I feel like this is more of a community problem these days then a native problem even when the community is mostly native the whites do grow into the community it grabs you by the heart and you can't help but want to be a part of it and in a way you feel native to the area even if you didn't grow up here. I am white and I do not want to steal the native culture, I just want to be a part of it because it fascinates me.
