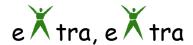

Between the Lines - Featured Book Becoming Mrs. Rogers

Cindi Rogers shares her family's navigation into the world of Fragile X Syndrome in Becoming Mrs. Rogers. This is a comprehensive book of their journey - the surprise Fragile X diagnosis of their sons Jake and Joe all the way through to the hope they continue to have utilizing an important toolbox in their adult sons' daily lives.

Many of you will see your own families in the early chapters of this book. The years before realizing something was unique about your family, the confusing diagnosis journey, hitting survival mode post diagnosis. Families affected by Fragile X and also autism spectrum and other disorders will find comfort that their journeys have many

similarities with the Rogers family's journey.

Becoming Mrs. Rogers is segmented into three parts and 46 short chapters. This is a great thing for busy families affected by Fragile X. You can definitely find time to read this book, even if it needs to be done in small chunks. If you're not as interested in the most emotional sections about searching for a diagnosis and coming to grips with it, you can skip to the areas where the tools and hope are carefully laid out for you.

Cindi's toolbox is one that is unique to her family just as each family's journey is especially unique. She meticulously lays her tools out with explanations for each one. Her straightforward instructions on using them makes it easy to take one or all and add them to your own toolbox! This section of the book is not just for families though, anyone who works with individuals with a Fragile X diagnosis can benefit from these tools as well.

This book is a must have, not just for families affected by Fragile X and similar disorders, but also for extended family members and all persons supporting Fragile X families. As parents of children with Fragile X, we have already been putting some of Mrs. Rogers' tools to good use and plan to implement more. Come become a part of Mrs. Rogers' neighborhood!

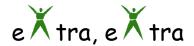

Upcoming Fragile X Research Opportunity for Fragile X Dads!

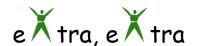
Kate Partynski is a second-year, counseling graduate genetic student at the University of She has chosen to Michigan. focus her research project on Fragile X syndrome. Her study will explore fathers' experiences with Fragile X syndrome in an effort to better understand family adaptation to a child's diagnosis. Previous studies have suggested that mothers and fathers have different experiences in parenting a child with Fragile X, but no research published has investigated specifically how fathers' parenting experiences and resilience may impact overall family dynamics, such as family communication, marital satisfaction, and quality of life. Kate's study hopes to identify coping strategies and paternal factors that help families adapt to positively diagnosis of FXS. Her study will

be an online survey that will likely be available in early fall.

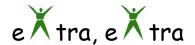

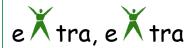

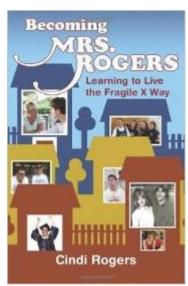
