


Second Reading: Philippians 2:1-13







Remembering, therefore, his death, resurrection, and ascension, we await his coming in glory.



We are trying to find innovative ways for groups to share your story and encourage others to participate. The details of how this will work are below:

Filming of brief information-sharing (and recruiting!) videos – Sat. Oct. 14, 10am-noon

Several committees/groups/individuals have recently expressed a desire to find a new way to communicate information about their groups' activities and/or to recruit much needed extra hands to their work. This would be in addition to the existing communications.

One suggestion, which has been well-received, is to film brief videos (60-90 seconds long) which then could be shared on one or more of St. Paul's web-based platforms (i.e. church's website, FaceBook page, Vimeo channel, HopefortheTriangle link) and which also could be scrolled on the Atrium TV panel. Some post-filming production would be added to clearly identify the group and other relevant details.

Committees, work groups, special project areas and/or any other recognized groups within the church would be welcome to participate in this project. This could include any group which reports in St. Paul's Yearbook or which has formed since the most recent yearbook was published in Feb. 2023. All groups are invited to participate.

We have a volunteer available to film these brief videos at church on the morning of Sat., Oct. 14th, from 10-12noon. [We have another volunteer who is willing to help with post-production editing.]

We are requesting that, at a minimum, each video will cover the following information:

- who the group is,
- the group's core tasks/responsibilities,
- and contact person information.

The contact person, or their designee, would be the person being filmed and sharing this information. There will be an opportunity to include visuals, either during the filming or added in during post-production. You might want to practice the filming process yourself using your cell phone... 90 seconds will go by quickly! Note: If you're camera-shy, we can film the video and edit it to a voice-over with added photos!

We're hoping all groups will want to avail themselves of this unique opportunity to share the passion you all have for your area of ministry at St. Paul's!
