It's important to be a responsible pet owner

- Recognize that your pet's welfare is totally dependent on it's owner.

- Dispose of pet waste in a proper manner

- Provide ample physical and emotional stimulation



Construction Corner

We have our very own fix it remodeling guy...Mike Raymond. He has been working in this neighborhood for many months. We asked him what some of the common problems are with our homes and here are a few things he addressed. We will keep up with what Mike is doing, and report to the neighbors on these issues. You may not experience any of these, but it is inevitable that most of us have these problems at some time

or another.

Plumbing problems. Mike has found a few homes that did not have P-traps in the plumbing under the sinks. What in the world is a pea trap? Well first, it is in the building code

that all homes have P-traps. Having no P-traps can make your home dangerous for your health. The curve in the pipe prevents dangerous gases from being released into your home. Check the pipes under you sink. If you do not see one of these, call Mike or you favorite plumber. You need to get this fixed.

Also, many homes do not have adequate flashing against their siding. The



flashing provides a seal required between the roof and the siding (often over the garage and at chimneys) to prevent water leakage and eventually rotting. Most of our homes are getting to that age of roof replacement. When you have the roof replaced, be sure that your contractor addresses the flashing. If your roof is already leaking, call Mike or your favorite roofer and get this fixed.

Paint is a money saver. Many of the

windows, trim work, ect., could have been saved if only the paint/caulking jobs were done right. Make sure that your windows are painted properly. Get on a ladder and check the tops of the windows. Get on your belly if you have to and look at the undersides of each window. Many painters think what you can't see won't hurt them. Make you painter take the time to get it right.

ANIMAL CONTROL ORDINANCES

DO NOT TIE YOUR DOGS!!!!!

New animal control ordinances for Gwinnett County were passed on Jan. 16, 2007.

The ordinances now include a law which bans dogs from being chained or tethered.

"It shall be unlawful for the owner or possessor of any animal, to restrain or anchor an animal by means of a tether, chain, cable, rope, or cord, unless the tether or other restraint is being held by a competent person." The ordinance says, "Pets now must be kept in a pen or other building with at least 150 square feet per dog."

Reasons not to chain your dog.

First, more people are learning that continuous tethering is bad for dogs. As pack animals, dogs have been bred for thousands of years to form a strong attachment to a human family. An otherwise friendly and happy dog, when kept continually chained and isolated, often becomes neurotic, unhappy, anxious, and aggressive. In fact, studies show that chained dogs are much more likely to bite than unchained dogs.

In addition, chained dogs may unintentionally hang themselves if they are tethered too close to a fence and attempt to jump it. Chained dogs are also subject to attack by other animals and cruel humans.

We are in the process of contacting Gwinnett County to have our neighborhood sidewalks repaired. Many have cracked, shifted or just sunk. When you take a walk, please be aware of the highs and lows of the sidewalks. Hopefully they will be repaired soon.

Phone Directory

Please watch for your phone directories, which will be placed in your mailbox. Keep these books. You will have the contact information for all of your neighbors readily available. This could be a life saver in an emergency. It might also help you remember the name of that neighbor you met outside or at one of our block parties.

Need Information on your siding?

Many neighbors are receiving a letter from Ed Hill regarding Hardboard Siding Claims. The heading of the letter reads: Data Processing Services. I spoke with him and he says that if you are receiving letters, chances are you have siding that may need replacement, and there is a class action suit against Abtco and Masonite siding that could provide you with some financial assistance. As well, he says that even if you have Louisiana Pacific you can still get some money by filing a claim against the warranty. 
what makes me want to QUIT. I hope next year
