

It is a shotgun style house with a central-ridge, brick chimney and a side-gabled roof. Flush doorways are found in the center of the eastern eave wall and in the south wall of a long, narrow alcove that is covered by a continuous shed roof. Access to the doors is made across a concrete stoop. Windows include 6/6 double hung and		43. History and Significance This is one of four, extant, identical company houses built for immigrant laborers in the Norman Kelley and Co. quarry. The other three (ERI-1709-11) are located east of this structure, and are arranged linearly along a small lane that provided access to other company houses. 6 light single sash and small square attic window under the gable. Windows are set in simple frames. Trim consists of a narrow frieze band under the gable eaves.

Norman Kelley & Co. quarry operated along the south shore from 1869 to 1891 when it was consolidated into the Kelley Island Lime & Transport Co. This structure was probably built between 1872-73 when a total of 16 new houses were constructed by the Calkins and Co. quarry, on the island's north side, and the N. Kelley & Co. quarry on the south side. This was done to accommodate immigrant workers brought in to provide labor for the flourishing limestone trade. Initially, the N. Kelley quarry attracted a predominantly Irish labor force. However, after 1900 the KILT Co. south quarry complex was predominantly Italian. Between 1910 and 1930 this house was occupied by the Feyedelem (See ERI-1716), and later, the Pujalli families. The buildings had cistern water and no electricity. There is some suggestion that these and similar buildings were brought over from the mainland in sections and bolted together in place. This has not been substantiated.

company house (ERI-1716) and south of an early lime kiln (ERI-1533) and horse barn (see ER-338). The setting is now wooded and landscaped. Originally it was situated near the brink of the quarry wall where an access road passed to the north and the narrow gauge railroad grade lay along its west flank. Now access is from Cameron Rd., but continues to front to the lane running north to the home of Joseph Feyedelem (ERI-1716).
