

International College of Angiology Founding Fathers and Past Congresses

The founding fathers of the International College of Angiology were Dr. Saul Simon Samuels and Dr. Rene LeRiche. It was Dr. Saul Samuels who in 1942 coined the name "Angiology" from the Greek words meaning the "science of the blood vessels." The International College of Angiology was organized and chartered in 1958, in order to encourage, support, and facilitate research and education in vascular diseases. 


