

The Dormition of the Most Holy Theotokos

Celebrated on August 15 (August 28 - Julian Calendar)

The Orthodox Church solemnly celebrates the Dormition (Falling Asleep) of the Virgin Mary as one of the Twelve Great Feasts, marking not only her death but her assumption into heaven—body and soul. Though not recorded in Scripture, this feast is deeply rooted in Holy Tradition, witnessed by early Christian writings, and affirmed by the Church's liturgical and theological life. According to Tradition:

- The Virgin Mary was visited by the Archangel Gabriel who revealed her approaching death.
- Surrounded miraculously by the Apostles, except Thomas, she passed away peacefully.
- Christ Himself received her soul, an image beautifully reversed from Nativity iconography.
- After being buried near Gethsemane, her tomb was found empty three days later when Thomas arrived.
- A vision of her bodily ascent into heaven and the gift of her belt to Thomas confirmed her glorification.
 The Dormition Fast (August 1-14) prepares the faithful through repentance, fasting, and prayer, with services like the Paraklesis offered in her honor. Scriptural echoes in the feast:
- Old Testament readings (Jacob's Ladder, the Closed Gate, Divine Wisdom) reveal her role as the dwelling place of God.
- New Testament readings remind us of her humility and faith, paralleling her with those who "hear the Word of God and keep it."
 On the feast, many churches bless flowers and herbs, reflecting the heavenly fragrance of her empty tomb and the incorrupt beauty of her body.
 The Dormition Proclaims:
- We need not fear death. The Mother of God fell asleep in peace, trusting Christ's victory.
- We await the resurrection. She is the first after Christ to taste the glory of resurrected life.
- 3. Heaven is our home. She stands in glory, interceding for us as the Mother of Life. The Dormition is often called the "Summer Pascha"—a radiant proclamation that death has been defeated, and that in Christ, eternal life awaits all who follow Him.

"O Theotokos, in giving birth you preserved your virginity; in falling asleep you did not forsake the world. You were translated to life, O Mother of Life, and by your prayers, you deliver our souls from death." — Troparion of the Dormition



The Hidden Spoon

Scripture

A pastor once visited a family from his congregation. After a warm welcome and a delicious homemade dinner, he spent some time in fellowship and prayer with them before leaving.

After he left, the lady of the house noticed that one of her silver spoons was missing. She quietly assumed the pastor had taken it. Though she told no one, the suspicion lingered in her heart. Over the course of the next year, her view of the



pastor changed — the trust had been subtly broken by that single thought.

Nearly a year later, after the pastor gave a powerful sermon on integrity, honesty, and the sin of stealing, the woman could no longer hold it in.

After the service, she approached him and said:

- "Pastor, I need to say something. I've been holding this in for a long time. Remember when you came over for dinner last year? After you left... one of our spoons went missing. Honestly, I've been thinking all this time that... you took it."

The pastor smiled gently and said,

- "Ah. That spoon... I didn't take it. I placed it inside your Bible."

Sometimes what we're missing isn't gone — it's just waiting to be found in the very place we haven't looked in a while. The spoon wasn't stolen — it was simply placed where the woman had never looked: inside her Bible. For a whole year, she judged the pastor without realizing that the real issue was her own neglect of Scripture.

Many of us are the same. We feel like something is missing in our lives — peace, direction, joy — and yet we don't open the very book where those things are found.

God's Word isn't just a Sunday book. It's meant to be read, lived, and loved every day. When we fail to open our Bibles, we risk misunderstanding others, ourselves, and even God.


So the challenge is simple:

Don't let your "spoon" stay hidden. Open your Bible — and find what God has placed there for you.

Jesus Walking on Water

One of the most striking and symbolic moments in the Gospels is the account of Jesus walking on water. Found in Matthew 14, Mark 6, and John 6, this event speaks powerfully to the human experience of fear, doubt, faith, and trust in the divine. After feeding the five thousand, Jesus sends His disciples ahead of Him while He retreats to pray. Later that night, the disciples are caught in a storm, their boat battered by waves and wind. In the middle of their struggle, Jesus comes to them—walking on the water.

This moment is more than a demonstration of divine power over nature. It reveals the character of Christ as the One who enters into our chaos, who comes to us even when we are overwhelmed, afraid, or seemingly alone. The sea, throughout Scripture,



represents disorder, danger, and the unknown. For Jesus to walk upon it is to declare that nothing is outside His authority—not even the storms that shake us to our core.

When the disciples see Him, they are terrified, thinking He is a ghost. Jesus immediately speaks: "Take heart; it is I. Do not be afraid." These words echo God's self-identification in the Old Testament—"I AM"—reminding us that Jesus is not just a teacher or prophet, but the very presence of God with us.

Peter's response is bold: "Lord, if it is You, command me to come to You on the water." Jesus says, "Come." Peter steps out of the boat and begins to walk toward Jesus, but when he notices the wind, he becomes afraid and begins to sink. He cries out, "Lord, save me!" and Jesus immediately reaches out His hand and catches him. "O you of little faith, why did you doubt?"

This exchange between Jesus and Peter captures the tension between faith and fear. Peter's initial faith leads him to do something miraculous—he walks on water. But when his focus shifts from Jesus to the storm, fear overwhelms him. This is a mirror of our own lives. When we keep our eyes on Christ, we can rise above the chaos. But when we focus on the winds and waves—on our problems, fears, and inadequacies—we begin to sink.


Jesus doesn't let Peter drown in his doubt. He saves him, then calms the storm. This is the grace of God—that even when our faith falters, His love remains steady. The story reminds us that faith is not the absence of fear, but the courage to cry out to Jesus even when we're sinking.

There is also a communal aspect here. The other disciples remain in the boat, watching this unfold. When Jesus and Peter return, the storm ceases, and those in the boat worship Jesus, saying, "Truly You are the Son of God." The experience becomes a revelation—not only for Peter but for all the disciples. It transforms fear into worship.

Today, many of us find ourselves in storms—personal, relational, emotional, or spiritual. We are tossed by waves of anxiety, uncertainty, or grief. Jesus still comes to us, often in unexpected ways, walking toward us in the very midst of what scares us. He calls us to step out in faith, not because we are strong, but because He is present.

The story of Jesus walking on water invites us to trust—not only when the sea is calm, but especially when it is not. It teaches us to recognize His voice, to take that first step of faith, and to know that when we falter, His hand is already reaching for us.

Let us be like Peter—not perfect in faith, but willing to step out, to call out, and to let Jesus draw us nearer. And let us be like the disciples who, in the end, fall to their knees in awe, declaring the truth that storms reveal: truly, He is the Son of God.

Orthodox Christianity 101

THE LAST JUDGMENT

At the moment of death, the soul leaves the body and enters its new mode of existence. It does not lose its memory or its ability to think or to feel, but departs to the other world loaded with the burden of its life, with memories of its past and an accountability for its sins.

Christian teaching on the Last Judgment is based on the understanding that all sinful and evil deeds committed by the person leave certain traces on his soul, and that the person is to give an account for everything before that Absolute Good, with Which no evil or sin can coexist. The Kingdom of



God is incompatible with sin: '...Nothing unclean will enter it, nor any one who practises abomination or falsehood, but only those who are written in the Lamb's book of life' (Rev.21:27). Every evil for which repentance was not shown at the sacrament of confession, every sin which was concealed, every defilement of the soul which was not purified, all of this will be revealed during the Last Judgment. In the words of Christ, '...There is nothing hid, except to be made manifest; nor is anything secret, except to come to light' (Mark 4:22).

Jesus Christ's Parable of the Last Judgment (Matt.25:31-46) indicates that for many people the Judgment will become a moment of insight, recognition and conversion, while for others it may turn out to be a great disappointment and frustration. Those who were sure of their own salvation will suddenly find themselves condemned, while those who perhaps did not meet Christ in their earthly life ('when did we see Thee?') but were merciful towards their neighbour, will be saved. In this parable, the King does not ask people about matters of belief, doctrine and religious practice. He does not ask them whether they went to church, kept the fasts, or prayed for long time: He only asks them how they treated His 'brethren'. The main criteria of the Judgment are therefore the acts of mercy performed or not performed by people during their earthly lives.

According to the teaching of the Church, the Last Judgment will be universal: all people will undergo it, be they believers or non-believers, Christians or non-Christians. If Christians will be judged by the Gospel's standards, pagans will be judged by the natural law which is 'written in their hearts' (Rom.2:15). Christians will take full responsibility for their deeds as those who 'knew' the will of God, while some non-Christians will be treated less strictly for they did not know God or His will. The Judgment will 'begin with the household of the Lord' (1 Pet.4:17), that is, with the Church and its members, and not with those who did not meet Christ nor hear the message of the Gospel.

However, both the New Testament and Orthodox patristic tradition suggest that all people will appear with some experience of an encounter with Christ and His message, including those who did not meet Him in their earthly life. In particular, St Peter speaks of Christ's descent into Hell and His preaching there to those sinners who were drowned in the waters of the Flood: 'For Christ also died for sins once for all, the righteous for the unrighteous, that He might bring us to God, being put to death in the flesh but made alive in the spirit; in which He went and preached to the spirits in prison, who formerly did not obey, when God's patience waited in the days of Noah, during the building of the ark, in which a few, that is, eight persons, were saved through water. Baptism, which corresponds to this, now saves you... through the resurrection of Jesus Christ...' (1 Pet.3:18-21)

If Christ preached in Hell, was His message addressed to all people or only to the chosen ones? According to some church writers, Christ preached only to the Old Testament righteous who were in Hell waiting for Him. For others, the message of Christ was addressed to all people, including those who lived in paganism, outside the true faith. This view is expressed by Clement of Alexandria, who maintains that Christ preached not to the righteous who were to be saved, but to the sinners who were condemned for their evil actions. The sinners who were confined in Hell must have met the Lord in order to appear before Him at the Last Judgment.

Can there be an answer here to the complex question of whether or not there exists the possibility for non-Christians and non-believers to be saved? The Orthodox tradition has always asserted that there is no salvation outside Christ, Baptism and the Church. However, not everyone who during his earthly life did not meet Christ is deprived of the possibility of being liberated from Hell, for even in Hell the message of the Gospel is heard. Having created the human person with free will, God accepted responsibility for his salvation; and this salvation has been accomplished by Christ. A person who deliberately rejects Christ and His Gospel makes his choice for the devil and becomes himself guilty of his own condemnation: '...He who does not believe is condemned already, because he has not believed in the name of the only Son of God' (John 3:18). But how can someone who has not heard the Gospel at all be condemned, someone born in a non-Christian country or who grew up in an atheist family? 'Imagine that the Gospel was not proclaimed to those who died before Christ's coming', Clement of Alexandria says. 'Then both their salvation and their condemnation is a matter of crying injustice'. In the same manner those who died after Christ's coming but had not heard the Gospel's message cannot be treated as if they deliberately rejected Him. This is why Christ preached in Hell in order that every human person created by Him would make a choice for good or evil, and in connection with this choice be either saved or condemned.
