### Winter Break from December 22, 2025 through January 2, 2026

Please enjoy the time with your family and friends. During the Winter Break administrative office hours vary so please call ahead or email Andrea. There are no classes and no extended day programs running during the break.

### Staying healthy during the Winter Break

Wishing you happiness and health during the holidays. To help keep our students, families, and staff healthy, I want to remind the Sunrise Community about our illness policy. Sick children must stay home while they are ill or haven't fully recovered. This helps reduce the risk of spreading germs. ### January is Re-Enrollment period for your child!

The student re-enrollment period and process for all current families begins January 5th and runs through the 23rd. Once classes resume on January 5th, all Sunrise families will receive an important re-enrollment envelope. The envelope will include a letter outlining the tuition rates for the 2026-2027 academic year and options, along with a returning student application form. Additionally, an email will be sent with the re-enrollment information.

To secure your child's preschool or kindergarten spot for September 2026, please complete the returning student application form and submit it by January 23rd. There is **no fee for re-enrollment of current students**. It's important to secure your child's spot before the new student enrollment begins on January 24th. If you need an application for a younger child, please let me know, as this form is slightly different. Once you receive the re-enrollment information, please contact me with any questions.

## Classroom A Newsletter December 2025

Dear Classroom A families,

Happy Holidays to everyone! We have had a fantastic year so far, and we love seeing the smiling children in our classroom. We are so grateful for every one of you! We wish you a great holiday season and a Happy New Year!

At the end of the month the children participated in a Winter Solstice craft day. Both classrooms got together to read stories and do crafts. We talked about how the winter solstice marks the shortest day of the year and the first day of winter.

### Cultural studies

During the month we learned about **Hanukkah** (this year the holiday occurred from December 15<sup>th</sup> - December 22<sup>nd</sup>). Hanukkah is celebrated for eight days and is a Jewish holiday. The menorah signifies the miracle of lamp oil lasting for 8 days.

**Christmas** occurs on December 25<sup>th</sup> and is a Christian holiday which celebrates the birth of Jesus Christ. The holiday is also a major cultural event focusing on gift giving and Santa Claus.

This month, we also learned about **Kwanzaa**, which runs from December 26<sup>th</sup> to January 1<sup>st</sup>. Kwanzaa is a seven-day, non-religious celebration of family, culture, and community.



### Language

In Language the children are learning about opposites. Opposites are words or concepts that have entirely different meanings, such as hot and cold, big and small, or happy and sad.

### Practical Life

This month in Practical Life, the children enjoyed juicing an orange half. They learned how to twist and squeeze the orange half into the juicer.



After all the juice is in the juicer, the child pours this into a cup and then drinks the freshly squeezed orange juice. Afterwards the child washes the orange juicer and prepares the activity for their next friend.

With this activity the children practice fine motor skills and learn sequencing as they follow a set of directions. It takes concentration to complete this task, and the children feel a sense of accomplishment by practicing and completing this activity independently.



## Kindergarten Corner

This month in Kindergarten, the children are working with the movable alphabet. The teacher shows the children a card, and they have to sound out the words. Once they read the word, they will create it using the movable alphabet appropriately.

## Classroom B Newsletter December 2025

Dear classroom B families,

We have been very busy as December is a shorter month for us at school. The children enjoyed playing outside in the winter weather. With the snow and colder weather, the students are learning to put on their snow gear independently.

We encourage everyone to put on their snowpants first, then boots, coat, hat, and lastly mittens/gloves. They are doing great with this process!



### Cultural Studies

In December, we recognize many different holidays. Hanukkah, Christmas, and Kwanzaa are all observed in December.

#### Hanukkah

Hanukkah is a Jewish holiday lasting eight days. This year, Hanukkah began on December 15th and ended on December 22nd. Each day, families light a Menorah and commemorate the triumph of the Maccabees over the king. After their victory, they began rebuilding, and when it was time to light the menorah, there was only enough oil for one day; however, the small amount lasted eight days, giving the Maccabees time to produce more oil.

#### Christmas

Christmas is celebrated on December 25th. Christmas is a Christian holiday commemorating the birth of Jesus Christ. Many people celebrate Christmas by attending church services on Christmas Eve or Christmas Day.

While Christmas has Christian origins, many other communities also celebrate it. People often decorate their homes with a Christmas tree or colorful lights. Families may choose to give gifts to loved ones or give back to their community.



#### Kwanzaa



Kwanzaa is a seven-day, nonreligious celebration of family, culture, and community that begins on December 26th. Each day honors a particular African-derived principle and ends with a feast called Karamu on New Year's Day. People light a Kinara to recognize one of the seven principles: *Umoja* (unity), *Kujichagulia* (self-determination), *Ujima* (collective work and responsibility), *Ujamaa* (cooperative economics), *Nia* (purpose), *Kuumba* (creativity), and *Imani* (faith).

Many people celebrate by giving handmade or reused gifts to push against consumerism and to bring people together, regardless of economic status.



## Everyday Living

As part of our Everyday Living area, the children often enjoy participating in food preparation activities. Recently, the children have been peeling and cutting carrots. The children first peel the carrot as one activity. After peeling, they choose to do the second activity of cutting up the carrot or save it for another child to cut up. After the carrot is cut and peeled, it will be brought to the snack table for all the children to enjoy.



## Science



In science, we have been learning about hibernation, migration, and adaptations. The children participated in a variety of activities that explored different ways animals prepare for winter. The children discovered that some animals hibernate by sleeping through the whole winter, other animals migrate to a warmer climate for the winter and return home in the spring, and some animals adapt to winter, by growing thicker coats to protect themselves from the harsh winter.

## Language

As the seasons change, we adjust many activities to suit the season. Pin Pushing is a beginning language activity that many children enjoy. Recently, we have been doing winter-based pin pushing, such as a mitten.



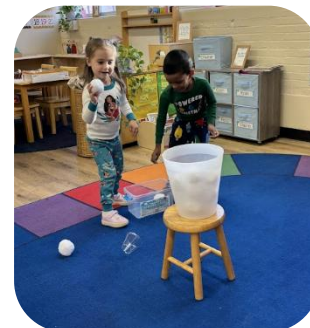
## Kindergarten corner

## December 2025 Extended Day Newsletter

December was a short month for us. We had fun in Art with open-ended crafts like beading and painting. Additionally, we created holiday crafts, such as a paper menorah and foam gingerbread people.

In Science, our group learned how sound travels, what a scientific question is, and what a hypothesis is through our cardboard tube experiment. A scientific question is a curious question about the world that can be tested through experimentation or observation. A hypothesis is an educated guess about what will happen in a scientific experiment based on what you already know. When we speak, our vocal cords vibrate to produce sound. The sound waves spread out and travel to our ears. When talking in a moderate voice (inside voice) into a cardboard tube, the sound waves travel in a straight line, making the sound louder, creating a megaphone effect. In our experiment, our scientific question was: What would happen when we spoke into a cardboard tube? We discovered that our voices become louder. For our hypothesis, we used three different-sized tubes: short, medium, and long. We then guessed which one would make the loudest sound. Seven children guessed the longest, four guessed the medium, and two guessed the shortest tube. We discovered that the longest tube made the loudest sound. Afterwards, everyone had fun taking turns talking into the different-sized tubes.
