LITURGY OF THE WORD

FIRST READING

Zephaniah 1:7, 12-18

Zephaniah (like the prophet Amos in last week's first reading) presents the day of the LORD as one of judgment and wrath. Descriptions of the last day in the New Testament include details taken from Old Testament accounts of the day of the LORD.

 ⁷Be silent before the Lord GOD! For the day of the LORD is at hand; the LORD has prepared a sacrifice, he has consecrated his guests.

¹²At that time I will search Jerusalem with lamps, and I will punish the people

"The LORD will not do good, nor will he do harm."
¹³Their wealth shall be plundered, and their houses laid waste.
Though they build houses, they shall not inhabit them;

the sound of the day of the LORD is bitter, the warrior cries aloud there.
¹⁵That day will be a day of wrath, a day of distress and anguish,

¹⁶a day of trumpet blast and battle cry
against the fortified cities and against the lofty battlements.

¹⁷I will bring such distress upon people that they shall walk like the blind; because they have sinned against the LORD, their blood shall be poured out like dust, and their flesh like dung.
¹⁸Neither their silver nor their gold will be able to save them on the day of the LORD's wrath; in the fire of his passion the whole earth shall be consumed; for a full, a terrible end he will make of all the inhabitants of the earth.

1 Thessalonians 5:1-11

Though we do not know and cannot calculate the day of Christ's return, we live faithfully in the here and now as we anticipate the day when we will be given eternal salvation through our Lord Jesus Christ.

A reading from First Thessalonians.

¹Now concerning the times and the seasons, brothers and sisters, you do not need to have anything written to you. ²For you yourselves know very well that the day of the Lord will come like a thief in the night. ³When they say, "There is peace and security," then sudden destruction will come upon them, as labor pains come upon a pregnant woman, and there will be no escape! ⁴But you, beloved, are not in darkness, for that day to surprise you like a thief; ⁵for you are all children of light and children of the day; we are not of the night or of darkness. ⁶So then let us not fall asleep as others do, but let us keep awake and be sober; ⁷for those who sleep sleep at night, and those who are drunk get drunk at night. ⁸But since we belong to the day, let us be sober, and put on the breastplate of faith and love, and for a helmet the hope of salvation. ⁹For God has destined us not for wrath but for obtaining salvation through our Lord Jesus Christ, ¹⁰who died for us, so that whether we are awake or asleep we may live with him. ¹¹Therefore encourage one another and build up each other, as indeed you are doing.

Jesus tells a parable about his second coming, indicating that it is not sufficient merely to maintain things as they are. Those who await his return should make good use of the gifts that God has provided them.

forward, saying, 'Master, I knew that you were a harsh man, reaping where you did not sow, and gathering where you did not scatter seed; ²⁵so I was afraid, and I went and hid your talent in the ground. Here you have what is yours.' ²⁶But his master replied, 'You wicked and lazy slave! You knew, did you, that I reap where I did not sow, and gather where I did not scatter? ²⁷Then you ought to have invested my money with the bankers, and on my return I would have received what was my own with interest. ²⁸So take the talent from him, and give it to the one with the ten talents. ²⁹For to all those who have, more will be given, and they will have an abundance; but from those who have nothing, even what they have will be taken away. ³⁰As for this worthless slave, throw him into the outer darkness, where there will be weeping and gnashing of teeth.'"

We are honored today to have the Reverend Betty Wright-Riggins, Ursinus' Chaplain and Director of Religion & Spiritual Life, as our guest preacher at both the 8:00am & 10:30am church worship services. A reception will be held in the Muhlenberg Center between the services and following the 10:30am worship service. All are welcome to attend! Please join us in welcoming the Reverend Betty Wright-Riggins to Augustus' family.



While at Augustus today please take notice of all the quilts and afghans adorning the church sanctuary. They were made by the Hearts and Hands Committee of Augustus' Women of the ELCA under the direction of Mildred Stuffle. The quilts will be given to Lutheran World Relief to be distributed to countries all over the world to help those people less fortunate. The full-sized afghans will be taken to Laurel House, a shelter for abused women and children, in Norristown, and the baby afghans will be taken to the Genesis Pregnancy Care Center in Pottstown. The prayer blankets will be given to Doylestown Hospital for end-of-life patients and to St. Mary's Medical Center

for mothers who lost their babies. Making quilts and afghans for those people less fortunate is a tangible way to express love to our neighbors in need. Quilts can be used as warm bedding, simple tents or floor coverings. The afghans provide a level of personal comfort and care. Each one reflects God's loving presence in a world with suffering. Many thanks to everyone who have contributed to this ministry over the past year. If you would like to get involved and be connected to this global Christian family, you are always welcome to join the quilters, knitters, and crocheters of Augustus. The Hearts and Hands Quilting Group meets the first Wednesday and the third Tuesday of each month in room 24 from 9:30 AM to 11:30 AM, and the Hearts and Hands Knitting/Crocheting Group meets the second and fourth Monday night of each month in room 20 from 7:00 PM to 9:00PM. If you prefer to support the Quilting group in the comfort of your own home, we have quilting packs, each containing 48 squares, available in the Muhlenberg Center: Pick a pack out of the basket on the table, sew the squares into a quilt top, and return the pack to the bin under the table. Each quilt top will then be used to make a quilt for Lutheran World Relief. Each pack has instructions and a contact email address for questions. If you wish to help the Knitting/Crocheting group from the comfort of your own home, 7" x 9" blocks can be either crocheted or knitted and placed in the designated basket in the Muhlenberg Center. They are also collecting fullsized afghans 56" x 63", baby afghans 36" x 36" or 36" x 45" in pastel colors, lap prayer blankets 2'- 3' wide by 3'- 4' long in any color, and knitted/crocheted/quilted prayer blankets 50" x 60" in pastel colors.
