the Presidents Corner:

If I and the OIHM Board Members thought we would have a quiet fall season where we could catch up on a few lingering projects, how wrong we were! First you may have noticed the new cedar shake roof, nicely done by Duke Construction. For this we used some monies in our Capital Improvement account, aided by a grant from OICF. By the time you read this, we should have completed a major clean-up and re-grade of the southwest corner of the property. Bruce Wiscomb offered to do this using equipment Orcas Excavators has on site at the adjacent Eastsound swale project. He will also bury our hard-to-landscape propane tank, with San Juan Propane donating the underground tank. Many, many thanks to these island businesses for this help.

The OIHM Board recently took a look at our planning priorities, and considered three major projects: I) removing the old vault (located behind the quilt at the

museum front desk, in case you didn't know) and also the artificial pass-throughs between the cabins, resulting in the homestead cabins being stand-alone and centrally accessible, 2) building an equipment storage shed and associated landscaping at the back of our building, and 3) hiring as close to full-time as possible, a Director. The Board chose getting a Director as our top priority, and we are actively looking into some possible funding mechanisms to accomplish this.

Lastly, I recently met with the Visual Arts Committee of the Orcas Center, and I am delighted to announce that the Museum was selected to be the featured display for the month of February. This will kick off with an official opening at Orcas Center on Friday February 3rd. More on this exciting news later.

That's all for now. Hope to see you at Camp Orkila on December 8th!


Saying 'Goodbye' to Jim & Kay Clark
