PLEASE DO NOT SEND THESE ITEMS TO SCHOOL

We have staff and students with allergies and sensitivities that we must take into consideration. Please do not include these items in any sort of school related activity, whether it be a field trip, ball games, or class time. In order to best protect the health of those individuals, the following items NOT be brought into the school at any time:

LATEX: No balloons, jewelry, gloves, rubber products, etc. that may contain latex. Mylar balloons are fine as are vinyl gloves (for emergencies and food service). GLOW STICKS: Absolutely no glow sticks of any kind are allowed in the school.

BANANAS: Please do not bring or send into the school. **NUTS:** No food or decorative items with nuts may be brought into the school. This includes peanuts, walnuts, pecans, etc.

AVOCADOS: Please do not bring or send avocados into the school.

GARLIC: If you are sending treats for grade 1, please avoid anything with garlic.

SCHOOL FACILITY USAGE

Absolutely no Junior High or younger Students may use the weight room or gym without adult supervision. Any students or non-students in Grade 8 or below MUST be accompanied by an adult when using these facilities. There are NO EXCEPTIONS!!! Also, students are not to be in the school facility after 6:30 p.m. Wednesday nights. This applies to ALL students and pre-school, regardless of age/grade.

Student Absences

ALL STUDENT ABSENCES MUST BE REPORTED TO THE OFFICE.

We understand that it is necessary for students to miss school occasionally. *It is mandatory the SCHOOL*OFFICE be notified of any student absence of any kind by calling 487-2202 and speaking to Judy or Jonna.

Please keep in mind that if students experience vomiting, diarrhea, fevers or rashes. If your grade 7-12 child has a medical/dental appointment, we ask that you bring back a documentation of visit when your child returns to school. Please note that this is not the same as an appointment card. The document In addition, when picking up or dropping off your child at other than the beginning or end of the school day, please check in at the office. Your assistance is greatly appreciated.

We also understand that parents need to be gone from time to time and leave their children in the care of others. Should you need to be gone and someone else is responsible for your child(ren), please call the office and let us know.

Student Illness

There are a few illnesses making the rounds in the community. If your child is ill with vomiting, diarrhea, a fever, or a rash we ask that you please keep your child home a full 24-48 hours after the last incident of vomiting and/or diarrhea or after the fever breaks or rash clears/scabs over. Encourage your child to wash his/her hands with soap and water to help decrease the chances of sharing germs.

Student Medications

In addition to every day medication needs, colds, flu, and other ailments make their way through the school population every year. If your child must take medication during the school day, it must be processed through the school office. This includes inhalers. Parents/Guardians are required to come in and sign medication forms. All prescription medication must be in the original bottle with the pharmacy label. Overthe-counter medications must be in the original bottle. Inhalers should have a label on the barrel. Students are NOT allowed to keep medications with them or in their lockers.

Fall/Winter Weather

We are entering that time of year when the weather is unpredictable and the temperature tends to drop. Please make sure children are dressed appropriately for the weather. All bus students and students traveling by bus for any reason must have a coat, hat, gloves/mittens, long pants/sweats and study shoes or boots. Students traveling for activities may also pack a blanket for the trip.

Elementary students are encouraged to have a coat, hat, gloves, and boots as a minimum for recess when winter weather arrives. Snowpants are also encouraged to help keep your child's clothing warm and dry.
