



WHERE'S THE GOLD? TIPS AND TECHNIQUES

In this column each month we will try to give newcomers to our hobby some valuable tips and techniques which may help them get more enjoyment out of recreational prospecting and mining. Who knows, it may even help them find GOLD!



The positive identification of placer gold is of prime Importance to any prospector or miner. All too often worthless minerals are mistaken for gold when a few simple tests, which can be made in the field, would quickly remove any doubt. Gold is a heavy mineral and will "hang back" in a gold pan. Much so-called "gold" that is lost in panning is in reality flakes of mica. It is true however, that extremely fine gold tends to float on the surface of the water, particularly if any oil or grease is present, and may be tost over the lip of the gold pan.

Gold is very soft and can be cut or flattened easily with a knife. A fragment of gold rubbed over a streak plate leaves a golden streak. Pyrite is brittle, leaves a greenish-black streak, and gives off sulfur fumes when heated. Gold has a metallic luster and is commonly golden in color, inclining to silver white if alloyed with silver. It should be noted that placer gold does not always shine like jeweler's gold which is refined and highly polished. The surface of placer gold is nearly always roughened or pitted by abrasion in the stream due to its softness.

This explains why mica and particularly pyrite crystals, which have shiny surfaces, are so often mistaken for gold. A further test for gold is to try dissolving the specimen in nitric acid. Gold is completely insoluble while sulfides, such as pyrite and chalcopyrite are attacked. And of course, placer gold can be refined and assayed to determined the gold content.

Placer gold occurs in a variety of shapes, the coarser particles indicating closer proximity to the original source while the particles become progressively finer the farther they are transported. Rolled, curved, or flattened grains, angular or subrounded pieces, plates, scales, and tiny specks of "flour gold" are common forms of placer gold. Gold is usually classified into five different categories: coarse gold ---that which remains in a 10-mesh screen; medium gold-that which remains on a 20-mesh screen (average 2,200 colors to an ounce); fine gold-that which remains on a 40-mesh screen (average 12,000 colors to an ounce) very fine gold— that which passes a 40-mesh screen (average 40,000 colors to the ounce) and flour goldsmaller than very fine gold, averaging anywhere from 100,000 to 800,GOO colors to the ounce.

Gold also may be very coarse, sponge like, irregular masses, sharp-edged crystals, or a mass of tiny, intertwined wires. Gold particles large enough to be retained on a 10-mesh screen may qualify as nuggets, a term applied to native gold larger than a grain in weight.

Large nuggets, or examples of wire gold or gold crystals are very valuable, and many can be considered of such specimen value as to be purchased by geological museums and exhibitions.

A very special and profitable market exists for gold nuggets in their natural state in the jewelry business. Nuggets, also called specimens, may sell for up to 10 times the world market price for gold. The exact price of any individual piece of specimen gold is largely determined by the beauty and uniqueness of the specimen and the bargaining power of the individual.

Gold seldom occurs in "pure" form, that is as 1000 fine or 24 karat gold. For instance, gold found in the Mother Lode country of California is between 80 and 90% pure, or 800 and 900 fine. Some gold carries other minerals, such as copper, which gives it a look of a different color. Black Hills gold, has assorted minerals, giving it a multicolored look. Sliver gives gold a mellow, light gold color. Copper, for instance, can give gold a green cast.

Gold also has an intrinsic value. This means that the actual market value of gold contained in gold ore, or coins, for instance, depends upon the fineness. For instance, a gold coin which weighs one troy ounce and is 900 fine, actually has 90% of an ounce of gold in it. Based on a market price of \$400, the intrinsic value of the coin is actually \$360.



Ex-Navy Nurse A Gold Prospector

The image of the dusty, grizzled prospector, complete with a stubborn, backpack-burdened mule in tow, has been replaced by the more modern version of the gold hunter (various professionals who use up-to-date equipment and cruise across the desert in clean, air-conditioned jeeps instead of on dirty, hot mules).

But the spirit of the '49ers—those thousands who flocked westward in the middle of the 19th century after gold was discovered at Sutter's mill in California—is alive and well and flourishing in Southern Nevada, in the persons of Las Vegan Kathleen Middleton and her gold prospecting partners, one of whom goes by the name of "Gold Digger Red." (Red's been hardrock mining on and off for close to 50 years).

Middleton is an ex-navy nurse, registered barber and "excellent cook and bottle washer" who was first bitten by the gold bug while stationed at a naval base in Alaska some 20 years ago.

"Our station was next to one of the rivers in Fairbanks, and our barracks were just a few feet from the water," says Middleton, whose bright red lipstick contrasts sharply with her sky-blue eyes. "We saw other people prospecting and got into the swim of it that way. That's when the gold bug bit me."

Before long, Middleton and her fellow servicemen (and women) were immersing their pans in the clean, icy cold Alaskan waters, searching for those elusive nuggets and that brightly colored dush resting in the riverbed. Visions of striking it rich numbed whatever discomfort they might have felt while spending hours on end squatting next to the river, pans in hand, sifting the abundant, useless sand from the rare, precious metal they were hoping to find.

And there they'd squat, panning many streams over many miles, using two-by-fours nailed together as improvisational sluice-boxes.

Middleton says her initial success at prospecting elevated her skate in gold hunting from a mild interest to a feverish pitch. And though the past 20 years may have eroded many a riverbed, her interest in prospecting remains virtually unchanged.

"I found several nuggets the very first time I ever went out," she recalls. "They varied in size from that of a pea to a marble. Some were as large a walnut.

"I still have some of the first nuggets I ever found—they're too much of a treasure for me to sell them."

She keeps her treasures in a safe deposit box in a bank, stored out of the way of prospective buyers and whatever temptations she might have to sell them, temptations that must grow stronger as time goes by. In recent years, the price of gold has skyrocketed 10-fold, from \$30 an ounce to more

than \$300 an ounce. After two years of gold hunting in Alaska and a short stint of naval duty in the east, Middleton came to Las Vegas in 1962, partly to thaw out and partly because she wanted to be centrally located in the mining belt of the Southwest.

Spending close to eight months a year searching for gold, Middleton and her sometimes-partner "Gold Digger Red" go where possible gold reserves and weather dictate.

She says they frequently see other prospectors crowding the landscape, which leads her to believe "everybody's got gold fever out here. Sunday prospectors, we call 'cm."

In the winter, she can sometimes be found in Death Valley; in the summer, she goes to a cooler Northern California to escape the sweltering desert heat. She and her partners also make frequent trips to Oregon, Utah and Arizona, wherever they think a possible bonanza may be lurking.

To obtain her "grubstake," Mid-(Continued on page 8)

dleton works part-time in between prospecting trips nursing the elderly and baby-sitting for show people in Las Vegas hotels. Only a very few prospectors, she says, make enough money to live entirely off their findings.

"In the old days," she says, "tine 'grubstake' was the prospectors term for what used to mean bacon, beans and tobacco. The term is still used now, but it means paying for my rent and groceries."

Middleton's placer (meaning stream, sand or clay) mining has netted her somewhere in the neighborhood of \$5,000 to \$6,000 in gold over the last 20 years, and there's always the hope that someday she will hit it big (her bonanza, she calls it).

In the meantime, though, she will just plug along with her prospecting, a task she now considers more pleasure than real work. Camping out with friends is one of the more pleasant aspects of gold prospecting.

Though the soft-spoken lady has never really struck it big, she's had what might be called a few close calls toward finding her bonanza.

"The biggest nugget I ever found weighed one ounce," says Middleton, who wears a 3/4-ounce nugget ring on her wedding finger. A mounted diamond sits in the middle of the shiny stone. "That was in the Illinois River in Cave Junction, Oregon,"

Her next big project?

An excursion to the wilds of

New Mexico, where she and a few others are hoping to find some \$17 million in buried Mexican gold bars. That gold, she says, was brought from Mexico in the 1930s so the Mexicans could obtain a higher price for it from the U.S. government, and was subsequently buried somewhere in the desert. She's "very excited about the trip, with a little bit of pessimism thrown

That sort of trip isn't "Gold Digger Red's" bag.

"People who look for treasures like that are hoping for Santa Claus," he says. "There's gold to be found, but only if you dig in the right place, and you persevere enough."

"And," Middleton adds, "If lady luck is smiling down on you."



The National Park Service

THE NATIONAL PARK SERVICE

By Daniel Green, Education Coordinator

On October 23, 1998 2:00 P.M. I received a phone call from the Clark County Gem club, I was alerted to the fact that the National Park Service was having a PUBLIC HEARING. The hearing was at the Enterprise Library 25 E Shelbourne Ave. The Library was on Las Vegas Blvd. about 1 mile South around Blue Diamond Road. The meeting was called for 6:P.M. During that time I called and faxed as many of the local. State and National clubs as time allowed. Each of us and all of us are interested when the Park Service and the BLM are laying the groundwork for YOUR benefit.

As we learned at our last meeting, more and more of the public lands are being withdrawn from public use. Recently an article appeared in the Review-Journal which stated that they were withdrawing another 500,00 acres from public access for YOUR BENEFIT. A management plan preferred by the BLM would limit the number of visitors, curtail the use of off road and all terrain vehicles, close some areas and roads and create designated camping areas.

They want to stop mining operations.

They have printed a Draft Environmental Impact Statement and General Management Plan. We now have a copy of the Draft Plan. The stated purpose of this meeting was for the general public to tell them what you think of their plan. I asked, when did the plan come out and who might have had a chance to read it and to comment on its content. The answer was that the Draft was available through some of the libraries and could have been seen on the Internet-if you had checked their web site. Since the area being considered for PROTECTION was in California (The Mojave National Preserve and the Death Valley National Park), it was deemed to be not of much interest to the people of Nevada.

The clubs and organizations that were able to attend on such short notice were understandable upset with the presentation. They were not satisfied by the response that CONGRESS HAS MANDATED THEM TO DO THIS STUDY.






