The Holyhead Breakwater Country Park is a magical place for the family, the walker or those just keen on some tranquility to visit and share.

The park has stunning scenery, with a backdrop of soaring cliffs, the heather-clad Holyhead Mountain, and its amazing variety of birds and wildlife. If you are visiting the park you can access Holyhead Mountain via the Anglesey Coastal Footpath that goes through the park. You can, of course, drive or walk right into the park or you can cycle to it - a new Green Links cycle track provides one of the routes into the park.

There is friendly staff on site to help out if you need assistance or guidance. With ample parking, an information centre and Caffi'r Parc for refreshment and meals the Country Park is a place once visited you will want to return.

The Information centre will provide you with an understanding of this unique area with its many walks and features and wardens who will be more it's a magical place

than happy to share their experience and knowledge with you about things to do and see. Orienteering is very popular; it's fun and a great way to explore the park further. Basically, orienteering is using a map to find certain orienteering points in the park - don't worry if you've never done it before, there's plenty of help to get you started.

While you are out and about in the park - maybe even strolling along the Nature Trails - you will most certainly want to experience Rocky Coast. This area of coastline is a very special area, the views from the coast are stunning and you'll love the Welsh Ponies that graze on the coastal paths for a good part of the year, part of an established grazing project.

The lake area is popular with anglers and the Park walks are clearly signposted offering a choice of scenery and the diversity of wildlife to see.

There are so many things that you can do in the park - you can walk, sit, eat, drink, relax and enjoy yourself. Even during the summer months there are many places within the park where you could feel that you have the place all to yourself enjoying the majesty of the mountain and its rugged coast or its more gentle grasslands.




