

KINDERGARTEN TO FIRST GRADE SUMMER PACKET

Dear Parents,

Enclosed is a packet of work for your child to complete over the summer. This assignment will be collected the first full week of first grade. Your child will receive a grade for this work. It will be the first assessment in first grade.

This summer you are to read or your child should read at least four books that are age appropriate. A suggested reading list is included in this packet but you may choose from other books that are appropriate to your child's level. The "Reading Log" is to be completed for at least four books. "My Story Report" is a written assignment for your child to complete for one of the books.

Also, included in this packet are the high frequency words that your child was expected to learn this year. All the words on this word list should be reviewed this summer and everyone is expected to be able to read them, most especially, unit 1 to 29 words, color and number words.

Your child is to complete the addition and subtraction worksheet which will be collected in September. Review often, adding and subtracting sums and differences within 5.

Listed below are additional activities to use during the summer months to keep your child's mind active and stimulated. Remember make it fun, never tedious so that they will enjoy the learning.

- 1. Please pray the Hail Mary, Our Father and Angel of God and Glory Be prayers daily. Say grace before and after meals. Go to Mass.
- 2. Review letter recognition and sounds. Have your child practice spelling phonetically. Remind your child that for each sound heard in a word, there is a letter to go with it. Also, remind your child that every word needs a vowel. (a, e, i, o, u) Have your child write stories/sentences and draw a picture to go along with it. Encourage this because it will better prepare your child for first grade. A good time is when you are taking long car rides. That famous, "Are we there yet?" might be avoided.

- 3. Practice printing first and last name and all upper and lowercase letters. Dictate letters for your child to print to help your child remember letters from memory and just not visual recognition.
- 4. Practice counting orally to 100, and counting objects.
- 5. Make sets to 20 and review reading and printing numerals 1 through 20.
- 6. Name numbers that come before, after, between. Identify numbers that are more than and less than.
- 7. Encourage cutting, pasting, and coloring. This will help strengthen the fine motor skills.
- 8. Take your child to the library. Pick books that your child can read and those that you can read to your child.
- 9. Your child needs to practice reading fluently and with expression. Ask comprehension questions about the story.
- 10. Ask about the characters and setting in the story.
- 11. Have your child state the beginning, middle and ending of the story.
- 12. Help them understand the main idea of the story.
- 13. Read to your child regularly and use the above comprehension questions about the stories you read as well as when they read to you.
- 14. Practice identifying and producing rhyming words and naming opposites.
- 15. Review birth date, address, and phone number.
- 16. If your child cannot tie shoes yet, please practice over the summer.
- 17. Review recognition of geometric shapes, both flat and solids.
- 18. Review meaning of left, right, top, bottom, first, middle, last,
- 19. Review spatial relationships; over, under, above, behind, etc.
- 20. Practice finding page numbers in books.

Thank you for your cooperation and active participation in your child's education.


