Message from the 4-H Military Club Program Manager



Virginia is proud to be one of the nation's 46 states and territories to receive the 4-H Military Club Grant. With a new 4-H military club structure in place and the commitment of the Virginia 4-H Military Club Partners, we charted a path to strengthen support of 4-H clubs for military youth. This includes 4-H support on Army, Air Force, and Navy installations and in communities to reach geographically dispersed military youth.

The new 4-H military club structure has proven to be successful. This structure which includes a Military Club Program Manager and six 4-H Installation Club Coordinators enabled the Virginia 4-H program to enhance reporting and improve how training needs of military staff are determined and addressed. Furthermore, new resources were specifically created to meet the needs of installation staff and military youth.

Over 1,700 military youth in Virginia participate in 4-H. This includes military youth enrolled in county/city 4-H programs and those on military installations. As we improve how we identify military youth who participate in numerous summer camps, special interest clubs, community clubs, school enrichment programs, and military partnership clubs, the number of military youth engaged in 4-H programming can only increase.

On behalf of the Virginia 4-H Military Partnership, we sincerely appreciate the work of our installation club coordinators, county/city staff, military site/center staff, other military staff, volunteers, youth, and families who made this an outstanding year.

Marketing Local 4-H Programs

Marketing conducted by local programs in targeted areas, the distribution of over 1,500 4-H informational bookmarks, and use of the electronic newsletter, "What's Happening in Virginia 4-H" were strategies designed to:

- Increase the number of geographically dispersed youth engaged in community 4-H clubs and programming.
- Build a sense of belonging and connection of on-installation 4-H club members to county or city 4-H programs.

161 members of on and off installation 4-H Military Clubs participated in 4-H opportunities such as camps, achievement night programs, county competitions, State 4-H Congress, county fairs, etc.

(108 Army & 53 Navy)

4-H Mission Mandates Program Impacts

Healthy Living:

- 213 youth incorporated at least one new health or nutrition practice into their daily lives.
- 209 youth increased food preparation skills.
- 111 youth identified ways to say no to tobacco alcohol and illegal drugs when offered a substance.

Citizenship:

- 231 CHARACTER COUNTS! youth participants increased frequency in which they play by the rules and use the same rules for others.
- 173 youth reported or demonstrated improved teamwork skills.
- 160 youth learned the importance of managing money wisely by creating a savings or spending plan.

Science:

- 76 youth gained knowledge about how to research a problem and develop solutions related to robotics, engineering construction, and/or technology.
- 90 youth learned environmental stewardship/responsibilities.
- 173 youth increased STEM abilities such as how to build/construct science related projects and/or problem solve
 and work together. Projects created included flower beds, videos, robots, windmills, turbines, volcanoes, tornado,
 replica of a movie set and/or a rocket.
