Dear friends in Christ,

This week the President of the United States declared there are only two genders: male and female. We write today to say something which we would not think needed to be said: The president does not get to dictate human gender classification. The law does not get to dictate gender classification. Even the apostle Paul, almost two thousand years ago, knew that human-imposed definitions, such as ethnicity, social class, oppressor's titles or gender were not valid. Because of the unifying work of Jesus Christ, all human labels no longer apply.

We understand that each of our human brains is complex, beautiful, and elastic. We continue to evolve as individuals, and as a species. God knows us personally and intimately, even "knowing the number of hairs on your head," according to Jesus (Luke 12:7). God knows the body, soul and mind of each person, including, and perhaps especially those who do not fit neatly in society's categories. Jesus defied society's definitions, and loves others who do as well.

Christians believe ALL humans are created in God's image. We also confess that God is best revealed in the Trinity, a diverse, complex, interwoven expression. So, too, then, our human identity and expression will be diverse and interwoven.

This diversity includes the myriad ways gender is understood and expressed by each human. I invite us into a broader-than-wecan comprehend God and God's creation.

The Evangelical Lutheran in America wrote in its 2019 social statement Faith, Sexism and Justice: A Call to Action that Christians are called to "advocate for and support laws, policies, and practices that respect diverse bodies rather than discriminating against, objectifying, or devaluing them. Women, girls, and people who identify as non-binary must not be deprived of their human or civil rights." (p. 60). For the president to declare someone's gender identity does not exist is to deprive them of their very right to personhood, a basic human right.

The same ELCA social statement declares, "Studies of humans reveal rich diversity, showing that individuals do not neatly fall into two categories. Some people are intersex: their bodies are neither male nor female. People have a diversity of characteristics, most of which cannot be assigned exclusively to one sex or gender or another. Among humans, sex and gender are more accurately characterized as multidimensional." (p.32)

From the Bishop , Dancing as a Spiritual Practice

Rick Steeves makes distinctions between tourists, travelers, and pilgrims. Tourists want the Instagram moments, checking off the key sites from the guidebook, and bringing back a souvenir. Travelers want to experience the culture more deeply. They avoid the places that cruise ships visit. The goal is to know more about the culture, the land, and the food. Pilgrims want to go beyond what travelers experience. They want to be changed. They want to return home with a new understanding of themselves and the place they call home.

The Bishop's Academy this year was in Puerto Rico. Our location, our worship experiences, and our presenters pushed us toward becoming pilgrims. We learned about the colonial history of Puerto Rico and the injustices that they endure even as the people are

citizens of the United States. I learned how much I didn't know about this place or its history. We also learned how to dance!

The traditional dance of Puerto Rico is called Bomba. It is a percussion led fusion of indigenous, African and Spanish sounds and movements. The main singer holds the maracas and sets the rhythm. A base drum picks up and holds the beat. Another drummer uses sticks to fill in the sounds and accentuate the rhythm. Finally, another drummer called the Primo watches the dancer's moves and musically interprets them into the song. The result is a beautiful, joyful, communal dance experience that conveys passion, pride, love, and hope.

After watching the dancers and learning about the elements of Bomba, we were invited to join in. A few simple steps were taught and then we were off to the races. It was good for our overly intellectual leaders to get into their bodies and move. I'm not saying that many of us were any good, but that wasn't the point. It was feeling the rhythm and letting it flow through our bodies that mattered. For me, that was when I felt a shift from traveler to pilgrim. I came back home changed.

As I consider all the challenges that we face in our lives I want to incorporate the lessons I learned while dancing. First of all, it is important to remember to dance. When we become anxious or overwhelmed with all that is on our plate, both individually and collectively, we can get stuck in concrete. Our brows furrow. We feel like we aren't up to the task or that we should be doing more. That is when we need to listen to the rhythm of life all around us and begin to dance to its beat.

Scripture tells of leaders who danced. Miriam danced when the Hebrew people were delivered from slavery on the dry side of the Red Sea. David danced with all his might as the ark of the covenant was brought into the tabernacle. Dancing was for celebrating life in the midst of struggle.

In 2016 I was part of a group that traveled to Jojutla, Mexico. That city is near the site of one of the largest mass graves. We were with the "Mothers of the Disappeared" who shared stories of their spouses and children being taken by military personnel or by the cartels suddenly and never seen again. For some, after 20 years they still met, prayed, and demanded an answer to the whereabouts of their loved ones.

We were there for several nights. After each day of sharing stories, the music would start and these women would invite us to join them in dancing. They said that dancing together gave them the strength that they needed to go on. It bolstered their faith. So we danced and danced!

There is a lot on our plates as a synod and as a society right now. Many of you have shared your concerns about the future of your congregation or about what may happen to your immigrant neighbors. The weight of these days can become a burden. May we take a lesson from the Bomba dancers in Puerto Rico or the mothers of Jojutla and remember to dance! Dance even if you are a terrible dancer! Let your freak flag fly! Allow the Spirit to infuse your bones again by listening to the rhythm of life, and dancing into whatever comes next.

When was the last time you danced? If you can't remember, do it today. When was the last time you danced in church? Break out the djembe, the tambourine, and the cow bell! Play something in worship that has a beat! Take the hand of someone near you and invite them into the dance of the beloved people of God!

Additionally, CHRIST LUTHERAN CHURCH runs a successful weekday daycare center and actively participates and encourages nonpartian voter registration efforts. The church is known for its open and welcoming spirit, with a public declaration of hospitality to all.
