Greetings, all!

Now we enter the quiet of our summer period—a great time for reading and reflection. I share this food for thought, a quote that resonated with me from the book <u>Cutting for Stone:</u>

"Not only our actions, but also our omissions, become our destiny."

Oxford Dictionary provides this definition of omission: "a failure to do something, especially something that one has a moral or legal obligation to do." In many religious traditions this becomes the proverbial "sin of omission," or "any lack of conformity to God's law, or failing to do what God commands, which is as grievous as actively transgressing what He commands." Oh my! And on to whatever awaits on Judgment Day as part of that destiny...

By any definition, an omission is a proactive failure. This is not benign neglect; this is a CHOICE. We see this behavior modelled all around us, from the microcosm of family relationships and local politicians to the macrocosm: the world stage of silent

intolerance, the passive disregard of inhumane treatment of others, the choice of not trying, of failing to speak up or act in ways dictated by mutual conscience.

What a world it could be if we all made the positive choice to TRY! Just think if our "omissions" became instead actions for the greater good! Just think if our resultsdriven society were to be immersed in the fullness of positive experience! What an affirmation of our One Human Family for all joined in community!

I wish you all some peace, quiet and moments of reflection this summer. And I wish you the action choice of doing something good, just because you can.

# QUEERLY BELOVED FROM BRAVER/WISER:

"Queer... not as being about who you're having sex with (that can be a dimension of it), but queer as being about the self that is at odds with everything around it and has to invent it and create and find a place to speak and to thrive and to live."

-bell hooks

I accidentally came out in a homily I delivered at Summer Seminary, a Unitarian Universalist program for youth considering becoming religious professionals. I had recently been leaning into my identity as a queer woman of color, and I said as much. I forgot, however, that I hadn't mentioned this fact to my parents yet, who were watching the livestream at First Unitarian in Chicago from their couch in Corvallis, Oregon. When my dad picked me up from the airport a week later, he brought it up almost immediately. "So I wanted to ask... what does queer mean to you?"

I've flirted with a lot of different labels throughout the years, from *ally* to *bisexual* to *lesbian*, but none of them have ever felt quite right. Each has a special place in my heart for the communities I've been in solidarity with and the identities that I've claimed, but I keep returning to the word **queer**.

I've had conversations with LGBT elders about the word queer. Not everyone uses it; some have too many memories of it being used as a weapon against them to have it sit right with their soul. My middle school counselor hated the word because for him, "queer" meant strange and odd.

That's still the first definition that comes up when you Google it. But for me, a mixedrace person of color, a gender expansive relationship anarchist, and of course, a Unitarian Universalist, queer is the perfect word not just to describe my sexuality but every part of me and what I embody.

As I've studied queer theology in seminary, I've actually become more and more convinced that Unitarian Universalism itself is a queer faith, defined not by a creed passed down through generations but by the real-world commitments we make to each other in the present.

Unitarian Universalism "queers" the idea of theology itself, not requiring the *theos* (God) to do the *logos* (talk). Our "God-talk" includes the atheists, agnostics, polytheists, and all those who endeavor to engage in the search for truth and meaning.

My queerness and my Unitarian Universalism are inextricably linked, informing each other at every bend in the road. I wouldn't be who I am without either of them.


#### FROM NANCY 3. HOFFMAN



Professor **Toure' F. Reed**, who has a PhD in History from Columbia University (NY), teaches 20th Century US and Afro-American history at Illinois State University. He is a third generation African American professor, son of the renowned activist professor Adolph Reed. He is the author of *Toward Freedom: The Case Against Race Reduction-ism* (2020) and other books.



**Olúfémi O. Táíwò** is Associate Professor of Philosophy at Georgetown University. He received his Ph.D. in philosophy at UCLA. Táíwò's theoretical work draws liberally from the Black radical tradition, anti-colonial thought, German transcendental philosophy, contemporary philosophy of language, contemporary social science, and histories of activism and activist thinkers. His public philosophy, including articles exploring intersections of climate justice and colonialism, has been featured in at least 10 magazines. Plus several academic

been featured in at least 10 magazines, plus several academic journals. He is the author of *Elite Capture: How The Powerful Took Over Identity Politics* (2022) and other books.



Rev. Jonathan Wilson-Hartgrove, a graduate of Duke Divinity School, is a spiritual writer, preacher, and community cultivator. He serves as Assistant Director for Partnerships and Fellowships at Yale University's Center for Public Theology and Public Policy. He coauthored *The Third Reconstruction* and *White Poverty* with **Rev. Dr.** William J. Barber II, plus has written several book on his own.
