<u>Governor Dodge State Park NEW Equestrian Campground</u> <u>Shovels in the Ground in 2021</u>

The next phase of the eagerly anticipated new equestrian campground at Governor Dodge State Park could be coming as soon as 2021. Phase I (new entrance road, kiosk, fountain, and vault toilet) was completed in 2019 at a cost of \$80,000. Now, the Friends of Governor Dodge and the DNR have agreed on a Phase II plan to build



the campground road and 10-12 campsites as soon as 2021! Construction of the final 8-10 sites and the second vault toilet will occur as Phase III, with a target construction date of 2022. In the meantime, the Phase II sites will offer a dramatically improved equestrian camping experience that can be enjoyed by hundreds each season while fundraising continues for Phase III.



So what's next? The Friends "re-imagined" fundraiser (generating over \$10,000) and a \$45,000 grant award from the federal Recreational Trails Program means that \$100,000 is needed to reach the \$330,000 Phase II fundraising goal. And now, an AMAZING \$50,000 CHALLENGE GRANT by an anonymous donor puts the project just \$50,000 away from "shovels

in the ground" in 2021! WOW! But to make this dream a reality, the Friends will need the help of horse lovers and park supporters like YOU from all across Wisconsin.




