Acting VA inspector general steps down amid criticism

The acting inspector general for the Department of Veterans Affairs on Tuesday announced plans to step down from the post this week, a day after criticism from a group of whistleblowers that he's done little to uncover fraud and abuse in the agency.

Richard Griffin, appointed deputy inspector general in 2008, has served as the office's acting head since George Opfer stepped down from the job 18 months ago. He retires after more than 43 years of federal service.

Replacing him as deputy in-

spector general will be Linda Halliday, the current assistant inspector for audits and evaluations. Last week, a group of 10 senators petitioned the president to appoint a permanent inspector general for VA to ensure stability and continuity in the office's oversight efforts.

In his retirement announcement, Griffin praised the office's "remarkable record of performance and outstanding achievements," highlighting nearly 2,000 reports over the last six years which have lead to more than 11,000 punitive actions against individuals and \$22.5 billion in "monetary impact" for the department.

But Griffin has faced harsh words from critics in recent years for not doing enough to hold VA leadership accountable for problems regarding patient wait times, overprescribing by physicians, and medical records manipulation.

On Monday, a group called VA

Truth Tellers blasted Griffin for a "pattern of whitewashing and deceit" and called for his resignation. Several lawmakers have also publicly berated the office in recent months for working too closely with VA officials instead of publicly exposing potential wrongdoing.

Griffin did not respond to those accusations in his retirement announcement. The inspector general's office did not return calls seeking further comment.

Officials have struggled to fill VA leadership roles since the resignation of former VA Secretary Eric Shinkseki in May 2014, thanks to a combination of sparse nominations from the White House and slow confirmation work by the Senate.

Halliday has worked in federal government posts for more than 30 years. She has worked in the inspector general's office for the last 23.



GOOD LISTENERS MAKE GOOD HAMS

My dad got me my first shortwave radic in 1960. As a boy, I spent all my time listening to the shortwave and ham bands when I wasn't building radios. I collected more than 400 QSL cards, including Radio Moscow.

In 1967, I joined the Navy and was trained in electronics. My first duty station was in Spain. It was our job to listen and record radar transmissions over Eastern Europe, analyze the signals and develop appropriate counter measures. We flew in unmarked planes and never transmitted.

In 1970, I was transferred to the USS Lexington out of Pensacola. Our mission was to train pilots for day landings and night onto the carrier landings. I worked in Primary Flight Control for the "Air Boss." It was my job to listen on a stereo headset to two frequencies and write the planes' fuel state on a status board. While I was on duty one night, a plane cut into the pattern; he was one mile from the ship and next in line to land. I picked up on the plane's call sign and realized the mistake: The arresting gear wires on the landing deck were set for a different plane! This would be a disaster, ripping the plane apart! I had to think quickly.

I called out to the Air Boss to wave the plane off. He turned and said to me, "Wood, you had better be right!" I responded, "Yes, Sir! Wave him off!" He hit the red deck foul button; red lights flashed on the deck, warning the plane to abort his landing attempt. As he screamed past our window, the Air Boss could see it was in fact the wrong plane. We finished flight ops and nothing was said about a very close call.

Each day when flight ops ended, the Air Boss would go to dinner and leave the Assistant Air Boss to finish up by bringing the helicopters on board. But this day was different. He sent his assistant to dinner and turned to me, saying, "Wood, could you do me a favor and wrap up air operations for me so I can go to dinner?"

I took the Air Boss's seat and picked up the microphone. I called the first helicopter gave its pilot the wind direction and a signal of CHARLIE, clearing him to make his landing. After securing the helicopters on board, my final act was to call down to the Bridge and turn control of the ship back to the Captain. I was only 21 at the time and didn't realize until years later what an honor that had been. After all that listening, it was finally my turn to talk. HOYT WOOD, K4YYY



Then the undertakers locked the casket down, and they rolled it away.


Her friend said, 'i know you weren't fool enough to put all that money in there with your husband.'

For those of you that I haven't mentioned this to, we always referred to The Lex as a "floating public relations campaign" in the 80's. We would spend @ a week and a half in the Gulf each month training pilots then the rest of the time we'd be tied up at the pier on the base. Since we didn't really hold a bunch of "military secrets" and most of our stuff was old news at the time, we'd give tours of the ship from time-to-time and allowed civilians to come aboard. Not sure how or when they scheduled it but, every now and again, you'd walk down through the hanger bay and see a heard of civilians walking through it.
