→ From the Pastor →

"When you reap the harvest of your land, do not reap to the very edges of your field, or gather the gleanings of your harvest. Leave them for the poor and for the foreigner residing among you. I am the Lord your God."

Leviticus 23:22

It's fall! I know that assertion may make some of you grumble. There are many people who prefer the warmth and even humidity of the summer. I am not one of them. The cool, crisp air of the fall invigorates me. I seem to be able to get much more accomplished when I am surrounded by the rusts and golds of the season, and the scent of crisp fall leaves. Add cinnamon to that blend, and I am as happy as can be.



The fall also signals the start of a new school year for many. Kids are getting ready for the return to school, teachers are setting up their classrooms and preparing lessons, and young adults are heading off to college, or entering the work force. To my mind, fall provides an abundance of opportunity for learning and growth. It is because of these possibilities that I chose this particular scripture for this column.

Fall also signals the harvest where that which has been planted can be reaped. For the primarily agrarian society of Biblical times, what was harvested at this time of year had to last through until the next year. Every little bit was precious. This common knowledge is what made God's instructions to

leave some in the field so astounding. All the proceeds of the harvest were needed to ensure survival over the winter. It was unheard of to leave anything behind. And, to leave something behind for a FOREIGNER? Let him care for himself! We don't have anything to spare! Perhaps we could leave some for the poor....that might be doable. But for someone who isn't like us? Who isn't even of our same race? Who may not even believe in God? Why would we do that?

The answer is obvious: because that is God's instruction. God not only provides for the harvesters, but for those who have not done the planting. God provides for ALL, even those who do not yet know Him. Perhaps by making those provisions for the foreigner, that person may come to understand it is God's desire for them to see Him as the God of all people, and so come to believe in Him. Perhaps the poor will see the leavings in the field, and so find another meal they might not have had, and praise God for it. God is giving the harvesters the instructions to leave some behind, so ALL may be fed.

We do not routinely have the poor and the foreigner following us as we harvest our fields. But, the desire to provide for ALL those who have needs still remains in God's heart. ALL are children of God, regardless of where they were born or what their economic status is. How can we, as God's followers, provide for them?

We can start by understanding it is God's instructions that we do this. When we open our hearts to ALL, we are acting on behalf of God. When we have open hearts, we can see the opportunities that are out there to feed those who do not have enough. We can see where we are being called to be disciples in this modern world.

The harvest is plentiful, the laborers are few. Will you share your harvest?

- Rally Day! On Sunday, September 10th, Christian Education will host Rally Day. This is a time where we come back together to kick-start the fall. Throughout the summer, many members and friends have been away on vacation and some of our ministries have been on pause or only with limited gatherings. Rally Day is a great way to get us excited for everything to start back up again! The Christian Ed Committee will provide a light lunch for all, accompanied by a Bible Scavenger Hunt through the Bible. The Committee is also asking for a monetary donation to aid in supporting the weekend backpack program at the school which provides students with non-perishable food to take home at the end of each week.



Twelve hundred British soldiers trapped on a nearby island, with no hope of rescue from Allied ships, waiting to die.






Keith Mallory, world-famous mountaineer, skilled saboteur. His mission: to lead a small team of misfits and silence the guns forever.

Frank begins the season preoccupied with the concerns of any teenage boy, but when tragedy unexpectedly strikes his family—which includes his Methodist minister father; his passionate, artistic mother; Juilliard-bound older sister; and wise-beyond-his-years kid brother—he finds himself thrust into an adult world full of secrets, lies, adultery,

and betrayal, suddenly called upon to demonstrate a maturity and gumption beyond his years.

Told from Frank's perspective forty years after that fateful summer, *Ordinary Grace* is a brilliantly moving account of a boy standing at the door of his young manhood, trying to understand a world that seems to be falling apart around him. 
• Winner, Winner, Chicken Dinner
