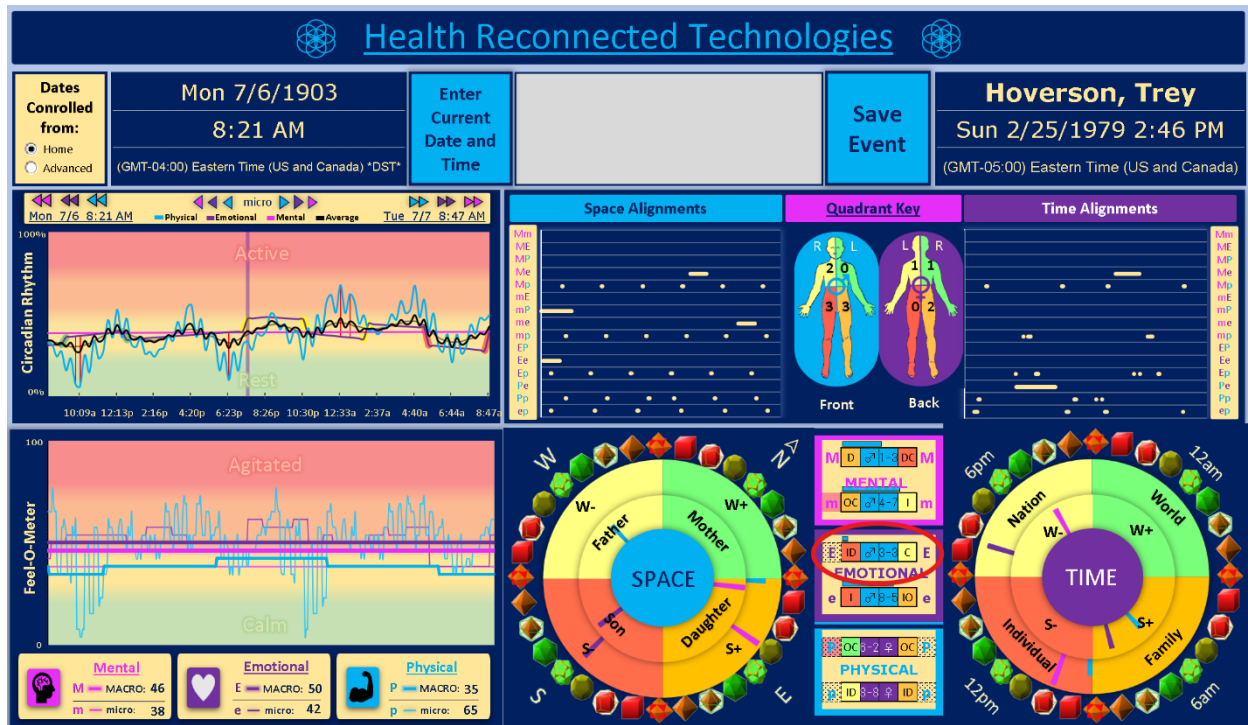


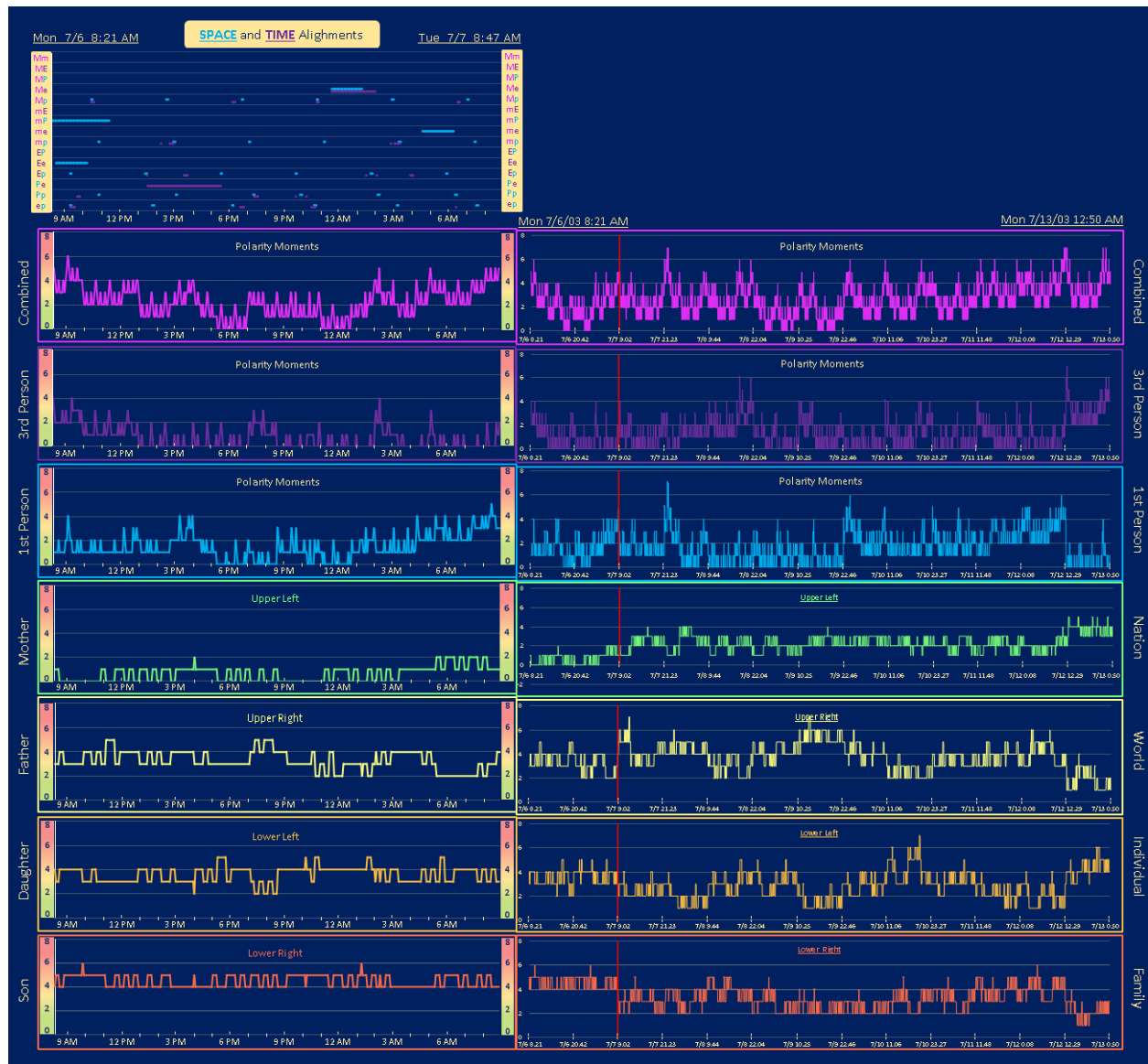
1903 Evansville Race Riot (Indiana)

The **Evansville Race Riot** occurred in July 9-10, 1903 in [Evansville, Indiana](#) and was the worst riot in the city's history. The riots occurred after a black man shot and killed a white policeman and ultimately resulted in 13 deaths.

A mob of several thousand citizens (mostly all white) formed outside the [Vanderburgh County Jail](#) on July 6 and attempted to storm the jail with the intention of lynching Brown and 16 other black inmates. Around 200 militiamen then opened fire on the mob, killing and injuring several rioters. The crowd then began looting hardware stores of weapons and stormed into black neighborhoods to expel black people from Evansville. The rioting continued until July 10 and a total of 13 people died during the riot, with more than 40 others seriously wounded and about 2,000 of Evansville's 8,000 black residents fleeing the city.

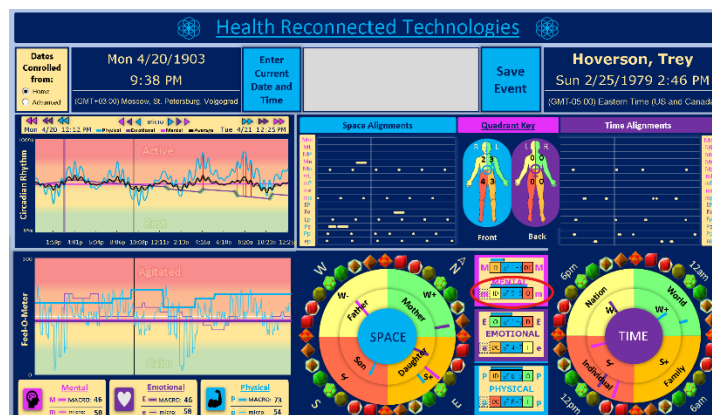
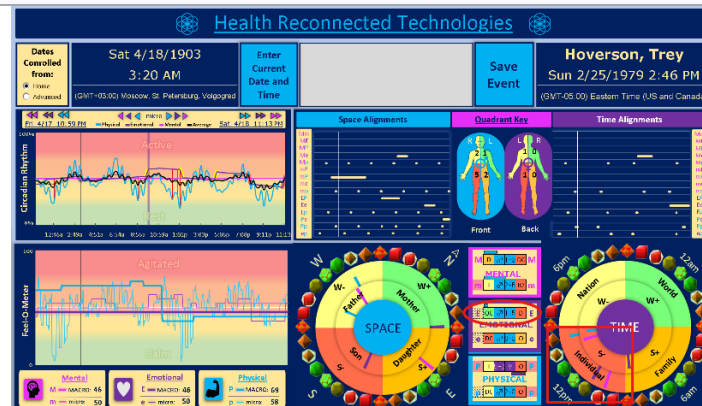

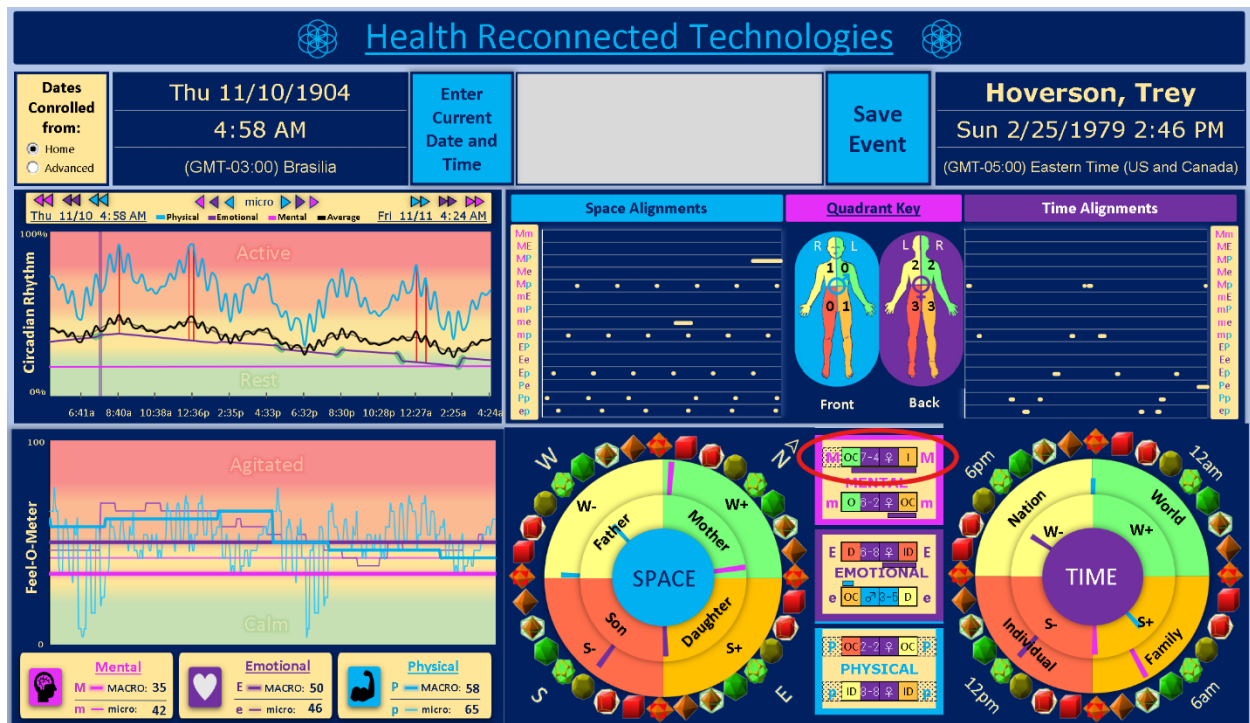


1904 Vaccine Revolt

Resulted in	Revocation of mandatory vaccination Military coup attempt defeated

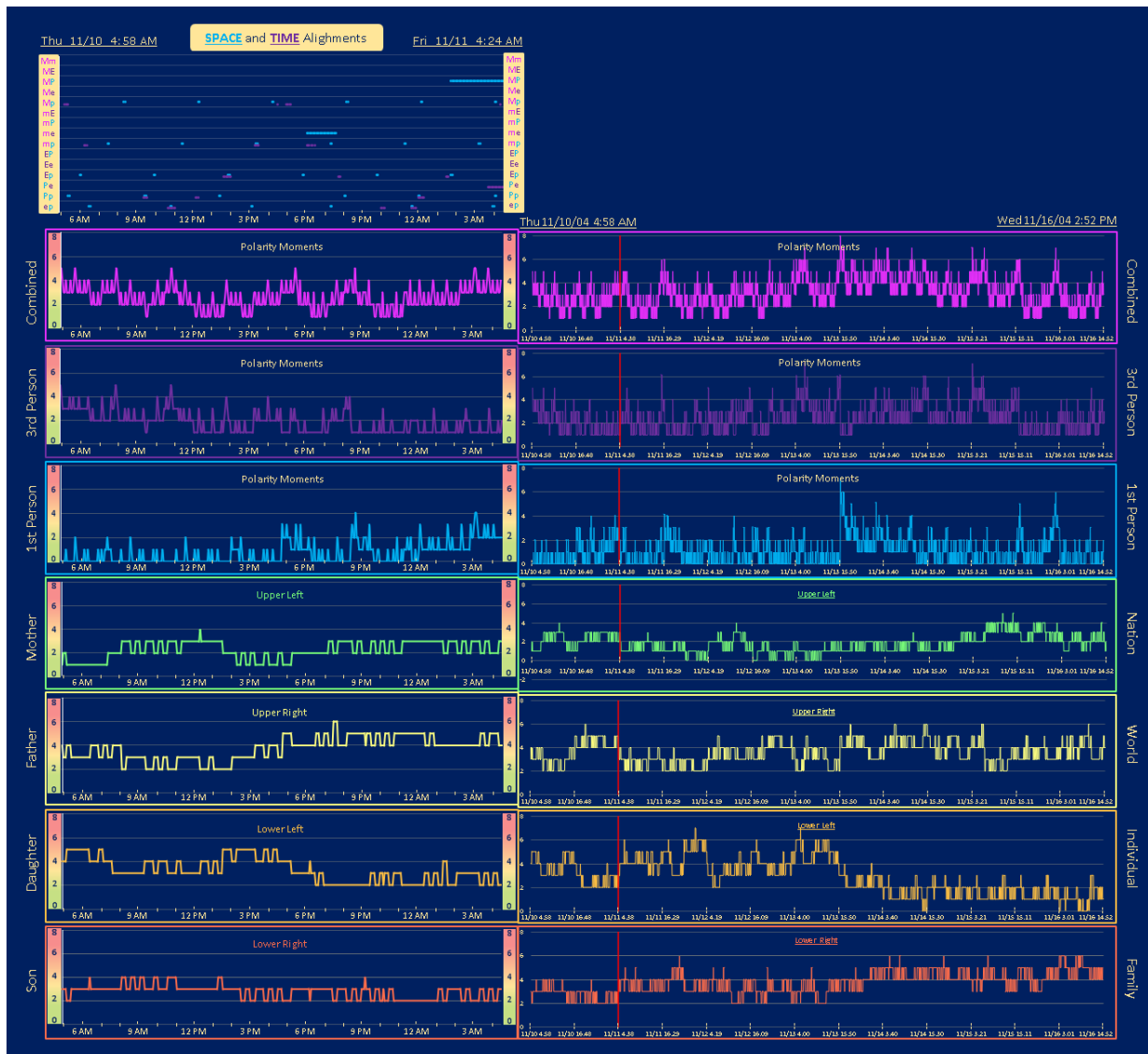

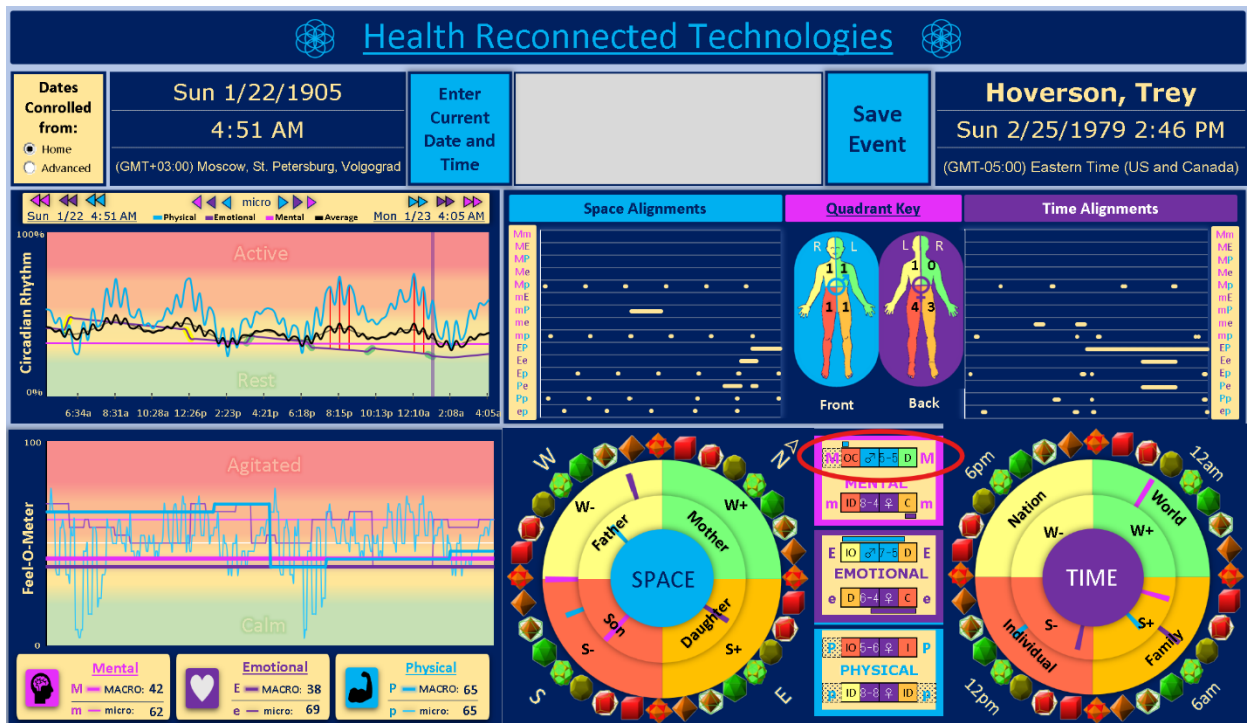

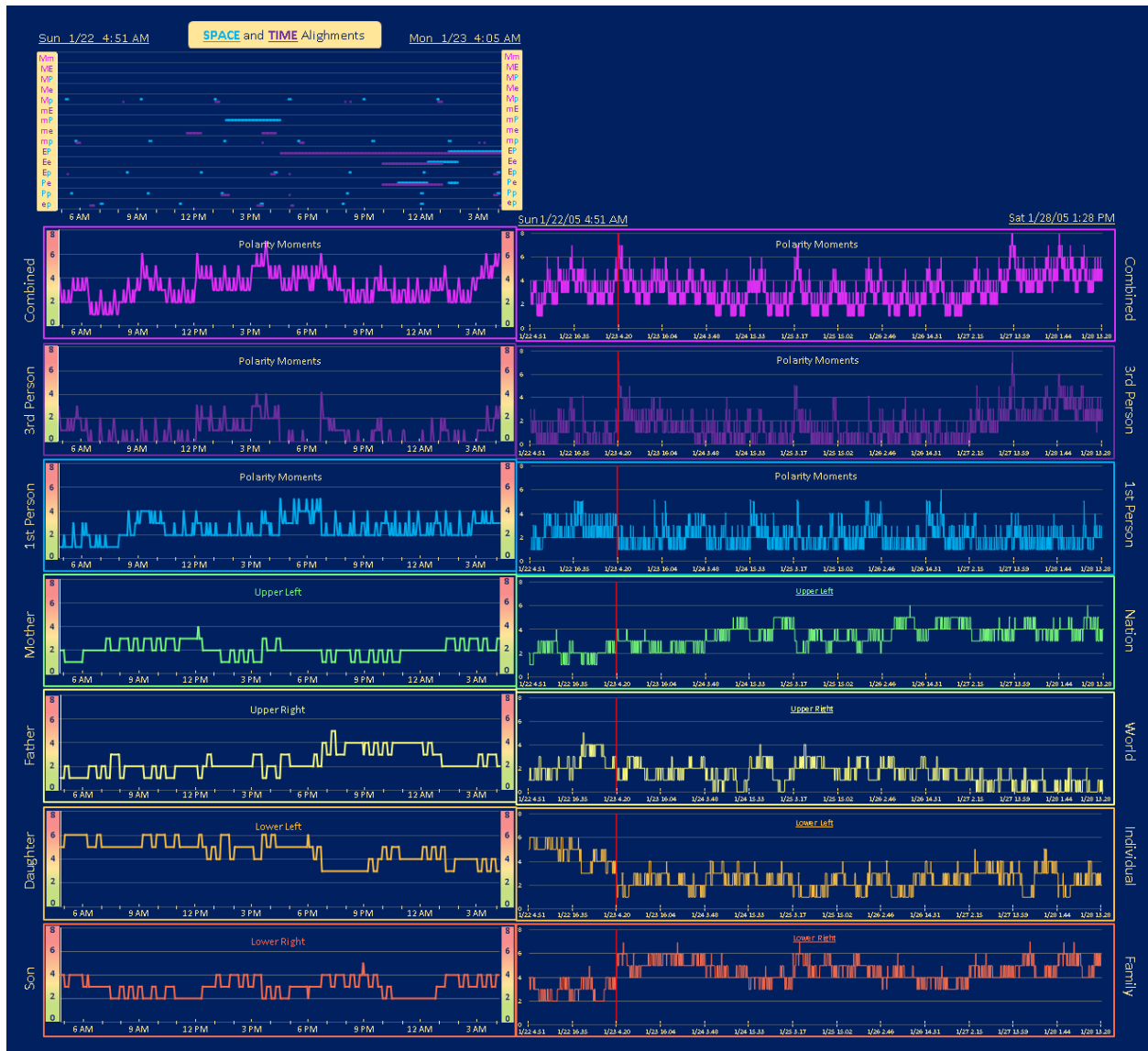
1905 Bloody Sunday or Red Sunday

Date	22 January [O.S. 9 January] 1905
Location	St. Petersburg , Russian Empire
Goals	To deliver a petition to Tsar Nicholas II , calling for reforms such as: limitations on state officials' power, improvements to working conditions and hours, and the introduction of a national parliament
Methods	Demonstration march
Resulted in	Dispersal of the workers' procession; beginning of the 1905 Russian Revolution



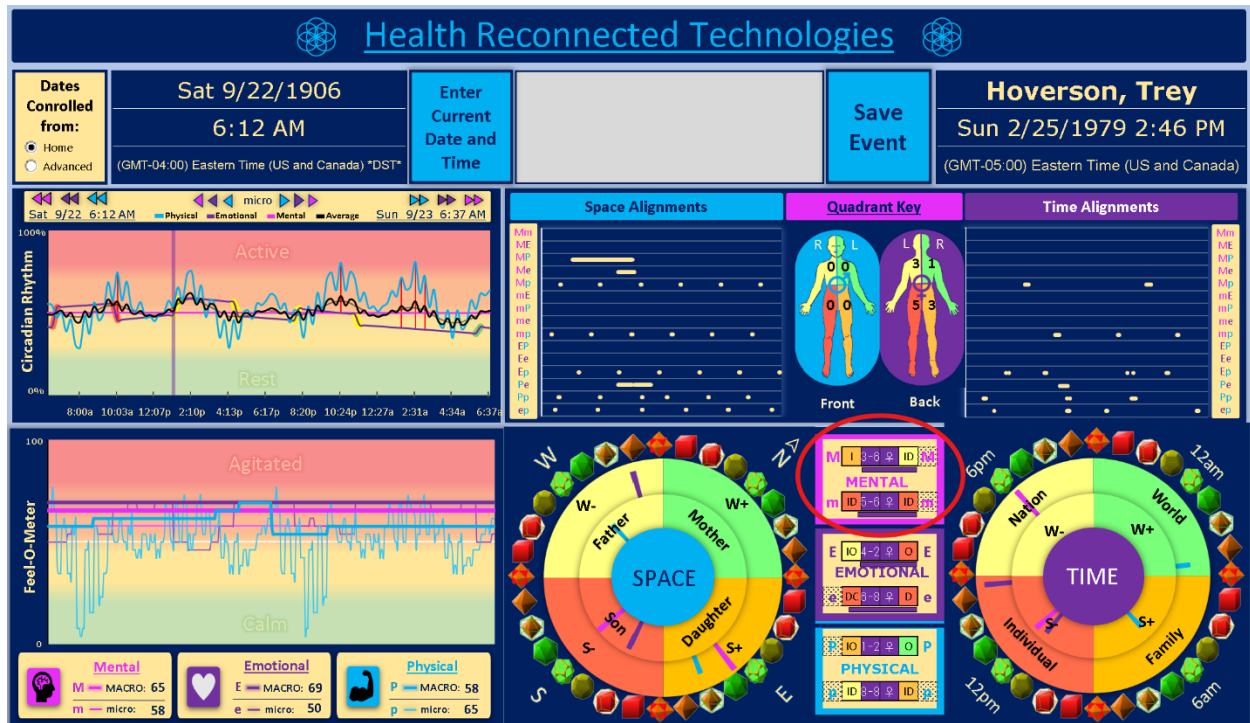

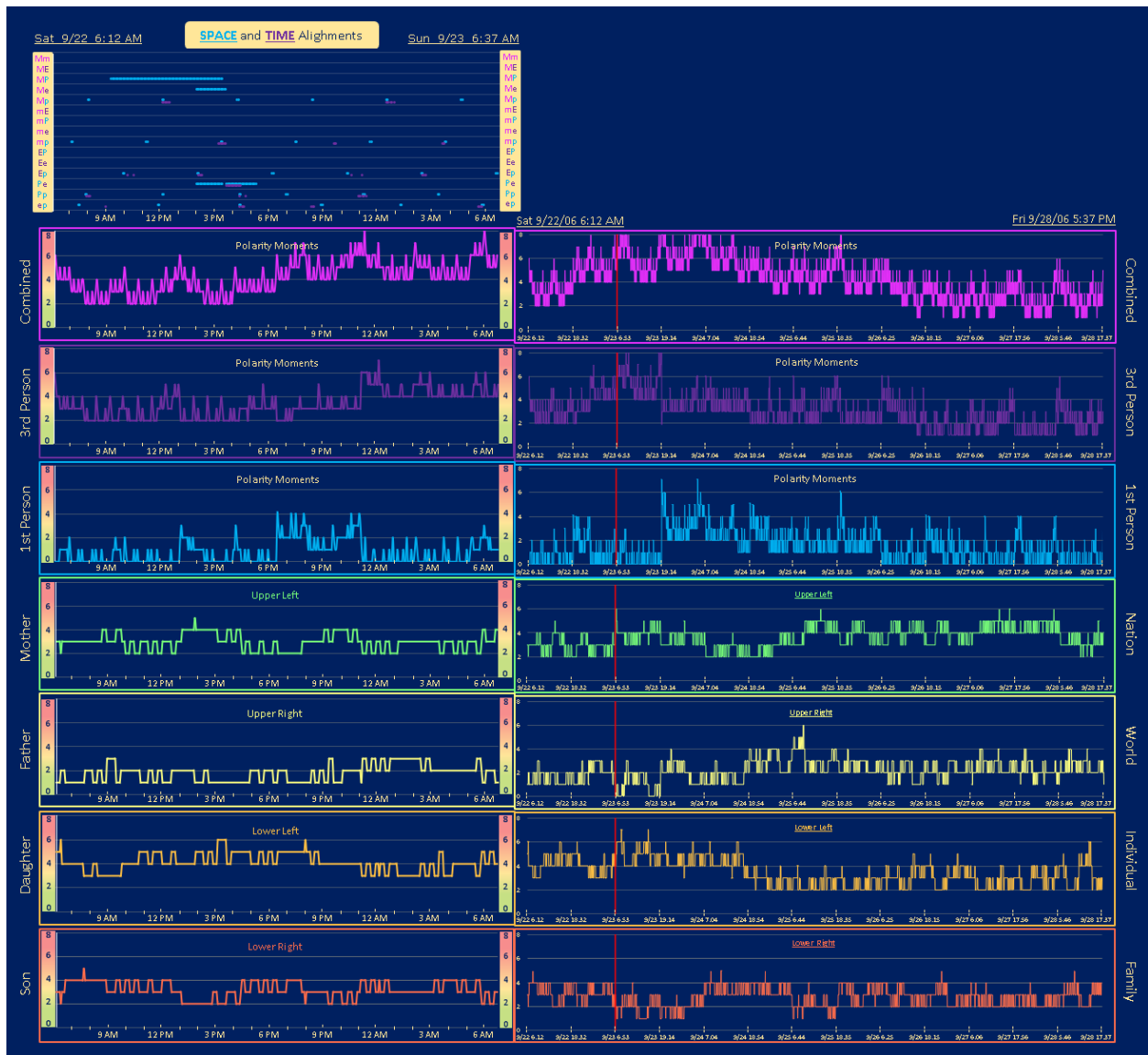
1906 Atlanta Race Riot

Date	September 22–24, 1906
Target	African Americans
Deaths	25+ African Americans, 2 white Americans

Perpetrators	White mobs, and Fulton county police.



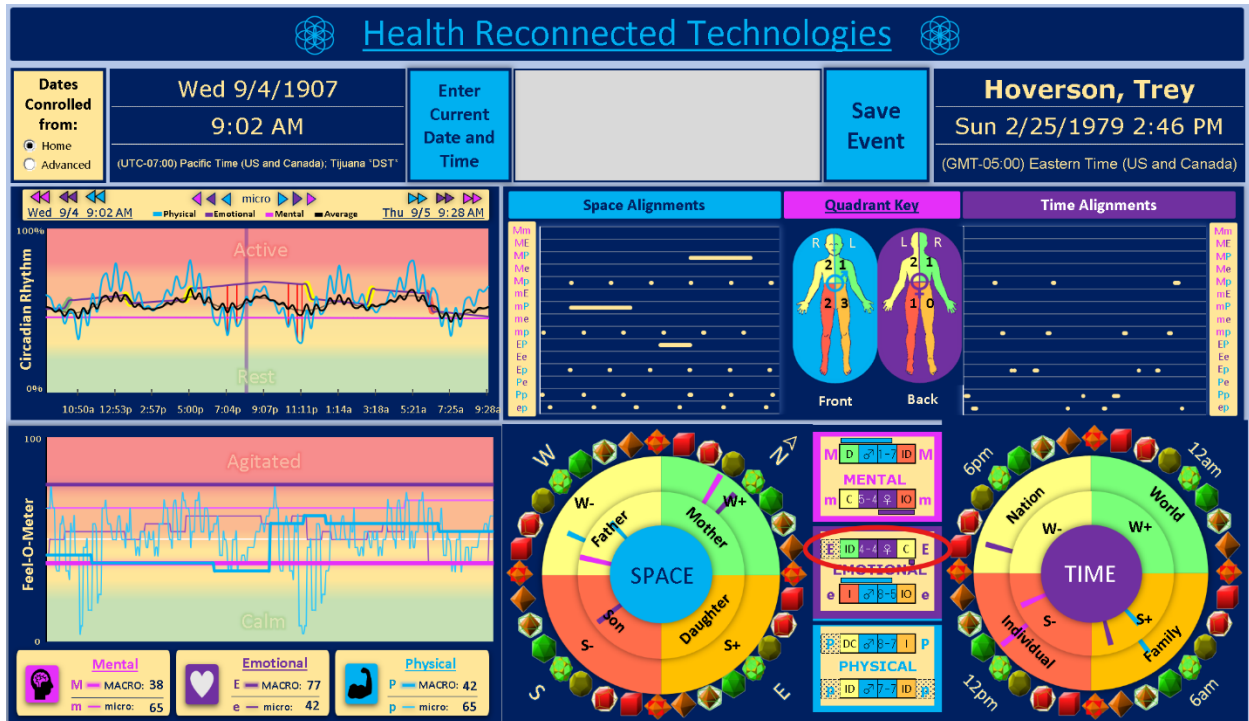

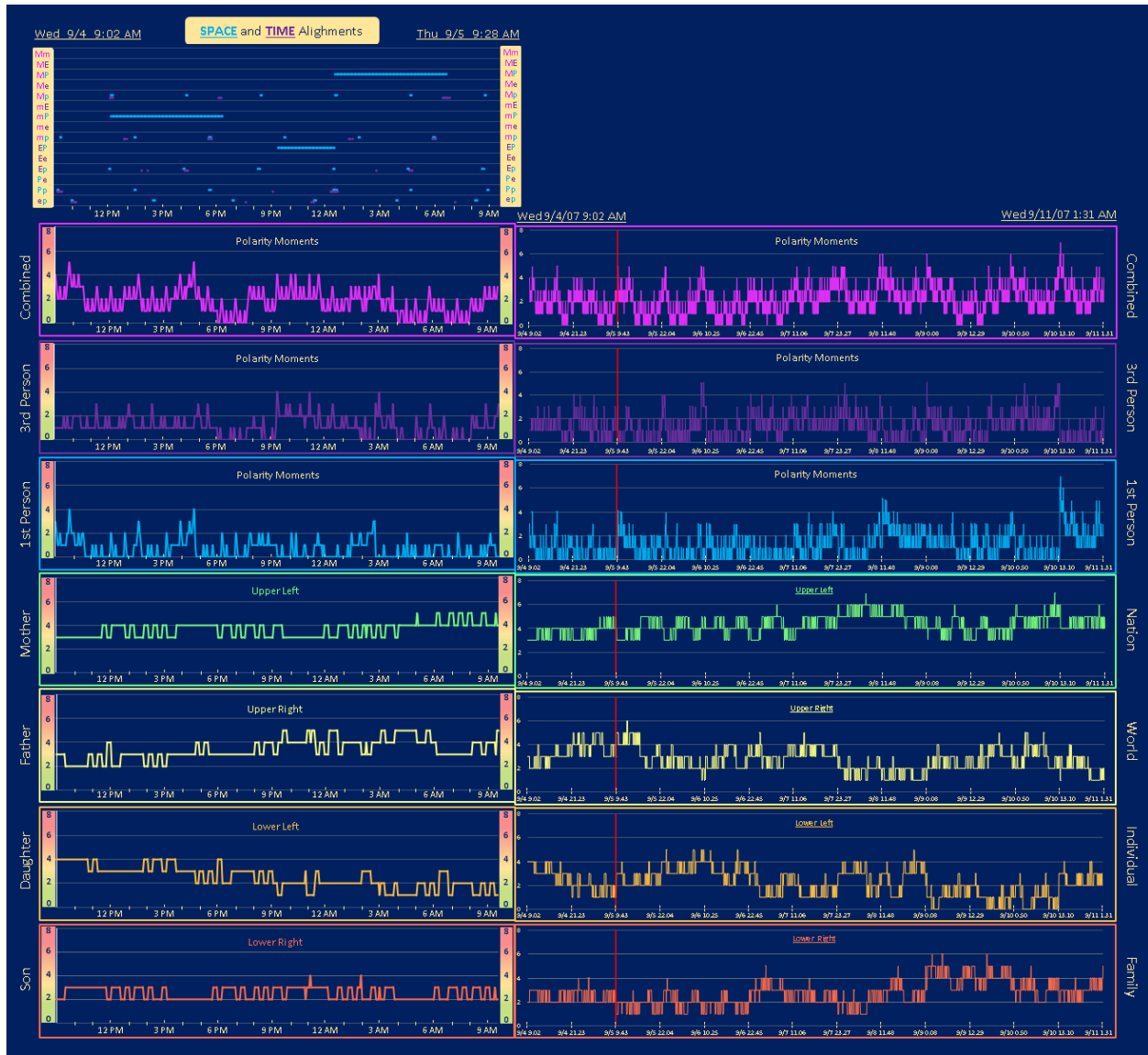


1907 Bellingham Race Riot

The **Bellingham riots** occurred on September 4, 1907, in [Bellingham, Washington](#), United States.^[1] A mob of 400–500 white men, predominantly members of the [Asiatic Exclusion League](#), with intentions to exclude [Indian](#) immigrants from the work force of the local lumber mills, attacked the homes of the South Asian Indians.^[2] The Indians were mostly [Sikhs](#) but were labelled as [Hindus](#) by much of the media of the day.^[3]

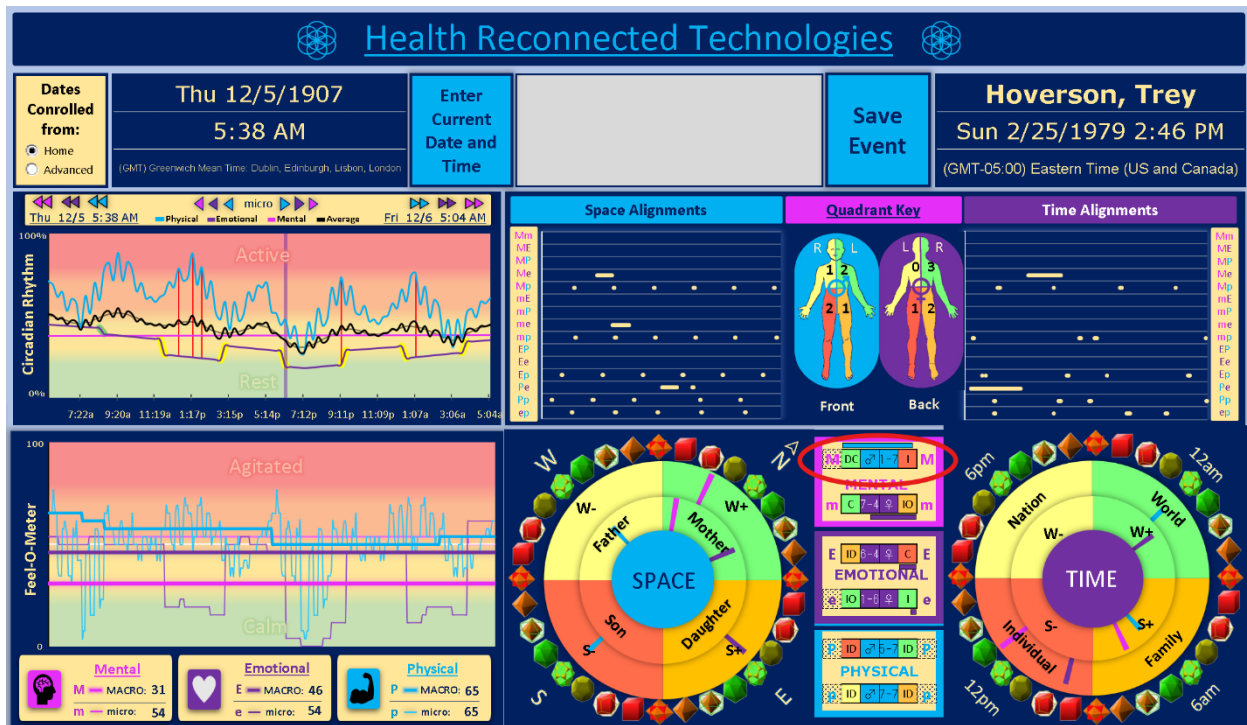


1907 Brown Dog Riots

Medical students at London's teaching hospitals were enraged by the plaque. The first action was on 20 November, when undergraduate William Howard Lister led a group of medical students across the Thames to Battersea to attack the statue with a crowbar and sledgehammer.

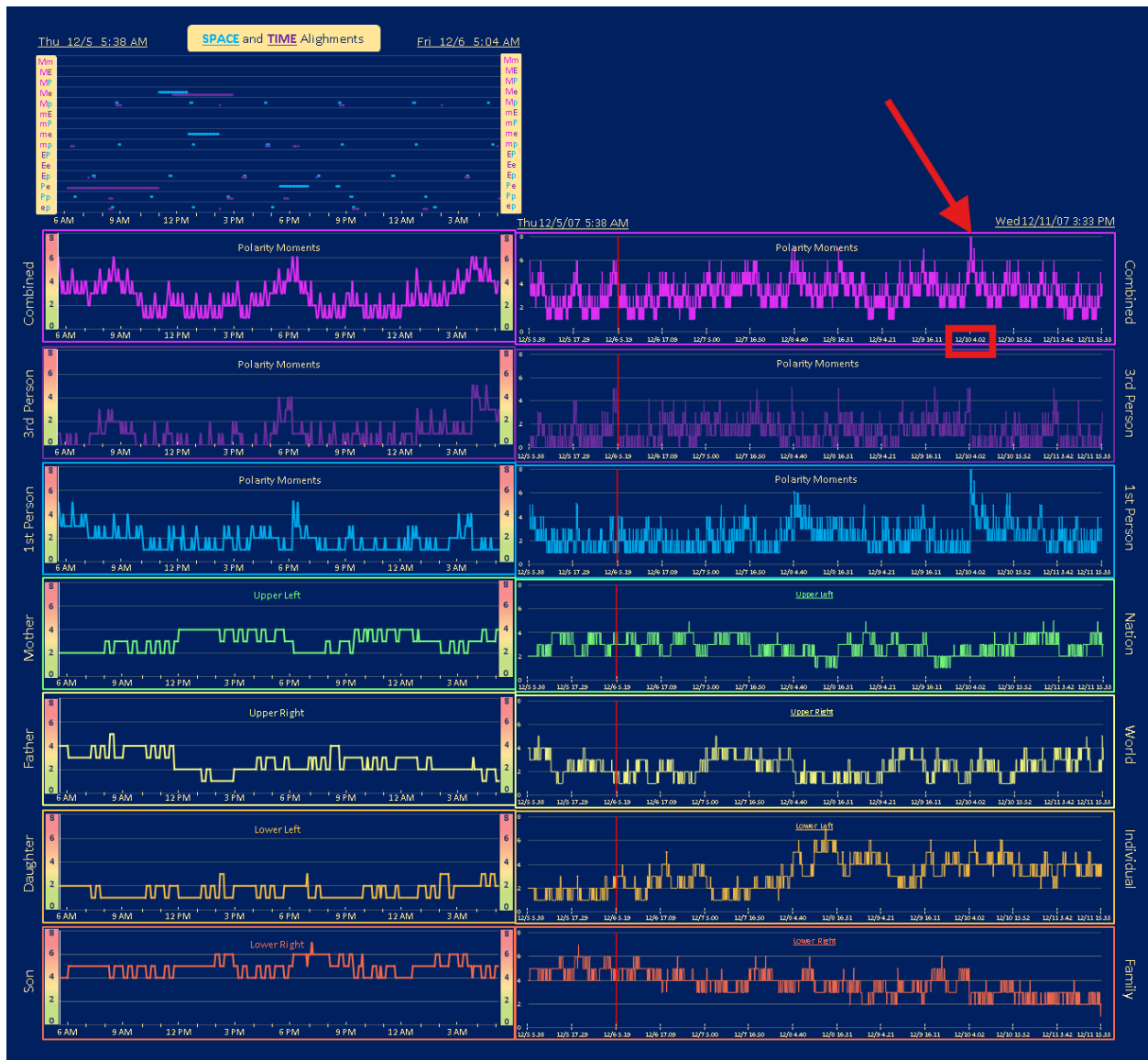
Women's suffrage meetings were invaded, although the students knew that not all suffragettes were anti-vivisectionists. A meeting organized by [Millicent Fawcett](#) on 5 December 1907 at the Paddington Baths Hall in [Bayswater](#) was left with chairs and tables smashed and one steward with a torn ear.

The rioting reached its height five days later, on Tuesday, 10 December, when 100 medical students tried to pull the memorial down.

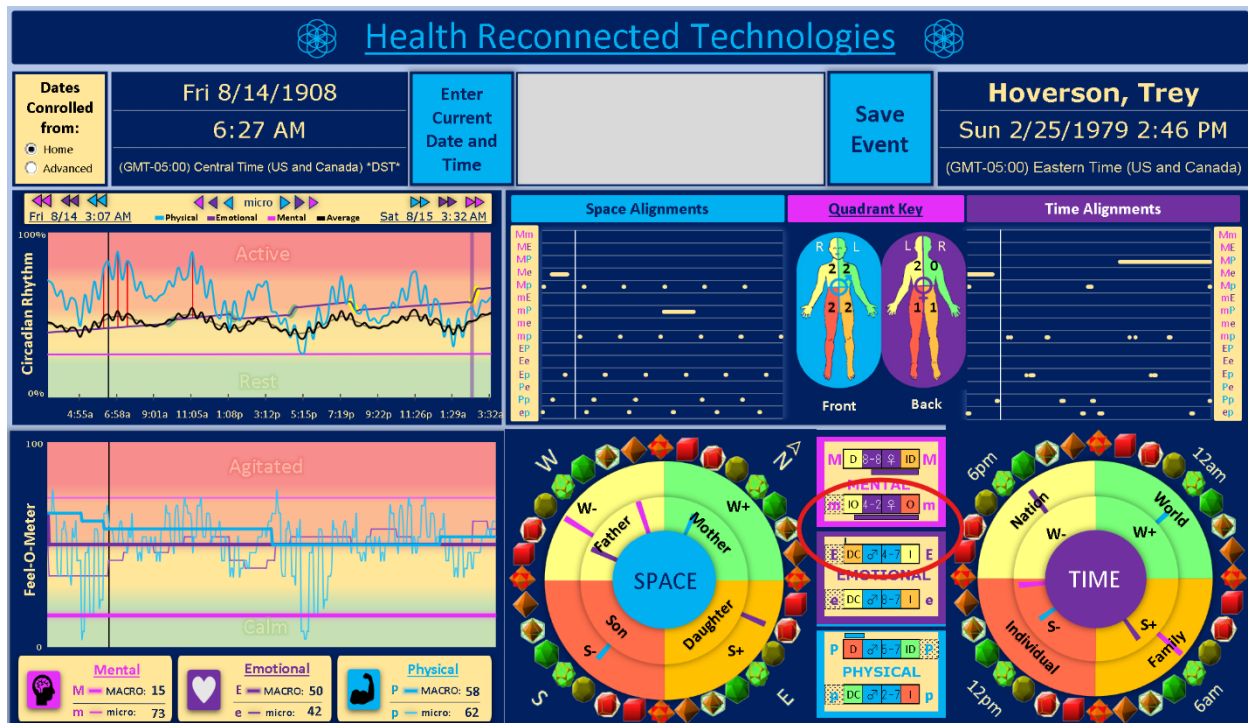
1908 Springfield Race Riot

Date August 14–16, 1908

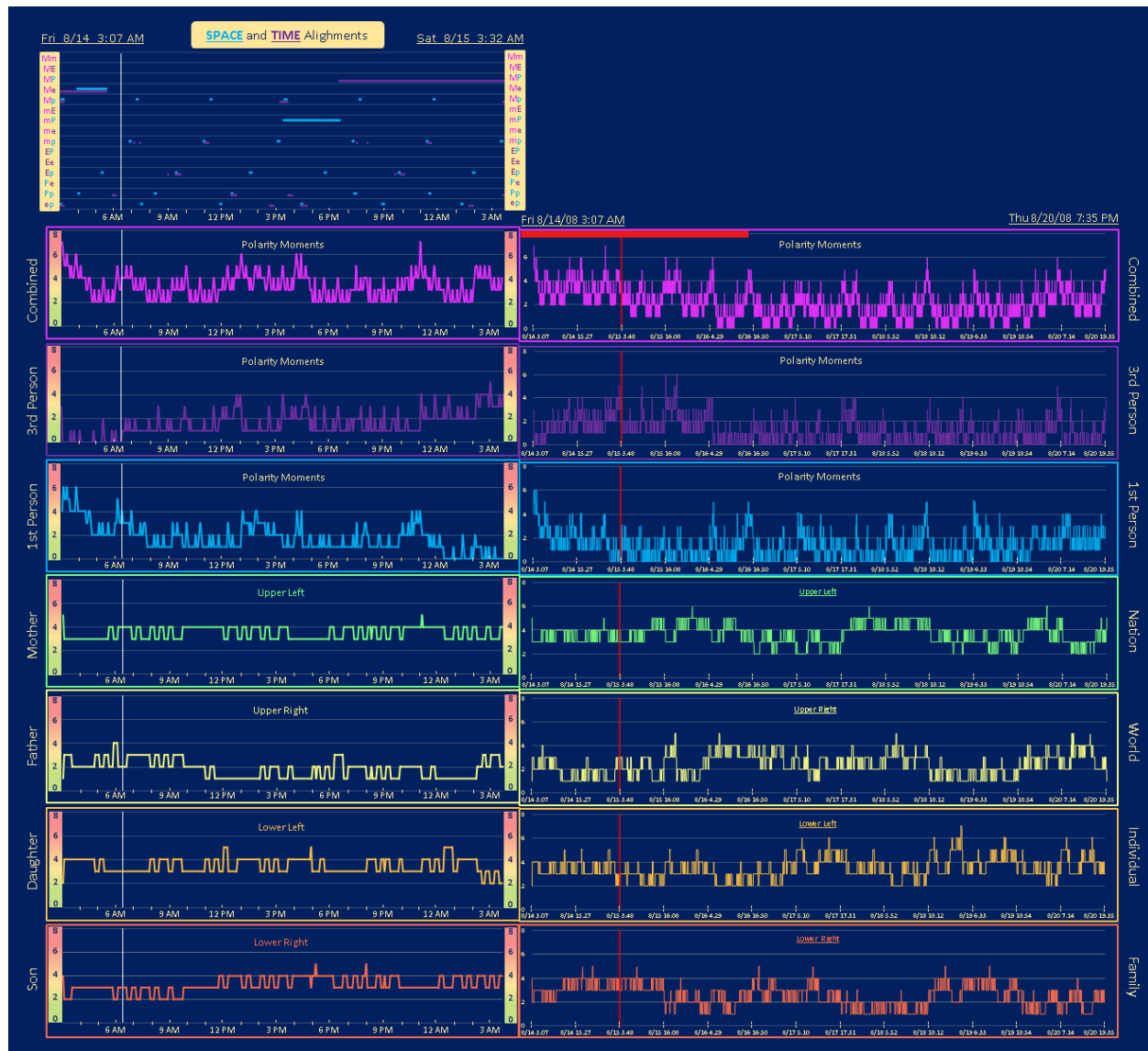
Target [Black residents](#)

The **Springfield race riot of 1908** consisted of events of [mass racial violence](#) committed against [African Americans](#) by a [mob](#) of about 5,000 white Americans and European immigrants in [Springfield, Illinois](#), between August 14 and 16, 1908. Two black men had been arrested as suspects in a rape, and attempted rape and murder.



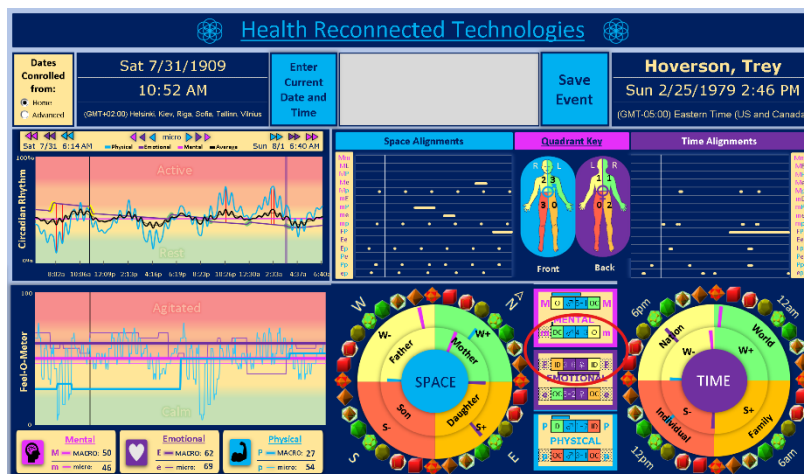
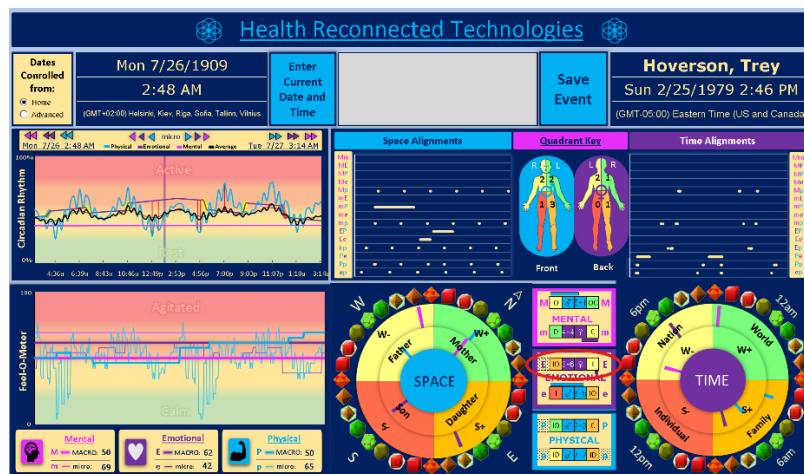
