Recently, eight volunteers spent a Saturday afternoon cleaning up clutter in and around the Research Center.



They renewed the front landscape by trimming & mulching; picked up a garbage bag of trash around the outside of the building; hauled out 15 garbage bags of indoor trash; put a large assemblage of beat up furniture and miscellaneous items on the curb for pickup; broke down and recycled a pickup truck's worth of cardboard boxes; piled up about ten electronic items like old computer monitors for recycling; started re-inventorying the mechanical room; and made a good effort distributing some

The silver trophy cup pictured here has been in the collection of the Orange County Historical Society for a number of years. Little specific information is known about it or the circumstances under which it was given to the Society. The trophy bears the inscription of Marion DuPont Somerville (Marion DuPont Scott) president of the Orange County Horse Show and Racing Association. The trophy was likely presented to one of the 37 class winners at the 30th annual horse show held at the show grounds outside the Town of Orange in July 1929.



The event drew a total of 548 horses from across Virginia and the East Coast, and was attended by the social elites of the county and beyond, as well as several thousand visitors. The Orange Horse Show can trace its roots back to about 1897, when it was held under the auspices of the Orange Horseman's Association.



93 responses




Notes - 2 under 40 (all non-members), 13 in 40-59 group (3 non-members).


Notes- Of 10 members under age 59, 1-far above, 1-above, 5-meeting expectations, 3-below.


