

Sunday Reflection: Third Sunday of Advent

Why did Jesus praise John the Baptist as the greatest person born of a woman and yet immediately declare that those who enter the kingdom of God would be greater than John (Matthew 11:11)? To understand this, we must recognize the unique and pivotal role John the Baptist held in salvation history. John was the last and most eminent of the prophets of the Old Covenant, the one who bridged the hopes of Israel with their fulfillment in Christ.

Readings for Next Sunday, December 21, 2025 Isaiah 7:10-14 Romans 1:1-7

Matthew 1:18-24

Every prophet, in essence, pointed toward the coming of the Messiah, but John carried this mission to its highest form: he did not merely speak of the Savior; he personally prepared the way for Him. By his preaching, his baptism, and his steadfast witness, John called people to repentance and readiness, directing their hearts toward the Lord. At the River Jordan, he boldly proclaimed, "Behold the Lamb of God, who takes away the sins of the world" (John 1:29), inviting all to recognize and embrace Jesus as the promised Messiah.

When Jesus responded to John's disciples, He asked a penetrating question: "What did you go out into the wilderness to see? A reed shaken by the wind? A man dressed in fine clothing?" and continued, "Why did you go out to see John the Baptist? Was it because you hungered for the Word of the Lord?" (Matthew 11:7-8). In this, Jesus emphasizes that John was not simply a messenger or spokesperson for God, but the faithful witness—the friend of the Bridegroom—whose mission was to illuminate the presence of the Messiah in the midst of His people. John's life was marked by courage, humility, and unwavering commitment. He spoke truth to power and ultimately paid the supreme price for his faithfulness, laying down his life to prepare the way for Jesus, the Savior of the world. Jesus' words about John also invite us to a profound reflection on our own discipleship. Just as John bore witness to Christ, so are we called to proclaim the good news of God's kingdom with courage and conviction.

Saint of the Week ... St. Lucy

St. Lucy is a virgin and martyr of Syracuse in Sicily. She was born to rich and noble parents in the year 283. Her father was of Roman origin, but his early death left her dependent upon her mother. Like so many of the early martyrs, Lucy had consecrated her virginity to God, and she hoped to devote all her worldly goods to the service of the poor.

Her mother arranged a marriage for her, but for three years Lucy managed to postpone the wedding. Lucy prayed at the tomb of Saint Agatha to change her mother's mind about her faith. As a result, her mother's long illness was cured, and she consented to Lucy's desire to live for God.



Feast Day: December 13

Saint Lucy's rejected bridegroom, Paschasius, denounced Lucy as a Christian. The governor planned to force her into prostitution, but when guards went to fetch her, they could not move her even when they hitched her to a team of oxen. The governor ordered her to be killed instead. After a gruesome torture which included having her eyes torn out, she was surrounded by bundles of wood which were set afire, but the fire quickly died out. She prophesied against her persecutors, and was then executed by being stabbed to death with a dagger.

According to later accounts, Lucy warned Paschasius he would be punished. When the governor heard this he ordered the guards to gouge out her eyes. Another account reports that it was Lucy herself who removed her eyes in an attempt to discourage a persistent suitor who greatly admired them. When her body was being prepared for burial, they discovered her eyes had been restored. This led to her to be known as the patroness of the blind and eye ailments. Source: catholicnewsagency.com

What is OCIA/OCIC?

The Order of Christian Initiation of Adults (OCIA) and the Order of Christian Initiation of Children (OCIC) is the process by which the Catholic community welcomes adults and children over the age of 7 into the Catholic Church.

What is this Rite?

This Rite recognizes the Catechumen's decision to begin the process of becoming a member of the Catholic Church through Baptism and welcomes the Candidates (those who have been baptized in another faith or baptized Catholic as a child but never catechized in the Catholic faith) into the process of full communion with the Catholic Church through Confirmation and Holy Eucharist.
