Dear brothers and sisters in Christ,

Given the amount of snow we have received in January, I thought it might be helpful to recall our usual practice on closure.

On Sunday we will have worship at the stated time(s). In the unlikely event that we need to close; e.g., because the parking lot is impassable or no heat or no electricity, the closure message will be posted on our Facebook page (www.facebook.com/augustustrappe.org) by 7:00 am. On Sunday, when in doubt, consult www.facebook.com/augustustrappe.org.

On weekdays, if the Perkiomen Valley School District closes, Augustus automatically closes. The school district has much better information about regional road conditions than we do at Augustus. On weekdays, when in doubt, consult www.pvsd.org.

Ash Wednesday falls on February 18, 2026. Our service, led mostly by the Confirmands, begins at 7:00 p.m. Please be present to support our Confirmands in their faith development.



The Congregational Meeting will be held on Sunday, February 8, 2026, at 11:30 a.m. in the Brick Church Nave. In addition to the usual reports, we will vote on the Revised 2026 budget and changes to our constitution mandated by the ELCA, most of which are minor. The Vestry will also ask for authority to respond to a request from the Borough of Trappe. The bulletin of reports for the meeting will be distributed after each service on Sunday, February 1, 2026. We do not anticipate a long meeting. Usually, the February meeting lasts 15 minutes. This year it may last 30 minutes. Your attendance is requested so we have a quorum for conducting business.

I would be remiss if I did not remind you of the gentle request from our General Treasurer in her year end letter to you. Augustus has not asked its members to consider increasing their giving in quite a number of years. The generosity of our members and friends is praise-worthy. Given the increased costs to conduct our ministry, we are asking you to see if it might be possible to increase your giving. Even a small amount from each person will help keep us running smoothly.

From the Bench:

The Augustus Chorister Program

As you well know, parents and their children have so many options to choose from when considering extracurricular activities these days! And we're blessed with many options to match our children's many interests. The challenging part is, of course, deciding which activities to participate in and making sure that we're not over-scheduling.

Regarding activities related to music, academic research consistently shows studying music provides significant cognitive, academic, social, and emotional benefits. Singing and playing an instrument boosts brain function, improves math/literacy skills, enhances memory, fosters confidence, increases school engagement, and even reduces risks for conditions like dementia!

So, it makes sense when a family is choosing extracurricular activities to consider opportunities in music. I would like to share in this and upcoming articles what makes the Augustus Chorister Program an exciting and unique musical opportunity for our children and youth.

While many choirs rely heavily on rote memory to learn music, the Augustus Chorister Program provides choristers with a solid and systematic curriculum for music literacy. Choristers begin with identifying lines and spaces of a musical staff and progress to mastering higher levels of music theory.

And what is very important is that choristers connect symbols to sound and are taught how to sight-sing. Sight singing is the ability to read and sing music accurately at first glance, without prior hearing. We use the Kodály method for sight singing and incorporate solfège syllables like "do re mi."

And (!!!) all of this is presented in a way that is fun and engaging. The curriculum includes built-in incentives as well as short-term and long-term goals. For example, as choristers progress through the program, they earn medals and ribbons that represent specific levels of achievement. I've included a picture of these ribbons and medals here and will talk more about this in our next newsletter!

In the meantime, please reach out to me regarding any questions you may have about the Chorister Program. We accept new students throughout the year!

Disciples of the Cross

In Ephesians 2:1 and 4, the Apostle Paul writes, “*As for you, you were dead in your transgressions and sins . . . but because of his great love for us, God, who is rich in mercy, made us alive with Christ . . .*” Before Christ, we were dead in sin. Through no effort of our own, we have been made alive “with Christ”!

Now what? Now what, indeed! Yes, Christ has saved us for eternity, but that eternity begins at Baptism. Some of us will spend only a short portion of eternity on earth, others much longer, but all of us are called to make these days count. In the Great Commission in Matthew 28:19, Jesus calls us to “*go and make disciples of all nations.*” He asks us, empowered by Word and Sacrament, to carry on his work.

There are many facets to the work of the Church. Not all of us are preachers and teachers of the Word, but we read in 1 Peter 4:10 that each of us has a gift and each of us is to use this gift to serve others. Peter speaks of offering hospitality and serving as gifts which God has given to edify the Church. The Apostle Paul writes about spiritual gifts to the Romans, the Corinthians, and the Ephesians, each time stressing the point that we are to use what gifts we’ve been given for the good of the Body of Christ and according to the grace we’ve been given.

Jesus said:

“If anyone would come after me, he must deny himself and take up his cross and follow me. For whoever wants to save his life will lose it, but whoever loses his life for me will find it.” (Matthew 16:24-25).

This is the challenge Jesus issues to each of us individually and to the Church collectively. Alive in Christ, we pick up the cross and, joyfully, just as Jesus, “*who for the joy set before him endured the cross*” (Hebrews 12:2), carry it wherever Jesus leads us. There is no life apart from Christ. As disciples of the cross who have found this to be true, let us carry this message to the world.

Tuesday, February 17 at 7 pm St. Luke's Fellowship Church, 200 W. Main St., Trappe



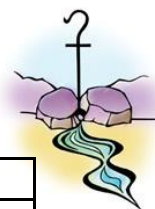
