Can't wait until March to find out more about these authors? Here's a sneak peek at three of our featured speakers.



ANITA DIAMANT

spent her early childhood in Newark, NJ, and moved to Denver when she was 12. She graduated from Washington University in St. Louis, Missouri with a BA in Comparative Literature, followed by a Master's degree in English from the State University of NY at Binghamton. She now resides in the Boston area. Anita is an award-winning journalist whose work has appeared in the Boston Globe and Boston Magazine, among others. She is the author of numerous nonfiction guides to contemporary Jewish life. Her first book was The New Jewish Wedding, written in the year following her own wedding. She is the founding president of Mayyim Hayyim, a reinvention of the ancient Jewish tradition of mikveh, ritual immersion in water. In 1997, Anita published her first work of fiction, The Red Tent. The book quickly became a word of mouth bestseller, thanks to reader recommendations, book groups and independent booksellers. There are editions of that book in more than 25 countries. Her subsequent novels are Good Harbor, The Last Days of

Dogtown and Day After Night. Anita's newest novel is The Boston Girl.

GREG ILES

was born in Germany, where his father ran the US Embassy Medical Clinic during the height of the Cold War. He grew up in Natchez, Mississippi, graduated from the University of Mississippi and still resides in Natchez. He wrote his first novel in 1993, a thriller about Nazi war criminal Rudolf Hess, which became the first of 12 *New York Times* best sellers. His novels have been translated into more than 20 languages and published in more than 35 countries worldwide. Greg's newest book, *Natchez Burning*, brings him back to us after a five-year absence, of which three of those years were spent recuperating from a near fatal car accident that caused him to lose his right



leg just below the knee. This latest book soared to the top of the bestseller list the first week of publication, making it his 13th *New York Times* bestseller. Ken Follett called it "the best thriller in years." *Natchez Burning* is the first of an epic trilogy and was picked as a Best Book of 2014 by several publications, among them Amazon and iBooks. Greg is a long time member of the Rock Bottom Remainders, a lit-rock group made up of bestselling authors such as Scott Turow, Stephen King, Dave Barry, Amy Tan, Mitch Albom, Ridley Pearson and quite a few others, who, as any of them will tell you, luckily write books better than they play music. The Remainders did their final performance on August 6, 2012, but will reunite to perform at the Tucson Festival of Books on March 13, 2015.

CHRIS TOMLINSON

is a *New York Times* bestselling-author, filmmaker and journalist living in Austin, Texas. He writes a twice-weekly column for the *Houston Chronicle*. Chris served in the U.S. Army from 1983-90 as a military intelligence analyst. Tomlinson started with the *Associated Press* in 1995 as the Central Africa correspondent based in Kigali, Rwanda, where he covered the aftermath of the 1994 genocide, the civil war in Burundi and a rebellion in the Congo. Drawing on his experience as a U.S. soldier, the AP assigned Tomlinson to cover the invasion of Afghanistan in 2001 where he reported from Tora Bora. He covered the military build-up in the Persian Gulf and was chosen as the *AP's* lead embedded reporter for the 2003 invasion of Iraq. He was the East Africa bureau chief from 2004-2007, responsible for text, photo and television coverage in 14 countries. Chris was a Correspondent-at-Large for The *Associated Press*, conducting

special investigations from 2007-2009. He has also covered stories as diverse as an Ebola outbreak, the tsunami, civil war in Somalia and scuba diving. When Tomlinson returned home to Texas, he decided that he wanted to uncover the truth about a story that had long fascinated him personally - his family's history as slave owners. Chris Tomlinson's bestselling book *Tomlinson Hill* tells the story of two Tomlinson families, one black and one white, who trace their ancestry to the same central Texas slave plantation. He is also the producer of *Tomlinson Hill: Are We Equal Yet*, an award-winning documentary film that examines how race still shapes the community where his family's slave plantation was located. Chris Tomlinson has a Bachelor's degree in Humanities with Special Honors from the University of Texas at Austin and has been presented with numerous awards for his writing and reporting.



Our February author, Phyllis Greenbach, has written a book based on the lives of two Jewish families that converge over an adopted child. A

sealed adoption agreement is breached, and the birth mother and adoptive mother are forced to confront each other's complicated histories. Spanning seventy years and two continents, the tragedies and triumphs of both families are woven together, ultimately leading to redemption.

Her book, *The Blessing and the Curse*,is written from the author's point of view, as one of the mothers. It cracks open the facade of family life, digging deeper into who we are and why. Her book is about the ups and downs and the real life dramas that funnel our choices and define us.



Concerts and Conversations

Monday, February 9, 2015 - 1:00 - 2:30 pm Our final concert this year features Violinists Lan Qiu and Joy Pan

The 2014-15 season concludes with Phoenix Symphony Violinist Lan Qiu (pronounced CHO) and his wife, violinist Joy Pan. Both born in China, they met in Arizona, have active concert and teaching careers and are known for bringing their passion for classical music in duet concerts to a variety of venues across the Valley.

They will perform selections for two violins from the Baroque era to current popular repertoire and will also perform individually in Sarasate's *Navarra*, *Remembrance* from *Schindler's List* and *Nigun* by Ernest Bloch. They will be accompanied by pianist Zhou Jiang, a doctoral candidate at the ASU School of Music.

The couple became honorary members of Beth Ami Temple on November 21, 2014, when Rabbi Arthur J. Abrams and the board of directors presented them a certificate of membership. Lan has played five years of Kol Nidre at Beth Ami and they both played a fundraising concert a week after their return from their honeymoon. The certificate reads, "Beth Ami Temple honors Lan Qiu and Joy Pan for their love of our people and all humanity." They will entertain us and then engage us in conversation as they answer our questions. A reception will follow the recital.

Joy Pan, Violinist

Violinist Joy Jia Ye Pan is well known in the Valley as a top freelance artist and devoted teacher.

Born in China, she began her musical training at the age of

four and at thirteen won the national entrance competition into the Shanghai Conservatory, one of the country's most prestigious schools. She received her Bachelor of Music degree from Andrews University in Michigan and her Master of Music degree in Violin Performance from the ASU School of Music.

She has served as concertmaster and often soloist with many local orchestras and is currently the concertmaster for the La Forza Chamber Orchestra, based in Scottsdale. Her honors include winning the Young Artist Competition in Michigan in 1993 and 1995 and Musician of the Year with the Chandler Symphony Orchestra in 2009.

Ms. Pan is the founder of the professional string ensemble Joy Strings, which she has led for many years in concerts throughout the greater Phoenix area.

Lan Qiu, Violinist

Vincent Lan Qiu won his position in the first violin section with the Phoenix Symphony in 2003.

A 1989 graduate of the Central Conservatory of Music in Beijing, China, he won the National Youth Violinist Competition the



following year. In 1987, he began performing with the China National Symphony Orchestra, now known as the China Central Philharmonic, and served as its acting concertmaster until 2000. He toured and performed with the orchestra in many countries in Europe, Asia and North America. In 1996, he was elected as the Outstanding Young Artist of China in 2006, he was honored with an invitation to return to his home country to perform at the First Shanghai Worldwide Chinese Artist New Year's Concert.

After earning his American citizenship, Qiu performed the National Anthem with violist Dwight Lear for the Diamondback game at Chase Field on August 5, 2010.

Learning from past epidemics: What can smallpox tell us about Ebola?

Dissecting the social and civil liberties issues of the Ebola outbreak

As medical volunteers return to the United States after treating Ebola patients in Africa, confusion about the disease and how it is transmitted has raised public anxiety levels and public health questions. Michael Willrich, the Leff Families Professor of History at Brandeis and author of the award-winning book "Pox: An American History," which chronicles the smallpox outbreak at the turn of the 20th century, says the public's reaction to Ebola isn't unexpected.

BrandeisNOW sat down with Willrich to discuss the parallels between the U.S.'s response to the smallpox and Ebola epidemics.

How did the smallpox outbreak advance the field of public health in America? Smallpox is central to the development of the public health field. The very first vaccine was developed for smallpox. My book "Pox" focuses on a wave of smallpox epidemics that swept across the U.S. between 1898 and 1903, killing thousands of people and disrupting trade. The epidemics became politically explosive, generating a strong government response at the local, state and federal levels, as public health authorities enacted compulsory vaccination measures. People who were opposed to compulsory vaccinations took to courts and the public square to challenge the government. Though the courts sided with public health, the cases did also lead to new safeguards for individual liberties that ensured that future measures would be applied more fairly and safely.

As we await the vaccine for Ebola, on what grounds today can the government mandate compulsory vaccinations?

The power and the duty to prevent the spread of contagious diseases is part of the police power, a very old tradition rooted in common law, which holds that the state and local governments can interfere with liberty and property rights when the general welfare requires it. The strongest case for the police power

in American history was always public health. The courts often compared the police power to the duty of a government to prevent an invasion. This power was originally designed to stay mostly at the state and local level, not the federal level.

Quarantining today seems to be almost as controversial as compulsory vaccinations were during the smallpox epidemic. What are your thoughts on how quarantine is being used today to treat Ebola?

Its use can certainly be dramatic. Recently, the Liberian government quarantined the city of Monrovia's poor West Point community, isolating an entire district of the city. In examples such as this, we see why quarantining can be so controversial with the public. It has been applied in such discriminatory ways, often used against marginalized groups.

In American history, quarantine is both common and controversial because it restrains personal liberty. It's a temporary detention, an inconvenience and can sometimes be dangerous, as suspected disease carriers who are in fact healthy can be quarantined among the sick. Today, with the spread of vaccines and antibiotics, it has become an uncommon public health technology. It hasn't been seen as necessary or effective, particularly when applied on a large scale. It's an incredibly blunt instrument. And it's too easily politicized.

If quarantine is so ineffective, what do you think that says about our preparations, political or otherwise, for Ebola?

It's striking how slow international institutions were to respond to an outbreak that was reported as early as last March. The very limited use of quarantine in the U.S. so far (at this point they've only been issued by various state governors) has not been clearly thought out, in my opinion. They're understandable, but problematic because they have heightened public

fear about Ebola during the Midterm elections. For a while, the Ebola panic entered the political process and seemed in danger of spinning out of control.

What civil rights lessons from the past can we apply to today as volunteers return to the U.S. after treating Ebola patients in Africa? Cases like that of Kaci Hickox, the nurse who returned from Africa and was forced into quarantine, are interesting. She felt her human rights were violated. Though she understandably has strong feelings and the order for quarantine may have been ill-thought out, it's not at all clear that the order was unconstitutional. The history of smallpox and other diseases offers us lessons, especially the importance of public education. It's a vitally important part of the responsibility of public health to educate the public about diseases and manage fear and public expectations. In terms of rights, anyone subject to quarantine has the right to basic due process and to have their detention reviewed by a court of law.

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
