family relocated to Mount Clemens, Michigan, in 1954 when his father was transferred to Selfridge Air Base. Paul graduated from St. Louis High School in 1965 and enlisted in the U.S. Army in 1966. Together they began an adventure that started by taking them to Stuttgart, Germany, where Paul served in the U.S. Army until he was honorably discharged as a Sergeant in 1969.
