Volunteers Needed!

Don, our maintenance manager has struggled to find summer help and now we have lost our full-time



employee, Luis, who has moved on to work that is more in line with his trained skill areas. Most employers are struggling with being understaffed and we are no exception. There are several opportunities for volunteers to help; we are hoping that residents will consider adopting a common area landscape to rake, fluff and spread fresh bark that Don will deliver. If you and a neighbor are interested in helping, please let us know through the operations phone line extension. Thank you in advance for your commitment to this community.

Several drainage issues have been addressed this month while still more areas will be dealt with as summer approaches.

Tree stump grinding is finishing for the season. We know there are stumps from past tree cuttings that

still have not been taken care of. If you have stumps that are hindering the enjoyment of your lot, please fill out work orders so that we might prioritize them for next year's stump removal.

Nine new trees were planted along the streets of the west side to replace some of the trees that have been removed. The newly purchased dry root trees are doing well and are expected to be ready for replanting around the community in 2 years. Additional trees will be purchased each year so that there are trees available every year in the future. Nine more mature trees will be planted next year as we replace trees that are dying or have overgrown the area they are in. There will be a tree nursery established behind the maintenance shop for easy access to the trees to allow for proper maintenance until trees are ready for placement. Additionally, there are evergreen fir tree seedlings that have been planted for future use.

A reminder that if you have home, shed or deck additions to your lot, please seek out the board for approvals before doing projects and getting permits where necessary. The Goffstown Building inspector will not approve permits that have not been signed off by the board.

Parking issues and speeding continue to be a problem in the community. There is no overnight parking on the streets even in the summer. Parking on the side of the road opposite someone's driveway can make it difficult for residents to get in and out of their driveway. And because our streets are not as wide as streets outside of Medvil, parking opposite another car can make it impossible for emergency vehicles to pass by on their way to the emergency. With the arrival of good weather, more people are walking, so please keep everyone safe by making sure you and your guests are driving within the 15-mph speed limit.

Lawn watering season is upon us. Please make sure your sprinkler system is watering on the proper days, odd number days if your street address is an odd number and even number days if your address is an even number. There really hasn't been a need to water any lawns so far this year except for newly seeded areas, but I see sprinklers running already. Many lawns are a beautiful, healthy green even without sprinklers being turned on yet. With the amount of rain so far this year, we should be conserving water the best we can; going into the season our water bill is over \$14,000 a month. Please do your best to keep the water bill down. It's your money that is paying the bill and your help to preserve low monthly lot fees is important to all of us.

Thank you everyone for doing your part to make Medvil an affordable and beautiful community to live in. Enjoy the great weather that summer brings.

A FEW WORDS FROM THE NOMINATION COMMITTEE

Every position on the board is important, and each one has an equal voice in representing the 301 homes in our community. ROC provides information and training for these positions. Please go to ROCUSA.org and register for an account. They will need your address and the name of your community, (i.e. Medvil Cooperative.) Once you have your login, go to the Rocket tab.

These are the positions that will be on the ballot at the 2024 Medvil Cooperative Annual Meeting:

Vice President:

You do not need business experience to have this role when truly what is needed is organizational and people skills. This role requires you to sit in for the President in their absence and to take on tasks assigned by the President.

Treasurer:

You may assume you need to have financial background to be our treasurer, but our financial reports, all our checks, and payroll are completed by Evergreen, our property management company. The role of the treasurer is to ensure our expenses are coded correctly, and to work with the board to develop the yearly budget. Our budget is based on the previous year's expenses with consideration of price increases, and new capital projects. The Treasurer is also the chair of The Finance Committee whose members meet monthly to review the expenses, make sure the budget is on track, and provide guidance and assistance when needed. And help from our contact at Evergreen is always just a phone call away.

Medvil's administrative assistant is always available to help with office procedures such as filing, making deposits, etc.

Director at Large:

You may think this is the role that gets you a seat at the table. It certainly can be a wonderful way to start on the board, however the officer roles do not require you to have been a director at large. In this role you have an equal vote and choosing this role means you are willing to take on tasks and projects as they come up. We have had former Directors at Large take on finance projects, quoting initiatives, and take leadership roles in committees. It's a great way to learn about Medvil and how we operate, and much more than the 'show up once a month and vote' that some residents believe it to be.

RULE OF THE MONTH

With summer approaching and our monthly water bill already at an all-time high of over \$15,000, we thought it might be a good time to remind everyone about the rule that governs when and for how long lawns can be watered.

Please check your systems to make sure you are watering on the correct day and for the correct length of time.

11) Watering Utilization. Be aware of when and how much you water your lawns. Watering should take place every other day (use your house number and water on the odd or even days accordingly) and is to be limited to twenty minutes (20") per zone. The best time to water is early morning (not during the heat of the day) and not at night because the lawn stays wet for a longer period of time which can promote the growth of moss and affect the health of your grass. Sprinklers must be turned off during rainy or windy weather conditions.

Lawn watering is also subject to the restrictions of the Grasmere Water District:

Water Use

a) Lawn watering is prohibited between the hours of 5:00-8:00AM and 5:00-8:00PM.

b) Watering restrictions apply between May 1 and October 1.

c) Odd numbered homes will water on odd numbered days; even numbered homes water on even numbered days. This ensures that only half of the homes in Medvil are using water during the designated watering times.

d) Homes with automatic sprinkler systems will operate between 3:00 and 4:00AM every other day as outlined above and no more than twenty minutes (20") per each zone. e) Homes with manual sprinkler systems will water each zone for no more than twenty minutes (20") every other day as outlined above.

f) New automatic sprinkler systems should install operating rain sensors set to detect one quarter inch $(\frac{1}{4})$ of rain.

g) Homeowners are responsible for repairs/replacements of any sprinkler heads/piping to a system that does not maintain a one-foot (1') setback from the road.

And a couple of reminders.

Please rake your leaves and mow your lawns! Letters will be sent out to those residents who have not done either (or both) of these tasks and continued neglect could result in fines.

Parking on lawns is prohibited. That means all four tires must always be on pavement.

We appreciate your cooperation.

TASTY TIDBITS

As the weather starts to heat up, let's start with something light. This Strawberry Salad should fit the bill. Another easy, light dish is Linguine with Lemon Sauce, which is quick to make and a delight to the tongue. For those who prefer something heartier, try the Pork Chops; and finally, a simple gluten-free treat for dessert.

Strawberry Tossed Salad

(makes 8 servings)

Ingredients: 1/2 cup canola oil 1/3 cup sugar 1/4 cup cider vinegar 1 clove garlic, minced 1/4 tsp. salt 1/4 tsp. paprika

Pinch pepper

8 cups Bibb or Boston lettuce, torn

8 cups Romaine lettuce, torn

2-1/2 cups fresh strawberries, sliced

1 cup Monterey Jack cheese, shredded

1/2 cup walnuts, chopped and toasted (optional)

Directions:

• For the dressing, place the first seven ingredients in a jar with a tight-fitting lid. Shake until the sugar is dissolved.

• In a large bowl, combine the remaining ingredients.

• Just before serving, shake the dressing again, pour over the salad and toss.

Linguine with Lemon Sauce

(makes 4 servings)

Ingredients:

2 Tbs. butter

1 Tbs. freshly grated lemon zest, plus more for serving

1/2 lb. fresh or dried linguine

4 Tbs. heavy cream

2 Tbs. freshly squeezed lemon juice

2 Tbs. freshly grated Parmesan

cheese, plus extra to serve on the side

Directions:

• Bring a pot of salted water to the boil.

• Heat the butter in a skillet and add the lemon zest.

• Drop the linguine into the boiling water. Cook the pasta according to the package directions. Drain.

• Add the cream to the butter and lemon zest mixture. Add the pasta and lemon juice and stir until just heated through. Add the Parmesan and toss.

• Serve with additional Parmesan and lemon zest on the side.





Pork Chops with Creamy Mushroom Sauce

(Makes 4 servings)

Ingredients: 4 bone-in pork chops, 1/2-3/4" thick, trimmed (about 2 lbs.) 1/2 tsp. salt, divided 1/2 tsp. freshly ground pepper 3 Tbs. extra-virgin olive oil, divided 1/3 cup shallots, minced 8 ounces mixed mushrooms, such as cremini, shiitake & oyster, sliced 1/2 cup dry white wine 1/3 cup half-and-half cream 1/2 cup fresh herbs of your choice, such as chives, tarragon, and parsley, chopped

Directions:

• Sprinkle pork chops with 1/4 teaspoon salt and pepper.

• In a large skillet, heat 1 tablespoon oil over medium-high heat. Reduce the heat to medium and add 2 chops. Cook, turning once, until cooked through, about 5 to 7 minutes. Remove to a plate and tent with foil to keep warm. Repeat with another 1 tablespoon oil and remaining chops.

• Add the final tablespoon oil to the pan. Add the shallots and mushrooms. Cook, stirring frequently until the mushrooms are browned, about 2 to 4 minutes.

• Add the wine and the remaining 1/4 teaspoon salt; cook, stirring up the browned bits on the bottom on the skillet, until the liquid thickens, 1 to 3 minutes.

• Stir in the half-and-half and the herbs; cook until bubbling, about 1 minute more.

• Serve the mushroom sauce over the chops.

Flourless Chocolate Cake

(makes 8-12 servings

Ingredients: 3/4 cup unsalted butter, cut up, plus more for greasing the pan 1 cup semisweet chocolate chips

1/2 cup unsweetened natural cocoa powder3/4 cup granulated sugar4 large eggs1 tsp. pure vanilla extractWhipped cream or ice cream for serving (optional)

Directions:

• Preheat oven to 350° . Generously butter the bottom and sides of a springform pan or press a large sheet of aluminum foil into the bottom and sides of a round 8-inch cake pan, smoothing and generously buttering the foil, leaving an

overhanging handle.

In a large saucepan, bring a few inches of water to a simmer over medium heat. Set a large heat-proof bowl over the saucepan and add the chocolate chips. When the chocolate looks soft and melty, stir gently until smooth. Turn off the heat and add the butter; stir until melted and smooth. Add the cocoa powder and stir until smooth, then take the bowl off the saucepan.

• Stir in the granulated sugar until well-blended, then add the eggs, one at a time, beating well after each addition. Stir in the vanilla, then scrape the batter into the prepared pan and smooth the top.

• Bake until crackly and dry on top and a toothpick inserted 2 inches from the edge comes out clean, 40 to 50 minutes. A toothpick inserted in the center should come out with some crumbs attached.

• Cool, in the pan on a wire rack, then remove the sides from the springform pan or lift out of the pan using the foil handle. Slice and serve warm or at room temperature.

NOTE: To cut very neat slices, freeze the cooled cake until firm; slice and warm in the microwave oven. Serve with whipped cream or ice cream. The cake can be wrapped and kept at room temperature for 3 days, in the fridge for up to 1 week, or in the freezer for up to one month



PLEASE HELP US!

At the recent board meeting, Debbie Cyr explained that there have been reports of 3 or 4 cats on Rachel Circle, and that some residents are unhappy about it. They don't like it when cats get on their porches or under houses. Though the cats travel and can be seen anywhere in the cooperative, Rachel Circle may be particularly attractive to them because some people on that street put out food for them. PLEASE DON'T FEED THE CATS OR WILDLIFE OTHER THAN BIRDS! It is against Medvil rules and can create problems for your neighbors.

In addition to being against the rules, it interferes with our feral cat reduction program. The program works because we have a feeding station for them so they get used to coming to the same spot, making it easier to trap them. Once trapped, they are vaccinated, and spayed or neutered. When people put out food in other areas, it makes this harder to do.

While some people on Rachel Circle are unhappy about the cats, please know that roaming feral cats have always been in Medvil, and because of our project, the number is now only a fraction of what it used to be. There used to be so many more!

DID YOU KNOW ...

At one time, popcorn was banned in all movie theaters. In the early 20th century, cinema owners banned it because it was "loud, messy, and didn't exactly evoke seeing *Madama Butterfly* at the Met." Theaters in the 1920's and 1930's had beautiful carpets and rugs and didn't want popcorn messing that up.

But during the Great Depression, those same theater owners realized how much money they were missing out on from not selling popcorn. Movies were an escape during that time, and popcorn could be sold in-house for 5 to 10 cents a bag, which really helped keep the theaters afloat when those venues not selling popcorn were going under. By 1945, more than half of the popcorn consumed in the U.S. was sold in movie theaters.

At one time, popcorn was considered breakfast food. Milk was added to it, and folks ate it like cereal. Ella Kellog, wife of John Harvey Kellog (who invented Corn Flakes in the early 1900's), was a big proponent of eating popcorn for breakfast.

In 1885, Charles Cretors invented the first commercial popcorn machine. Today, the average cost of a medium bag of popcorn at the movies is \$8.14.
