Strongsville Historical Society Celebrates 60 Years

The Historical Society had its beginning on November 10, 1962 when a group of 20 interested people met at the home of Howard & Velda Chapman to form an organization for the purpose of preserving Strongsville's colorful past; such as historical landmarks, fact and lore of the early settlers, news items, pictures, tools, handcrafts, and various things pertaining to the history and development of the community.

Beginning December 8, 1962, monthly meetings began. In January, 1963, a constitution and by-laws were prepared and presented at the February meeting. At that time, there were 32 charter members.

Howard and Velda Chapman

Velda Drake Chapman was the daughter of Elmer Drake and Cora Bedford. The first Drake in Strongsville was Asa Drake; he arrived about 1820 after walking the entire distance from Stoughton, Massachusetts! His nephew Dexter joined them; his oldest son was Elmer Drake, father of Velda.

Velda's grandfather Dexter became a school teacher and also conducted singing schools, using a folding melodeon (a bellows operated pump organ) that could be carried in a buggy. Velda's father Elmer also became a school teacher who taught in Strongsville, Rocky River, and Wooster College. He served as Superintendent of Strongsville Schools in 1906, then as Superintendent of Brunswick Schools in 1917 until retirement in 1923.

Howard Chapman was from Brunswick. He was a teacher in Parma, Bay Village, and Brooklyn Village before coming to Strongsville where he taught Science and Math.

(The source books do not mention Velda's teaching career)
