Leadbelt National

Ah, the Leadbelt National. It's put on by the Missouri Mudders at the Park Hills off-road riding area. It's not just an AMA national Enduro, it's also a Blackjack Enduro. So I made my annual trek to see the big dogs. This year's edition was held on May 22nd. The Missouri Mudders laid out a 46-mile loop. Long course riders got to ride it two times. The short course riders make one trip around.

On Saturday, it was pretty dry. The area needed some rain. We spent our time wandering around the pits checking out some of the national rigs. I guess the high gas prices affected some of the riders. In fact, instead of the usual luxury rig, current national number one Randy Hawkins showed

up in a pickup with trailer. Mike Lafferty had the same rig that he's had for several years. Oh yeah, it was his first race back after breaking his collar bone only four weeks before.

It didn't stay dusty for the race. Rain woke us up in the middle of the night. It stopped and then it started again. Luckily, it stopped about dawn. But it left some of the course pretty sloppy. Other parts were great, especially the sandy areas.

Usually, analyzing the route sheet for this race is a waste of time. And this year was no different. The first three miles were at 15 mph. OK, this should be no problem. In fact, it was doable by this rider. I think I had about 30 seconds to wait at the 2.9 mile point before it was time to go.

The speed average bumped to 18 mph for the next 6 miles; at

that point the speed average went up to 24 mph for 10 miles to the gas available. I was hoping to be on time through the 18 mph section and then if I was able to maintain 18 mph through the 24 mph section, I would drop about 8 points at the check before the gas available. There had to be a check right before the gas available, didn't there? Unfortunately, I was already down 7 minutes by the time I got to the 24 mph section. So much for strategy; for this rider, it was going to be a 46-mile hare scramble.

I got to the gas available, bumped the mileage on my computer and I was still 13 minutes down. That's how I did. When looking at the scores of the top ten riders, the most points dropped was 5 and the least was 1 point dropped. They had to wait at the gas available!

Trail conditions were pretty sloppy in a few places. There were a few hills that got tough. It was slick enough that if you got your rear wheel caught on a root or a rock, it could mean getting off and pushing.

After the gas available, they wanted us to go really fast! They bumped the speed average to 30 mph for 9 miles. Yeah, right. It was easy to drop buckets full of points in this section for us mere mortals. This was the big points-taking section of the day. Even the big dogs were dropping nine and ten points here.

There was a 10-minute pause after this section. This was enough to get the top riders back on time, but not me. I was starting to get hammered. There were 16 more miles before the end of the short course, the first six at 18 mph and the last 10 at 24 mph; I do remember the trail being fun in this section, except for one long creek section.

I was sure glad to see that last check. And I was really glad that I was only riding short course.

Long course riders got a half hour break before heading back out. That is, if they were on time. They got to

ride the same course again.

When all was said and done, Mike Lafferty won with a 21, three points over Steve Hatch. Coming in third was Matt Stavish with a 25. Current national champion Randy Hawkins dropped 28 points, beating fifth place finisher Billy Russell, on tie-breakers. Only 6 seconds separated Hawkins and Russell.

Cody Potts took first place Blackjack with a thirteenth overall.

Train Robbers

Bismark, Ark

It looked like it was going to be hot and dusty for the seventh race of the BJEC season at the Train Robbers Enduro put on by the Arkansas Dirt Riders. This is always a well-attended event with it being sanctioned by three circuits. Not only is it part of the BJEC season, but it is also a SERA, Southern Enduro Riders Association, and TSCEC, Texas State Champion Enduro Circuit, race. Over 300 riders participated. I headed down with Shawn Hall in the RV. We drove through rain a couple of times on the way down. We hoped that they were getting rain at the race site. Unfortunately, they were not.

It was a traditional time-keeping enduro with three loops. Extra Short Course riders made one loop. Short Course riders made two loops and long course riders would ride all three loops.

The first loop, at just over 19 miles, was fun for most. One thing that was really noticeable on the route sheet was the first reset. At 18 mph, the reset from 3.6 to 3.65 was just 10 seconds in length. Why? Anyhow, once in the woods, the dust wasn't too bad. It would get dusty when the route dropped out to an open road. A few riders complained of missing a corner and getting lost for a short time. There were three checks on this loop. The first check was at 4.2 miles. All the top riders zeroed it. The check was followed by a reset from 4.58 to 6.31. If you know your enduro rules, there must be three miles between checks. With the check at 4.2, there could not be a check before 7.2 miles. So the smart riders cruised up to 7.1 miles and waited. It really wasn't necessary to advance down the trail though, since the check was followed by a long trail section that was relatively easy to stay on time.

In fact, it was quite a bit of fun to freight train with three other riders on my minute, including 3rd overall, first BJEC, Cody Potts. I not sure how long this section was, but I think we hit


the next check about the 13 mile mark. The check out was at the end of the loop, right back at camp. I had to hustle and I still dropped one point. It was 1:58, but it was still one point! Of the top ten finishers, seven came into this check with a perfect score. In fact, those seven riders had perfect scores at the end of the first loop.

After an extended reset and gas available, we headed out on the second loop. The speed average bumped up to 20 mph. Check four, the first check on the second loop, was just a short distance from the reset. There was a short reset seven miles into the loop. I think check five was right after this reset. It got to be a blur at that point. About three miles later, the speed average bumped to 24 mph for seven miles before a reset. Check six, right before the reset, proved to be the first points-taker for the top riders. Carsten Cagle and Stephen Reed both dropped three points at this check.

Now, the top riders may have been able to take advantage of this reset. But for us mere mortals, it wasn't quite enough to get us back on time. There were 10 more miles before the end of the short course. The Arkansas Dirt Riders showed the riders some mercy and had the last check three miles from the end of the course. Cagle would continue to lead, zeroing this check. There were a whole bunch of the top riders dropping only one point.

The third loop was approximately 28 miles in length, with the last nine run at 24 mph. All the top riders zeroed check eight, the first check on loop three. A long ways later, the riders got to check nine, the final check of the day. Cagle again topped the field, dropping only 3 points. Reed, Potts and Nolan Knight each dropped 4 points.

Cagle's score totaled 6 points for the overall win. Reed dropped 8 points for second. Potts and Knight tied with 9 points. Potts took third by 25 seconds on tie breakers.

Stillwater, OK

Summer had arrived in time for the Golden Eagle Enduro. The Golden Eagle was the eighth race of the year. It was held in its traditional location outside Stillwater, OK.

It was going to be hot. It was going to get real hot later in the day.

The Stillwater Trail Riders don't have much room to work with at the Stillwater Motorcycle Park. It's referred to the as the 500, for 500 acres of land. Consequently, it was a qualifier-style enduro with a 20-mile loop. Extra short course riders rode it one time. Short course riders going twice and long course riders made three loops. There were three special tests per loop, except for the last

loop. There was only one special test on the last loop. It was the whole loop, minus one little section.

All the sections looked pretty much the same, lots of tight corners, back and forth. A few hills are thrown in, but they are really big gullies. Oh yeah, if you haven't been there, the dirt is very red, very, very red. There are a few rocks, but they are big rocks that don't move when you hit them.

The first special test started about four miles into the loop and it ran for four miles. The second special test was across the road on "the eighty", 80 acres of the park separated by a county road. This special test was two miles long.

The third special test was the last four miles of the loop.

Riders were required to start all the loops on time. Riders were penalized one minute for each minute they were late.

Now the long course riders didn't race across the road. Just before the road crossing, there was a sign directing riders on the first and second loops to cross the road. Third loop riders were to stay to the left and not cross the road. As riders took off for the third loop, a piece of orange tape was placed on their number plates, indicating they were on the third loop. This was necessary, since early third loop riders could catch late second loop riders. Riders would also go through the

checks used on the first and second loops. The orange tape alerted check workers that this was a long course rider and mark the score card as an observation check. And get out of the way.

Cody Potts continued his winning ways by taking the overall, and first BJEC, with a total time of 129 minutes and 15 seconds. Cole Kirkpatrick was second, 32 seconds back. Matt Lane, with a time of 132m 32s, was third, second BJEC. Drew Chandler and Allan Swartz filled out the top five.

The overall A award went to A Vet rider Craig Chapman.

First B rider was B Viet rider Jeff Simunek.

Charlie Wagner won the C class. And the fastest old fart was Tom Eidem.


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OMTRA Meeting Check out www.hillbillygp.com


