The Pan-American Union, through its international co-operation, occupies an important position in the peace movement of the world. This union is administered by a governing board, composed of the Secretary of State of the United States, the ambassadors and ministers of other American republics.

Today, the Union is the "clearing house of good will," which is ever at the service of the Americas. Its headquarters are in a beautiful building in Washington, D. C., which was completed in 1910 as a gift of Andrew Carnegie.

To a war-torn world of today these twenty-one republics have shown that they can live as neighbors in peace and friendship.

In 1826 Simon Bolivar called the first Congress of the American nations. The purpose of that conference was to establish unity and co-operation among the independent republics of the Americas. Nothing but disappointment came out of the meeting.

Today, however, Bolivar's dream has been realized. The Pan-American Union brings together all the American republics and helps them live together in peace and happiness.

To this American ideal of friendship and good will we, the students of Magdalena High School, dedicate our annual.


The Home Economics Club met once a month. At each meeting there were reports given dealing with home life. Songs were sung and refreshments were served.



Surplus commodities and WPA labor were furnished by the government. Members of the P.-T. A. were very generous in working at the lunch room until it could be well established. Continued support of cash and foods of various kinds served to amplify the menu and provided balanced meals.

Nearly 400 children have been served at the lunch room since its inception, and we are thoroughly convinced that the lunch project is a most valuable asset to the students.

In the District Tournament, the Steers easily defeated Estancia and held the vaunted Socorro five for three exciting quarters.





We want to thank the organizations, and individuals, who have given so generously of their time and money to support our band.










High School Building






Gymnasium










Grade School Building
