Mile High Harmonica Club Origins

How MHHC got started

he beginning of the club started back in 1987 when I was approached by Swallow Hill Music Association to join the faculty, starting a harmonica program at their new location on South Pearl Street. The word got out that harmonica lessons where available, which caught the eyes of two seniors in town.

The first was Cliff Mitchell who asked me to come over to see his harmonica collection. He was in his seventies then and had a collection of stories and harps from the vaudeville years in the theatres of Kansas City. He had won harmonica contests when he was in his teens.

He later went on to become a sign painter for the Lawrence Welk show, painting Plymouth dealership windows with advertisements of upcoming shows. He had been a member in the KC club and told me that I needed to start one in Denver. Cliff doesn't get to meetings much any more but he's a great guy and may even show you his harps.

The second to call was Stan Pierce. We met in a park in Aurora with my little kids one summer day. We played swapped stories and visited. Stan was founding father of the Knick Knack Band. It was a theatre act of senior citizens from Aurora playing homemade instruments.

Stan wanted to get the harmonica players in town together and start a club. This was the beginning of my friendship with Stan and his wife Betty, who have always been there for the club.

I want to thank Cliff and Stan for being the seeds of this great club. They helped and supported me with ideas, knowledge and wisdom, which I treasure today. The *Harmonica Madness* group was foundation of the young club
