# DAI LOY CAMBLING HOUSE MUSEUM

"The Dai Loy Gambling House Museum is located in the Sacramento River Delta in Locke, Sacramento County. Locke is the only intact Chinese community in the United States which was both founded and in the early years wholly populated by Chinese. Although gambling houses were once popular and populus in the Delta, the Dai Loy Gambling House is the only gambling house in the area which has been restored."

The Museum was opened for the 1984 season on March 10th. By June 14th, 6,642 visitors had toured the Dai Loy. Among those groups welcomed by Clarence Pratt were 18 classes from the Pittsburg School District, 4 classes from Bates School in Courtland, and one class each from Galt and Watsonville. [The Watsonville youngsters earned money to make the trip to Sacramento where they stayed overnight and the following day visited the museum in Locke.] The Exploration Cruise Line ships dock at Locke every three days during the season, and from 68-83 passengers visit the museum each stop. The ship has a capacity of roughly 80 passengers. Clarence, as of June, has scheduled another four groups to tour the museum this summer.

Other special guests visiting the museum have been the following: Brian Kenny of New South Wales, Australia, who is associated with the Australian Department of Agriculture Land Management Bureau and is currently studying at UC Davis; Vyolet Chu, president of the Chinese American Historical Society and member of the Asian Art Commission and the Asian Art Museum in San Francisco; Jet Lowe, a photographer for the Historical American Buildings Survey and Engineering Record, a division of the National Park Service, who recorded Locke for the Smithsonian Institution; Kenneth Payton, a staff writer for the Sacramento Bee, who took pictures of school children visiting the Museum and collected story material for an article which was published in the Out and About section on June 21 entitled "Locke's Last Domino"; and the University of California Chinese Alumni Association who toured the museum and donated \$100.00

Mary Fulster is in charge of staffing the Dai Loy Museum this year. Each member is asked to sit at least once during the season. Everyone is urged to support Mary and the Museum by doing his share. A special thank you from the Board of Directors is extended to Jim Dahlberg, Bob Peters, Jim Gualco, and Don Quesenberry for pre-opening cleaning on March 6.

Jean Harvie, Jean Brown, and Jo Lyman undertook a Postcard Project to add to the interest of visitors at the museum. Jo drew picutres of the four musical instruments displayed at the museum, and Jean Harvie wrote the captions with Jean Brown's expert help. Jo then had the cards printed. Many thanks to all! The postcards are very attractive and selling well. They are offered at the museum along with the four booklets: Locke, the Dai Loy Museum, the Delta, and Walnut Grove.

The four booklets have attracted attention also from others. The Bancrott Library at the University of California, Berkeley, placed a set in the Library's California Collection and sent the Society a note of thanks for the donation. The Denver Public Library in Colorado budgeted \$25 to purchase the same four booklets, which were sent to the Library at the more modest charge.

History Week will be August 4th through 12th this year. Sponsored by the Sacramento County Historical Society, the celebration will recognize the contribution to the growth of the city of Sacramento by the breweries which provided employment for hundreds over the years. The Board of the Society is considering keeping the Dai Loy Museum open the entire week and presenting a slide show at the Museum.

### EARLY AMERICAN RIVER NAMES

Gabierel De Portola named the river Rio de la Llegas (river of sorrow). Jedediah Smith named it Wild River, after the "wild" Indians. Capt. Cooper's name for the river was Rio de 'Obju', River of Hunters in a Russian-style dialect. Finally, its last name was granted: Rio de los Americanos, named for the so-called revolutionary proclivities of the Americans as exemplified in the 1846 Bear Flag Revolt.

### MORE ON THE AMERICAN

There was a Maidu Indian village at the mouth of the river where now the I Street Bridge crosses. This was the original mouth. The river made a  $^{11}\mathrm{C}^{11}$  curve from B Street and 28th and 1 Streets. The early citizens felt this subjected them to too many floods. In 1868 the river channel was changed, eliminating the curve and emptying the river into the Sacramento at what is today Discovery Park. The old riverhed still shows on topographical surveys as low ground, and there is still considerable subbing and seepage near the present City Water Works. During floods before the channel was changed and the streets built up, the water often reached five feet at 3rd and K Streets, and during clothing are needed for the post-1900 era. floods, the water on the "C" curve built two feet. In the old clothing line, don't forget suc higher on the side of the curve which was nearest the city, pushing over and through the low tidewater levee.

## DELTA VIGNETTES: NAMES FROM THE PAST

In 1880, Delta School District Clerks were O.R. Runyon, Onisbo; P.B. Green, Richland (now Hood); J.F. Parker, Slough School; John E. Baker, Emmaton; Dr. M. Pietrzycki, Rio Vista; E.F. Fitch, Walnut Grove; P.H. Gardiner, Isleton; G.A. Knott, Georgiana (Andrus Island);, and J. Shafer, Branhan.

FRANKLIN LODGE #143 F & AM: Organized in 1860, the original officers were these: George A. Blakeslee, Master; Stephen T. Morse, Senior Warden; Reuben Kercheval, Junior Warden; J. Runyon, Treasurer; Simon L. Reed, Secretary; Malachi Kanady, Tyler; A. B. Hustler, Senior Deacon.

GEORGIANA LODGE I.O.G.T.: Organized in 1875 it had among the first officers and charter members Mrs. M.T. Shafer, V. Arrasmith, Flora Hensley, A.M. Wolfe, H. Anderson, Robert Webb, Herbert Crew, S. and F.M. Kitrell, Alexander Wylie, Mr. and Mrs. J.B. Allington, Annie, A. & J. Allington, R.F., Charles and Angie Davis, Laura and L.J. Wells, Sarah, N.J., Martha and Ida Pool.

GEORGIANA GRANGE #122 PATRONS OF HUSBANDRY: This group was organized in 1873 by Deputy W.S. Manlove of Sacramento County and Brother Rich, Secretary of the Sacramento Grange. The first officers and charter members were F.M. Kittrell, Master; H.F. Smith, Overseer; C.P. Hensley, Lecturer; J.H. Staten, Gatekceper; F.M. Pool, Chaplin; J.P. Norman and Peter Hansen, Stewards; G.A. Knott, Secretary, J.N. Holt, Treasurer; Mary Hensley, Ceres; Sarah Rany, Pomona; Sarah Pool, Flora; and Louisa Holt, Assirant Steward.

The Sacramento County History Center is creeping slowly towards completion and is continuously collecting and receiving historical donations. Among recent gifts have been these items: a beaded dress of the 1920's, Hotel Senator photographs of the dining room, kitchen and coffee shop, circa 1931, a lady's equestrian silk topper, a photograph of the 16th Street American River Bridge at the 1935 opening, a paintin of an old Sacramento waterfront view, an electric Maytag washing machine of the 1930 era, menus from 32 local resourants covering a span of years, clothing, photographs, and documents collected by the Sacramento County Historical Society, the photographic collection of the late Michael T. Benning of North Sacramento who worked from 1932 to 1960 recording schoolchildren from elementary through high school in class pictures.

Serry Hatch, who recently attended the Society's May meeting in Walnut Grove, still asks for men's and children's clothing of the 19th century--pre 1890 and the earlier the better. She also seeks everyday wear for the 30's, as well as clothing for men and children of the 40's. Most types of In the old clothing line, don't forget such items as uniforms worn by waiters, waitresses, nurses, conductors, workmen (coveralls, work shoes, etc..) These are to be used to dress display mannequins. She is also looking for early driving engoggles, scarves, hats, gauntlets, etc.

Commerical artifacts are also needed. Giveaway items from the city and county merchants of former years, such as badges, ribbons, documents, calendars, mirrors, and other promotional gifts would make outstanding displays.

HISTORY CENTER



"Grandma's Kitchen" will be featured at the History Center this summer. The kitchen will feature a Hoosier kitchen cabinet and a Vuniversal woodburning stove common appliances in the kitchen of 60 or more years ago. The story of food processing will be described, both home and commerical canning, in conjunction with the kitchen display. The Hoosier cabinet was loaned with its flour sifter, sugar dispenser, and condiment containers. The cabinet, itself, still retains its original paint and stenciled patterns.

### RAICROAD MUSEUM RIDES

There will be Steam Trains at the Railroad Museum in Old Sacramento. A passenger service will operate on weekends this summer until September 3. The trains will be made up of mixed freight and passenger cars suitable for excursion rides and will run between the State Railroad Museum and Miller Park near Sutterville Road. The Museum hopes to be able to eventually extend the trip trip to Freeport, and museum officals are now negotiating with the Southern Pacific for the use of the abandoned right-of-way on the old Southern Pacific Walnut Grove Short Line.

# GCEANINGS from other HISTORICAL SOCIETIES


The <u>Solano County Historical Society</u> provided a small sum for a grave marker for one of the County's legendary figures, Frank "Deafy" Derrick. A former Pony Express rider and pioneer, he died in 1938 at age 96.

The <u>Sierra County Historical Association</u> operates the Kentucky Mine Museum, where visitors learn about hard rock mining and see one of the few remaining operable stamp mills in California.

The Moraga Historical Society recognized the city's founder, Col. William M. Smith, placing a bronze memorial tablet set in granite at his grave in Alhambra Cemetary.

Members of the <u>Berkeley Historical Society</u> wrote a book, *Exactly Opposite the Golden Gate*. The effort two years and is a collection of historical essays on the city.

The <u>Hayward Area Historical Society</u> offers bits of its history on picture plates portraying Hayward area landmarks.

Becky and Bill Wheeler donated the furniture and the file cabinets for which a generous thanks is due! Finally, there is a repository for the growing collection of memorabilia presented to the Society throughout the years. There is a desk for the secretaries and treasurer and files for the Oral History and Book Projects as well as other paperwork. Also a small library collection on local and connected history is available.

Harry Rasmussen has loaned the Society a collection of Delta and Vacaville newspapers. The papers will provide an especially good research source.

Newly elected Board Members were introduced at the Annual January Meeting: Neil Hamilton, Chris Giovanonni, Judy Merwin, and Harry Rasmussen will be helping to organize the activities of the Society through the next two years. Continuing members on the Board are Patty Merwin, Cathy Hemly, and Harvey Felt. Officers elected include Jim Gualco, President; Arthur Brown, Vice President; and Jim Dahlberg, Treasurer, who are each serving a second term, and newly chosen officers, Dorothy "Becky" Wheeler, Corresponding Secretary, and Jan Quesenberry, Recording Secretary. Becky Wheeler will also serve as Publicity Chairman. The Nominating Committee was co-chaired by Jennie Sheehan and Jean Harvie and included members Judy Merwin, Lucy Barnes, Joy Agusto, and Jan Quesenberry.

At the December general meeting President Jim Gualco thanked Kathie Graham and Yvonne Pylman for all their help with the semi-annual newsletter. He also recognized the efforts of Vice President Art Brown in obtaining outstanding programs for the general meetings and the hard work of many other volunteers who have given time and talent to the Society.

The Society donated \$25 to the Chinese American Historical Society, Richmond, California Branch, to help sponsor their forth coming book, *One Day*, *One Dollar*, written by Peter Leon.

Cathy Hemly gave a talk and slide show on Delta history this Spring term to the 4th through 8th grades at Bates School. Kathie Graham provided her with narratives and other written material, and Robert James provided the slides from the Society's collection. The classes then toured the Dai Loy Museum in Locke.

Claudine Frieders, Shirley Machado, and Judy Eddy have tentatively agreed to put together a 1985 calendar of old Delta photographs—from the Society's excellent slide collection. The Society has over 400 slides from which to choose! The Slide Collection is our Society's most valuable resource, and so far, its most successful project, outside of the Dai Loy Museum. The Museum deals with only one segment of Delta history, but the slides cover a much broader range.

Another project sponsored by the Society, which doesn't seem to get further than the planning stage, except for a few sporadic contributions, is the Oral History Project. In the last year alone potential interviews, such as Charles Ostman, Dave Phipps, Betty Cleeves, Gertrude Dennison and others, were lost. [Gertrude Dennison asked that someone interview her thoroughly, BUT NO ONE DID.] We are loosing these valuable human resources. Won't some of you HELP! It is only needed to get the interview on tape, and the transcription can be done at a later date. The interviewer does not have to type the manuscript. Won't some of you pledge to do one interview this summer? Call Jim Gualco if you will help.

Typists are needed, however, to transcribe the interviews. There is a machine in the office for transcription and a typewriter if you would wish to volunteer your time at the office rather than at home. The two parts of this project can make a lasting contribution to a full and vital history of the Delta.

The Society accepts memorial donations from members and friends and notifies families of the gift with appropriate cards. A Donation Card is stapled to this newsletter for your future use. Other contribution cards may be obtained from the Corresponding Secretary, Becky Wheeler.
