

Her work demonstrates an emphasis on texture, shape and pattern created by thoughtful composition. It exemplifies the sentiment that you do not have to travel far for wonderful photographic opportunity, as many of her favorite images were created in her own backyard.

Pam is a long-time member and Co-Vice President of the Rockland Photography Club, which has provided the motivation and inspiration that have nurtured her growth as an artist.
