Eileen was born Aileen Mae Howe on May 17, 1929, in Dansville, Michigan to the late Clifford and Lucille (Hedglen) Howe. She grew up traveling across central and eastern Michigan as her father moved to different Free Methodist pastoring assignments, learning her trademark resourcefulness and hosting skills from an early age. She graduated from Spring Arbor High School (at the time Spring Arbor Junior College), where she sang in the girl's glee club, acapella choir, and mixed quartet. In 1949 Eileen moved to Bad Axe, Michigan, where she worked at the Bad Axe Grain Elevator for 5 years. She married James Gingrich June 25, 1949. She and Jim, who worked for the US Postal Service, remained in Bad Axe, a place she loved with all her heart. After briefly residing in Verona, Jim and Eileen, with the help of family and friends, built a house just outside Bad Axe from a pattern in a Popular Mechanics magazine. Together they raised three children: Janet (1952), David (1956), and Jeffrey (1961). Eileen worked as a bookkeeper at Sageman's Jewelry in downtown Bad Axe for 25 years and loved to tell stories about the China, gifts and jewelry they sold. Eileen was a dedicated member of the Bad Axe Free Methodist Church where she was the church society secretary for many years, taught Sunday school classes for nearly every age from two through adult, participated in choir as well as in crafting gatherings. Eileen was an avid seamstress, enjoying both sewing and cross stitching, and sang in the Bad Axe Community choir for several years. She and Jim enjoyed the outdoors, taking road trips to visit family and viewing the wildlife around their home.
