Lake Chain Love Affair

Have you heard about the love affair on the Briggs Lake chain of lakes? Maybe you haven't put it all together yet. It's all there: enduring passion, commitment, fond memories [some accurate, some not], complacency, neglect, renewal. Connecting the dots makes for a good story.

This is not a story about a one night fling, or a summer romance. This story is about a serious love affair, an enduring affair that has gone on for decades. This story is a familiar one, involving many people, often very passionate people. This story gets passed down to children, and grandchildren, a kind of legacy love story. Those telling this story hope the affair goes on and on with the same passion and commitment of those doing the telling. In fact, the passion and commitment has been so strong that people all over the state have formed local organizations to protect and enhance this love affair.



But, as in too many love stories, over time passion sometimes gives way to complacency, and those involved in the affair start to pay less and less attention to the things that matter. Complacency gives way to neglect until there is a crisis of sorts.

This is the painful story of Minnesotans and their love affair with their lakes and rivers. Part of this story is about us, and our relationships with the Briggs Lake chain and the Elk River. Over the years we have become complacent: we don't pay the right kind of attention to our love, our passion, our affair with the lakes. You might even say we have become guilty of neglect.

As a result of our complacency and neglect, we have even been noticed, and flagged, by a state agency. The Minnesota Pollution Control Agency [MPCA] in 2008 put the Briggs Lake chain and the Elk River on their "impaired waters list." Ouch! Not exactly a flattering way to treat our love and passion.

All kinds of little things have contributed to our complacency and neglect, little things that by themselves don't add up to much. Cutting grass to the water's edge. Allowing high nutrient runoff to reach the lake. Over-fertilizing our lawns. Cutting down trees and shrubs to get better views of the water. Violating shoreland regulations. But over time, these things, repeated over and over by many people, have contributed to our impaired water status. Make no mistake, however: our love affair is certainly not over. What it needs is a some loving attention. Now. Many people doing many of the little things [BMPs: best management practices] over and over to improve water quality: **That** can make a difference, a difference to revive our legacy love affair. Doing the right things will breathe new life into this great affair.

As you may already know, your lake association has begun a project addressing our septic systems and other sources of nutrients polluting our lakes. At the July BLCA meeting more than 80 people gathered to hear about the project. Training is being scheduled for volunteers [Groundtruthers] to help property owners validate their specific data from the flyover, make recommendations and provide help for addressing problems.
