

ALCOHOL AND CRIME IN WYOMING: 2022

April 2023

The Wyoming Association of Sheriffs and Chiefs of Police has been collecting and analyzing substance-involved data from persons who have been arrested and booked into county detention facilities in Wyoming since 2005. The Association publishes the results of the analysis each year in two reports. These reports provide the data analysis necessary for state and community leaders, prevention specialists, and law enforcement administrators to devise and implement effective strategies to reduce substance-involved crime in Wyoming. This project was managed by Johnson and Associates of Douglas, Wyoming. The report was authored by Ernest L. Johnson, Director of Services.

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PREFACE


This is the third year in a row that a Preface has been included in this report. It was necessary to do so because of the extraordinary changes to everyday life brought about by the COVID-19 pandemic in 2020 and the subsequent Delta and Omicron variants in 2021 and 2022. These changes must be considered when comparing this year's arrest statistics with previous years.

Disagreement continues to exist among the health experts on whether the virus in our country, and in our state, has transitioned into the endemic stage – meaning that COVID-19 may never disappear and that it may be with us forever. However, it does appear that most citizens in Wyoming have now begun to resume a more “normal” routine of daily activities. Wearing masks is no longer required or the norm and restrictions for large public gatherings or events are no longer in effect. Whether arrest statistics in the coming years will revert to pre-pandemic levels or will continue to maintain at the current level is yet to be determined.

It should be noted that nationally, it was estimated that alcohol consumption during the early months of the pandemic increased by 14%¹. In Wyoming, alcohol consumption continued to increase even though state and local health orders closed or restricted occupancy and hours of operation for liquor establishments for much of the first year of the pandemic. It is estimated that only 670 out of 1295 liquor licenses were in operation during the time that the COVID-19 Health Orders were in effect.




The chart below tracks the liquor sales in Wyoming for the past five years as reported by the Liquor Division of the Wyoming Department of Revenue. Overall, the liquor sales in Wyoming have increased by \$32,972,170 since 2018.

The Wyoming Association of Sheriffs and Chiefs of Police has been collecting substance-involved arrest data in Wyoming and publishing the results each year since 2005. This collected crime data has been useful for identifying trends for substance abuse in Wyoming communities. After experiencing a seven-year decline in the percentage of alcohol-involved arrests, the percentage began to increase in 2019. Whether it was a result of the COVID-19 pandemic or just a continuation of the increase that was experienced in 2019 - the percentage of alcohol-involved arrests in Wyoming increased in 2020 and again in 2021 - but decreased slightly in 2022 as Wyoming citizens began to return to pre-pandemic “normal” daily activities.



INTRODUCTION

The Wyoming Association of Sheriffs and Chiefs of Police has been collecting substance-related data from persons booked into county detention facilities in Wyoming since 2005. The data-collection process has been refined since that initial effort and has now been institutionalized as a part of the book-in process year-round for all custodial arrests.

The Association instituted a process in 2019 that allows agencies to submit reports electronically and online. This data-collection method replaced the hand-filled paper forms that were submitted weekly by postal mail. This electronic method of data-collection provides real-time reporting, adds additional data fields to the reporting form and promotes more complete reporting. Only one agency in the state (Park County Sheriff’s Office) did not submit reporting forms.




Alcohol and Crime in Wyoming - 2022

This report analyzes the arrests that were reported as a part of this project and this analysis may not represent the actual total number of arrests made in some counties or jurisdictions. Please contact your Sheriff or Police Chief if you have questions about the data reported for your community.

This report contains an analysis of substance-related data for “FIELD” arrests in twenty-three counties in Wyoming from January 1 through December 31, 2022. “Field” arrests are arrests that are made on-scene during a citizen encounter with law enforcement and more likely to have substance involvement. It does not include arrests made by warrant.

There were an additional 7,356 reported arrests that were made by warrant. These are mostly re-arrest situations ordered by the court and comprised approximately 45% of all reported book-ins in county detention facilities in Wyoming in 2022.

Information was collected from a total of 9,080 persons who were arrested and subsequently detained in a county detention facility because of a field encounter with law enforcement. Information has now been collected from a total of 250,020 persons who were arrested and subsequently detained in a detention facility in Wyoming during the last nineteen years. Information collected focuses on whether substances (alcohol and other drugs) were involved before and/or during the arrest.



The Wyoming Association of Sheriffs and Chiefs of Police publish the results and analysis of the data-collection efforts each year in three separate reports:



EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

This Executive Summary highlights a few of the significant findings contained in this report. It focuses on issues that are of obvious concern or which may be of greater public interest; however, a careful review of other relevant findings and statistics contained in the main body of this report is essential to gain a more complete perspective of the impact of alcohol on crime in Wyoming.

The profile of the average person taken to jail in Wyoming continues to be relatively consistent with previous years. About three out of four times it was a male (females have increased incrementally in recent years), the average age is 37. 15% of the time it was an out-of-state visitor and 7% of the time it was an in-state visitor. Juvenile arrests resulting in incarceration in a detention facility accounted for 1.5% of the total reported custodial arrests (139 out of 9,080).




A review of the data collected from persons arrested and subsequently taken to jail indicates that Wyoming continues to be relatively safe from what is generally considered to be “serious” crime. The number of persons who are arrested for felonies is relatively low when compared to the number of persons arrested for minor crimes (misdemeanors). However, felony arrests have increased incrementally in recent years and now account for 15% of the reported arrests statewide.

Although Wyoming is relatively “safe” from what is generally considered to be serious crime (felonies), the high percentage of alcohol-involved arrests, the inordinate number of arrests for public intoxication and driving under the influence, and the high levels of blood alcohol content for drivers arrested for being impaired represent real and significant threats to public safety.

The information collected from a total of 9,080 persons who were arrested and subsequently detained in a county detention facility in Wyoming during 2022 confirms what law enforcement officers who patrol the streets and highways and who respond to calls for service in Wyoming already know from experience – alcohol is the contributing factor most often present in situations that result in someone going to jail.





SUMMARY OF REPORTED SUBSTANCE-INVOLVED ARREST STATISTICS FOR 2022:

- Alcohol was involved in 53.96% of all reported custodial arrests.
- Methamphetamine was involved in 8.96% of the 9,080 reported arrests.
- Marijuana was involved in 9.36% of all reported custodial arrests.
- Drugs were involved in 21.22% of all reported arrests.
- Arrests reported for public intoxication accounted for 15.09% of all arrests.
- The average blood alcohol content for persons arrested for public intoxication was 0.2244.
- Driving under the influence arrests accounted for 30.86% of all reported arrests.
- The average reported blood alcohol content for DUI arrests statewide was 0.1655²



² In Wyoming, a person driving with a blood alcohol content of 0.08 is legally presumed to be impaired.

- 53% of persons arrested for DUI had a reported BAC level above 0.16 and 14% had a BAC of 0.24 or greater.
- The average reported BAC for 402 persons who were arrested for DUI after being involved in a traffic crash was 0.1770.
- The five-year age group with the highest percentage of DUI arrests was age 31-35 (15.4%), followed by age 21-25 (15%) and 26-30 (13%).

To grasp the significance of the blood alcohol content statistics, it should be noted that a physically fit male who weighs 180 pounds would have to consume at least seven drinks in one hour to achieve a BAC of 0.15 – a female weighing 120 pounds would have to consume four drinks in one hour.

TRENDS ANALYSIS

Even though the number of alcohol-involved arrests has decreased significantly during the last seventeen years, alcohol is still the drug with the greatest impact on crime in Wyoming. Incidents of assaults, disturbances, child abuse, and domestic violence all are heavily influenced by alcohol. After three consecutive years showing an increase, the percentage of alcohol-involved arrests showed a slight decrease this year from the previous year (from 56.76% in 2021 to 53.96% in 2022).



The statistics in Wyoming collected during the last sixteen years clearly indicate that the two crimes that account for the greatest number of custodial arrests in Wyoming are driving under the influence (DUI) and public intoxication. Together these two crimes alone have accounted for an average of 45% of all custodial arrests in Wyoming in the last ten years.



Driving Under the Influence: Driving Under the Influence is, unquestionably, the crime that has the greatest impact and consequence in Wyoming. It accounts for the greatest number of custodial arrests and is the cause of more deaths and serious injuries than any other crime. DUI arrests account for an approximate average of 28% of all custodial arrests in Wyoming each year and a third of all traffic fatalities are the result of impaired driving.

In addition, 34.25% percent of persons arrested for DUI in 2022 had been arrested for DUI previously.

The number and percentage of DUI arrests have decreased statewide during the previous ten years; however, the average blood alcohol content (BAC) has remained at twice the presumptive level of impairment while the involvement of drugs has increased. Arrests for DUI in several counties have consistently been above the statewide average.

Public Intoxication: Public intoxication is viewed by some as just a public nuisance crime; however, incidents of public intoxication present real and significant threats to public safety. The average Blood Alcohol Content (BAC) for Public Intoxication arrests reported in Wyoming in 2022 was 0.2244 – nearly three times the presumptive level for impairment. In some counties, the average BAC for public intoxication arrests in 2022 was even higher.

Alcohol intoxication at these levels often “fuels” behavior that results in more serious crimes than just disturbances and nuisances.

EMERGING TRENDS IN THE TYPE OF SUBSTANCE INVOLVED IN CRIME: Alcohol and/or other drugs were involved in 71.32% of the 9,080 custodial arrests in 2022. Although alcohol continues to be the drug most often present in situations which result in someone going to jail, other drug-involved arrests in Wyoming have increased significantly in recent years.



During the last twelve years in which data is available for a calendar-year period (2011-2022), *the number and percentage of alcohol-involved arrests have decreased - while the number and percentage of other drug-involved arrests have increased.*

Alcohol-involved arrests in 2022 were 8,429 fewer in number than in 2011 (a 63% decrease).

The number of meth-involved arrests has increased each year since 2011 and has almost doubled since then. There were 814 meth-involved arrests in 2022 (there were 420 in 2011).

The four counties with the highest number of reported arrests involving meth in 2022 were: 1) Natrona – 146; 2) Fremont – 112; 3) Laramie – 102; and 4) Campbell – 82.

The Association began collecting marijuana-involved arrest data in March of 2014 to assess the impact on public safety in Wyoming from Colorado's legalization of marijuana. The number of marijuana-involved arrests increased in the first three years, then has continued to decrease.


Marijuana-involved arrests have decreased in number and percentage of arrests since 2017. In 2017 there were 1,970 marijuana-involved arrests (14%); in 2022 there were 850 marijuana-involved arrests (9%).

The four counties with the highest number of arrests involving marijuana in 2022 were: 1) Laramie – 107; 2) Sweetwater – 97; 3) Campbell and Carbon – 83.

Substance-Involved Arrests: Number of Total Arrests



TRENDS IN ARRESTS FOR IMPAIRED DRIVING: The statistics for persons arrested for driving while impaired mirror the recent trends for all substance-involved arrests. The percentage and number of persons arrested for driving impaired has decreased during the last ten years - while the percentage for other drug-involvement for impaired driving arrests has increased.


The average blood alcohol content for persons arrested for impaired driving during the last ten years remains at double the presumptive level for impairment – while the average blood alcohol content for persons arrested for public intoxication remains at almost three times the presumptive level.

Driving Under the Influence Arrests: 2018 - 2022





DUI Arrests with Reported BAC in Each Range

Although the number of DUI arrests have decreased statewide during the last ten years, the percentage of DUI arrests in several counties in the state have been consistently above the statewide average.

PUBLIC CONCERNS


The statistics contained in this report identify significant public safety issues which merit further discussion, analysis and action by local law enforcement, citizens, and state/community leaders.



The high percentage of alcohol involved arrests (54%), the inordinate number of arrests for public intoxication (1,370) and DUI (2,315) and the high levels of BAC recorded for these individuals (average BAC: 0.2244 for public intoxication and 0.1655 for DUI) appear to validate the concerns about alcohol abuse expressed by Wyoming residents in the most recent statewide public opinion survey³.

Some excerpts from the survey that involved 4,798 Wyoming residents:

- 79.7% view alcohol abuse by Wyoming adults as a serious or somewhat serious problem
- When Wyoming residents were asked whether they would support a state law that would prohibit selling or serving alcohol to someone who is obviously intoxicated:
 - 64.3% strongly supported such a law.
 - 17.9% somewhat supported such a law.
- 84.5% of Wyoming residents believe that drinking and driving in their community is a serious or somewhat serious problem.

SIGNIFICANT STATISTICS AND FINDINGS

This report provides statewide statistics and averages, along with comparisons of county statistics in specific categories. In addition, there are approximately one hundred pages of data in a supplemental report that provides county, community, and local law enforcement agency specific statistics.

Detailed charts and graphs included in the Data/Statistics section of this report are helpful in identifying trends involving alcohol-related arrest activity and provide a statistical picture of the circumstances which result in someone being arrested and subsequently taken to jail in Wyoming. The impact of substance abuse on crime statistics varies by county across the state. This report also includes a detailed analysis by county for comparison purposes.

Listed below are a few of the noteworthy statewide averages and county specific alcohol-related statistics and findings from the Data/Statistics section of this report.

- **Alcohol was a factor in 54% of the custodial arrests in Wyoming.**
 - Counties with significantly higher statistics:
 - Teton – 85.65%
 - Fremont – 73.28%
 - Park – 68.85%

- **Methamphetamine was involved in 8.96% of the arrests statewide.**
 - Counties with significantly higher number of meth-involved arrests:
 - Natrona - 146
 - Fremont – 112
 - Laramie – 102

- **Drugs (other than alcohol) were involved in 21.22% of the reported arrests statewide.**
 - Counties with significantly higher drug-involved arrests:
 - Natrona – 280
 - Laramie – 268
 - Campbell – 210

- **Marijuana was involved in 9.36% of the arrests statewide.**
 - Counties with significantly higher marijuana-involved arrests:
 - Laramie – 107
 - Sweetwater – 97
 - Campbell and Carbon – 83

- **Arrests for Public Intoxication accounted for 15.09% of all arrests statewide.**
 - Counties with significantly higher statistics:
 - Fremont – 430 (36.01%)
 - Laramie – 247 (16.88%)
 - Natrona – 202 (15.27%)

 - Counties with significantly higher number of drug-involved traffic crashes:

- **The average BAC reported for 402 arrests involving traffic crashes that involved alcohol was 0.1770.**
- **53% of the persons arrested for driving under the influence had an average blood alcohol content above 0.16.**
- **253 persons were arrested for DUI with a BAC of 0.20 or higher.**
- **177 persons were arrested for DUI with a BAC of 0.24 or higher.**
- **30.34% of persons arrested for DUI had been arrested for DUI previously.**




JUVENILE/ UNDERAGE DATA

The data in this report does not represent a complete accounting of juvenile arrests as these arrests often do not result in detention in a county facility.



132 underage youth were taken into custody and placed in a detention center this year for being a minor in possession of alcohol. The average BAC was .1361.

152 underage youth were arrested for driving under the influence – 29 of these arrests involved drugs. The average BAC was .1297. Twenty of the underage youth arrested for DUI were juveniles.



- 5% of all persons arrested for driving under the influence (DUI) were under the age of 21.
- Juveniles accounted for 1% of the arrests statewide (116 total).
- 44.60% of the juvenile arrests involved alcohol (62 total).
- One of the juvenile arrests involved methamphetamine.
- Ten of the juvenile arrests involved marijuana.
- 12.90% of the juvenile arrests involved drugs (15 total).

PROJECT DESIGN AND IMPLEMENTATION



The Wyoming Association of Sheriffs and Chiefs of Police contracted with Johnson and Associates, a Wyoming based management consulting firm, to manage and staff this project – to create the master database, to analyze the data and to author the three reports. The Association has contracted with Johnson and Associates to manage and staff this project since its inception.

A task force comprised of administrators and detention facility personnel from each of the county law enforcement agencies involved in the initial data collection efforts in 2005 determined the scope and intent of the project and provided specific direction for its implementation. In the following years, Association members were involved in deciding the appropriate fields for collection of data, selecting the subject areas that would be targeted for analysis and refining the process and procedures for collecting the information.

The master database for this project was created in a manner that will allow “harvesting” of additional information in the future should a need arise. The data in this report is presented by “county” and by “department,” by actual numbers and percentages, and by various categories of interest. The information was assembled in this manner to assist law enforcement administrators, as well as community leaders, to better analyze the information and to facilitate follow-up inquiries of notable concerns.

DATA COLLECTION

A one-page reporting form consisting of fill-in or checked boxes was constructed for this project and refined over the years. It is estimated that the form requires the booking and/or arresting officer two-to-three minutes to fill out during the book-in process. Specific information that is collected during the book-in process include: type of offense, whether alcohol was involved, whether drugs were involved, location of last consumption and point of sale, known blood alcohol content levels for arrests involving public intoxication, driving under the influence, minors in possession, and demographic information. (A sample of the reporting form is included in this report)



Alcohol and Crime in Wyoming - 2022

In 2019, the Association transitioned from a hand-filled paper form submitted weekly by postal mail to an electronic form submitted online. The reporting form contains instructions for completing and processing the completed reporting forms. In addition, all agency staff who were assigned the responsibility to oversee their agencies' data collection were provided individual orientations.

A total of 9,080 reporting forms for "field" arrests were submitted by the twenty-three counties during the twelve-month data collection period January 1 through December 31, 2022. An additional 7,356 reporting forms were submitted for warrant arrests. These are mostly re-arrest situations ordered by the court and comprised approximately 45% of all reported book-ins in county detention facilities in Wyoming in 2022.

However, as mentioned previously in the INTRODUCTION section of this report, there was one agency that did not submit reports for this project. Park County Sheriff's Department decided in 2019 to not participate in this project and no longer submits reports.



This report analyzes the arrests that were reported as a part of this project and this analysis may not represent the actual total number of arrests made in some counties or jurisdictions. Please contact your Sheriff or Police Chief if you have questions about the data reported for your community.



DATA /STATISTICS

All information contained in the reporting forms that were submitted by the participating counties was entered into a master database by day and by month. This information was subsequently assembled by category, by county, and by department to facilitate appropriate comparisons and further analysis.

A detailed breakdown of information for each county is available in a separate Supplemental Report.⁴ A sample of the county statistics is included in this report. Laramie County was selected as the sample to be included as this county generated the greatest number of arrest statistics.

PLEASE NOTE: Cheyenne Police Department policy allows misdemeanor DWUI offenders to be cited and released if the arrestee’s vehicle has been impounded or turned over to a responsible adult and if the driver is released to a sober adult. These additional arrests statistics have not been included in the DUI statistics in this report (as they were not booked into a detention facility).








Alcohol Involved Arrests as a Percentage of All Arrests by County

(Bold line indicates statewide percent - 53.96%)




Other Drugs Involved as a Percentage of All Arrests by County

(Bold line indicates statewide percent - 21.22%)




Public Intoxication Arrests as a Percentage of All Arrests by County

(Bold Line indicates statewide percent - 15.09%)




DUI Arrests as a Percentage of All Arrests by County






DUI Arrests with Reported BAC in Each Range

Number of DUI arrests with BAC in each Range








Given: Number of DUI arrests in range, percent of all DUI arrests

DUI BAC by Gender




Traffic Crashes - Alcohol Involved




