISD assignment deadline. The magnet lottery application will close on March 9, 2018 and will reopen on March 19, 2018.

Tier 2 lottery will take place the week of March 15. Families will be notified of their Tier 2 lottery assignments the week of March 19, 2018.

Magnet Lottery Priority Application Time Period Students who applied during the priority application period of October 16 through December 31, 2017, will continue to have the best chance of being assigned to the magnet school of their choice during the Tier 2 lottery.

Sibling Priority First priority will be given to the applications of siblings of students who are currently attending and will continue to attend the same magnet school. In order to receive sibling priority status, applications must have been received by December 31, 2017.

Limited seats remain available at the following magnet schools and programs:

Middle Schools:

Brooklyn Center - STEAM Buffalo - Arts Coon Rapids - STEM Fridley - IB Park Center - IB

Coon Rapids High School Educators Rising Students sponsor Sock Drive!

Educators Rising is an extracurricular program designed to introduce high school students to careers in education. Students participate in several hands-on activities each year including a commitment to give back to the community in some way. In past years, the focus was on helping to improve literacy in the home. Students collected and distributed over 20,000 books. This year, students wanted to give back in a different way and held a sock drive. Socks are among the most needed items in homeless shelters, yet the least donated. Educators Rising wanted to help



change that. Although the sock drive only lasted a few weeks, students were able to collect 3119 pairs of socks and hats... and that was only at three schools. Some schools collected monetary donations to buy socks that will be donated to a shelter of their choice. Pictured are the socks collected at Coon Rapids High School. Close to 1000 pairs of socks have already been donated and the remaining socks will go to four local shelters.

Amidst nosy neighbors and Herman's resentful mother, emotions explode on-stage as the audience is held captive hearing, seeing, and feeling the actors rage, resentment, and love. Attendees were privileged to a post-play discussion that took on a passionate tone. Penumbra is ..." a theater that practices art for



social justice." A powerful play - a powerful message! (This event was an Inter-District Partnership Opportunity.)

Passport to the Future "Today is Inclusion Day at 3M!" stated Tesha Alston, Senior Biochemist at 3M. "What's the point of going to the party if no one asks you to dance? Inclusion Day means asking you to contribute, asking you to speak." So on October 30, 2017, forty-five students from Brooklyn Center, Blaine, Coon Rapids, Andover, and Anoka high schools helped mark the first Inclusion Day at 3M. A panel of 3M staff told the students who they were, what they do, how long they have been at 3M, and their "accidental

career paths." Students were given a Passport and "speed interviewed" 3Mers from all different departments, engaging industry leaders and learning some of their secrets to success. The career field trip also included a visit to the 3M Design Center where they had the opportunity to see innovative designs and meeting spaces. A highlight was the Porsche covered in a special film that lit up when a picture was taken with a flash.



Keeping Up with Step-Up Mentorship

Students involved with Step-Up Mentorship meet twice monthly, during the school year, at the students school, to work on academic portfolios with the following concepts in mind: Increase Expectations, Define Aspirations, Seize Opportunities, and Commit to Achievement. These concepts also translate into the larger picture outside the classroom when students participate in field trips with other students from across the collaborative.

In November, **grade 9** students took a trip to Base Camp at Fort Snelling. Base Camp provides students with leadership skill building. Students had the opportunity to Rock Climb, try Archery, and perform Team Building Challenges. Students were led through a series of leadership challenges where they not only needed to support each other but also rely on each other to think through ways of completing each challenge. The rock climbing wall also challenged students to rely on each other through encouragement, support, and active learning.

January brought this group together again for a service learning project at Feed My Starving Children. Grade 9 students from across the collaborative joined forces with our Essence teams and packed over 41,000 meals.


Our **grade 10** Step-Up students started the college planning process with a trip to North Hennepin Community College in December. Student groups
