First, the Vestry has approved distributing the monthly edition of *The Augustinian* primarily by email through Constant Contact, beginning with the February 2024 issue. This change will save money on paper and postage, helping us to be better stewards of the resources you share with us. For the distribution to be effective, please make sure the Parish Office has the email address at which you would prefer to receive *The Augustinian*. You can email this information to Karen McClain at office@augustustrappe.org or you can call her at 610-489-9625 weekdays from 9:00 a.m. through 3:00 p.m. If you do not wish to receive *The Augustinian* by email but in printed format via the Post Office, you can do that by emailing or calling Karen McClain the same way.

Second, the **Annual Congregational Meeting** will be held after the 10:30 a.m. service on Sunday, November 12, 2023. At this meeting, we will vote on revisions to our current constitution. Copies of the current and proposed constitutions have been included for your perusal. All of the changes are the result of revisions mandated by the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America and are editorial in nature.

**Reformation Sunday** is October 29, 2023. This is our opportunity to give thanks to God for the renewed emphasis on God's grace in the church's proclamation. Please remember to wear something red to celebrate the Lutheran Reformation.

May God, the Father of glory, Jesus Christ, the name above all names, and the Holy Spirit who lives in you, bless you now and forever. Amen.

# Graceful Generosity

#### A Definition of Stewardship

"Christian stewardship is the practice of the Christian religion. It is neither a department of life nor a sphere of activity. It is the Christian conception of life as a whole, manifested in attitudes and actions." (W. H. Greever)

#### Testing your Knowledge of Scripture

Can you identify who the following person may represent in Scripture?



If you said the Prodigal Son, you were right. In Luke 15:11-32, Jesus told the parable of a wealthy farmer who had two sons. The younger of the two sons was not happy living at home so he left home with his share of the estate which was given to him by his father. While he was gone, he "squandered his wealth in wild living" (verse 13).

When the son finally came to his senses, he was ready to go home. He confessed his sin to God and to his father. He said, "I have sinned against heaven and against you,

I am no longer worthy to be called your son" (verses 18-19).

The parable ends with his loving father embracing him and celebrating his return. In this parable, Jesus illustrated the love of the father for his son in order to make it abundantly clear that God's love is infinite. God's love toward us sinners is unconditional and eternal.

The love of the Father shown in this parable is our motivation for Christian stewardship. In spite of who we are and what we do, God doesn't stop loving us. We respond out of gratitude in honoring him with the faithful use of our time, talents, and treasures.

#### On the Lighter Side

A pastor was talking to the church organist. "When I finish my sermon," he said, "I'll ask for all those in the congregation who want to contribute \$500 toward the church's debt to stand up. In the meantime, you can provide appropriate music."

"Any suggestions?" the organist asked.

"You might try the Star Spangled Banner," the pastor replied.

#### A Stewardship Thought

While opportunities to use our gifts seem almost limitless, we must be willing to make ourselves available. Often our tendency is to look at our shortcomings rather than to focus on Philippians 4:13: "I can do all things through him who gives me strength." As stewards we are to use our gifts gladly and wholeheartedly in service to God alone.

God must work in us ...
If he is to work through us.

#### **Expressing Your Thanks to God**

How are you saying THANKS to God for all that he has entrusted to you? When you think of Christian stewardship, you probably think of what you place in the offering plate. I hope that you are showing your gratitude through generous giving, but what about using your talents for God through the church?

All of us, to one degree or another, have the ability to do things that can be of benefit to our church. In other words ... after you have heard the sermon and participated in Holy Communion ... now it's time to show your thanks by doing some work for the Lord.

You may ask: "Why should I?" Think for a moment about our situation. Many do not realize that sin is a big problem and obstacle in this world. We do. Thanks to the Word of God, we have been brought to the realization that forgiveness is needed every day. Scripture also tells us that salvation is a free gift that we can't earn. That fact should make us more eager to say thanks to God who has saved and freed us from eternal prison and gives us a fresh start every day.

As stewards, we realize that our talents and abilities are gifts from God that are to be used in his service. When we use our gifts for God's glory, we are acknowledging that he is the provider, and we express our thanks for what he gives to us. Some of the tasks that we can do around the church are fairly obvious, such as being kind and courteous to fellow worshippers and visitors, giving words of encouragement, singing in the choir, ushering, teaching Sunday school, serving on committees or boards, washing the windows, etc. Check with us in the church office to see how you can use your gifts.

There are many ways of expressing thanks to the Lord. We hope that one of the ways that you will say thanks is through using your talents at our church.

#### **Closing Thought**

We can live one of two ways ... with or without Christ. We can live without Christ, living just for ourselves, exalting worldly pleasures and success, or we can live with Christ, exalting him as the risen Lord.

We can squander our talents, waste our time, and spend our money foolishly, or we can use these God-given gifts to his glory as they benefit others. "Each of us will give an account of himself to God," we read in Romans 14:12. Let us be among those who hear the words, "Well done, good and faithful servant!" (Matthew 25:21).

### Some Facts about the Old Trappe Church

One day, I was thinking about the early history of the Old Church, and I started doing some research. Here are some facts that I found that I thought might be of interest to you:

- When Henry Melchior Muhlenberg first arrived in this region in November 1742, he wrote a letter that stated on that occasion he was accompanied from the New Hanover Church by 'three elders to Providence which has a byname of Trappe'. This implies that the village of Trappe had indeed started.
- Muhlenberg called the building the "Augustus Church" or the "Providence Church" in all his correspondence and journals. No documents were found that he ever called the building the "Trappe Church".
- Under the direction of Henry Muhlenberg, the construction of a new stone church (not wood) began in May 1743. The building was to be 54 shoes long by 39 shoes wide. The building was under roof by the end of August of the same year.
- The first service was held in the new church on September 12, 1743. The interior of the Church was not completed: there were no pews, pulpit, organ or galleries and the walls were plain. Muhlenberg promised the Congregation that he would dedicate the Church after construction was completed and the debt was paid off.
- From a letter dated April 21, 1744, Muhlenberg expected that the Church in Providence would be consecrated that summer and that it will be called 'Augustus' named after the Founder of the Halle Foundation, Augustus Hermann Franke (and not St. Augustus).
- By 1745 the pews, pulpit, and two galleries were completed. The debt was also paid off and on October 6, 1745, Muhlenberg dedicated the church to the "Society of the Augsburg Confession" and named the church "Augustus". The name "Augustus" does not appear anywhere on the building.
- The Choir loft was added in 1751, to accommodate a new organ.
- On a map of Pennsylvania dated 1759, the building was shown as the "Dutch Lutheran Church".
- In a book entitled "Historical Collections of the State of Pennsylvania" by Sherman Day and published in 1843, there is a sketch of the Old Church with the caption underneath calling the building the "Ancient Lutheran Church at Trappe".
- In 1850, the Congregation at Augustus began to talk about constructing a "new and more comfortable" church. Construction of the New Brick church was started in 1852 and completed by 1853.
- In 1930, Pastor W.O. Fegley declared that the Old Church was the "Oldest Unaltered Lutheran Church in America" and "The Shrine of Lutheranism".

Conclusion: Based upon the research, it is apparent that the Old Church was known by many different names over the years, however, it is not apparent where the name "Trappe Church" originated from. If the Brick Church (built in 1852) is the "New Church" then it is logical that the 1743 building is the "Old Church". Regardless of the facts that were found or not found, the reality is that it will forever be known to all of us as the "Old Trappe Church".



## The Importance of Trust

Trust is an important part of a relationship between spouses, between parents and children, between employers and employees, and between friends. To illustrate the importance of trust, I will share a story from former President Eisenhower who described an event from his earlier days on a Kansas farm.

"An older farmer had a cow we wanted to buy." the President said. "We went over to visit him and asked about the cow's pedigree."

"Don't know," replied the farmer.

"Well, how's her butterfat production?" we asked.

"Don't know."

"Let's see," my dad finally said. "How many pounds of milk does she give each year?"

"Don't know that either," said the farmer shaking his head. "But I do know she's an honest cow and she'll give you all the milk she has!"

"Well," Ike concluded. "I'm kinda like that old cow. You can always trust me to give you everything I have."

Life would be so much easier if we could take people at their word. It doesn't take long to discover that talk is cheap, so we are forced to decide whom or what we will trust. Where do we place our faith and confidence? Do we trust God as our source of life and things? Trusting is not an easy thing to do. We may trust God in some things but not all things. By nature, we are self-reliant, and we live in a society that admires self-reliance and discourages trust in anyone other than oneself.

Trust knows that God loves us and wants the best for us. Complete trust in God is seeking God himself, rather than his gifts. Knowing God, through Christ, brings about a self-surrender and total trust in him. Then our trust is not dependent on what he gives, but who he is.

In the same manner that God proves he is trustworthy, God wants us to prove our trustworthiness. The apostle Paul wrote, "Now it is required that those who have been given a trust must prove faithful" (1 Corinthians 4:2). How blessed we are that our God can be trusted totally and that he loves and trusts us enough to be his ambassadors and representatives here on earth. Through the working of the Holy Spirit, we can be faithful to his trust.
