

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

Something to boast to your grandkids about one day, right?

Is Premier Ford ripe for a ripping this election? Depends who you ask. In Whitby, however, a choice of viable alternatives would have been marvelous. Sadly, all eight have shown their true colours by pretty much ignoring Brooklin. Where the heck is a provincial Libertarian Party when we need you?





Along with every elite male hockey player in Ontario, Jack Van Volsen has long known the importance of his u16 (age 15) season if he had aspirations to play in the Ontario Hockey League (OHL). Valles Fruit Market

When contaminated soil was found on the original property of

Valles Fruit Market, owners Pat, Mario and Joe Misasi were devastated by having to shut it down on Thanksgiving Monday of 1993. Located just south of Brooklin near Lynbrook Park, Valles became the victim of an Ontario government bureaucratic mess that made it impossible for them to continue operations.

From the time the Misasi brothers established Valles Fruit Market in a 5,000 square foot building, they specialized in the sale of fresh fruit and vegetables. The store also

stocked a small deli, dairy and a snack food section. The building included the gas bar they owned,

was run by the Kapushinsky family (see photo). The hard-working brothers developed a loyal group of customers, serving local traffic between Brooklin and Whitby, including tourists and cottagers.

Gas station closed

In 1952, ten years before the Misasi brothers opened the store, a nearby gas station had gone out of business. The province bought 20 feet of highway frontage from the station owner in order to widen highway 12 to four lanes. At the time of the sale, the governcompany was working in the area, they found the tanks still in the ground.

The government was notified, however its work order was again overlooked and nothing was done to have them removed. Four years later, it was discovered that these tanks were leaking onto the brothers' property, the beginning of the end for Valles.

Representatives from the Ministry of the Environment and the Ministry of Highways came calling with who demanded the province take control of the situation.

Major clean-up

After testing the area, it was clear the clean-up was going to take a few months of digging with no guarantee the problem would be fixed. This meant the Valles could be cut off from their customers for a prolonged period. When the brothers asked for compensation for the damage to their business, they were given two choices: either let the government buy them out or close the business tempo-

> rarily without compensation until the clean-up was completed. They had no choice but to accept the buyout offer. The closing left seven full-time staff and six summer students jobless, a big loss to the community.

> After the sale, the Misasi brothers were not allowed to use the Valles trade name for five years. Once the time had passed, Mario reestablished the store at 8880 Baldwin Street, north of Brooklin, where today his family con-

Durham Families Celebrate One year Of Care Closer To Home

Twelve months after opening its doors to its first client, the Durham Region Paediatric Complex Care Program has reached a significant milestone. On May 5, 2022, this multi-disciplinary program will have provided service to more than 40 children and youth with complex medical needs. This means children, youth and their families have received care closer to home in their own community.

The Durham Region Complex Care Program is delivered in partnership among Grandview Kids, The Hospital for Sick Children (SickKids), Complex Care Kids Ontario, Lakeridge Health as the lead of the Ontario Health Team - Durham, and the Central East Home and Community Care Support Services.

Specialized programs

Grandview Kids, founded in 1953, is an independently operated, not-for-profit Children's Treatment Centre in Durham Region. A Centre of Excellence for paediatric assessment, care and rehabilitation, it provides specialized programs, medical services, and outpatient clinical treatment and support to thousands of children and youth with physical, communication and developmental needs, as well as support for parents and caregiv-

ers. Its mission is to help every child and youth live life to their full potential.

The program was designed to provide multi-disciplinary support to children in what is known as a 'multi-team' visit. Clients benefit from consultation and treatment from a Paediatrician, Nurse Practitioner, Social Worker, Dietitian, Occupational Therapist, Physiotherapist, and Recreation Therapist. A unique feature of this clinic is the addition of a Peer Navigator, a parent of a child who also has medical complexities and is a paid employee of Grandview Kids. This Peer Navigator, Fadia Omer,

connects with parents to provide peer-to-peer support before, during and after appointments.

The complexity of medical needs endured by children and youth requires a holistic, team-based approach to on-going care and support.

What do Vegans eat

After a recent two-hour trail run with friends, we stopped at a new bakery/cafe just north of Brooklni. I asked the server if they had anything vegan. No, he replied, but they carried glutenfree products, a response I often get. So, I thought, maybe it's time I explain the difference and share what vegans eat.

Those with celiac disease or gluten intolerances need to avoid gluten, a protein in wheat. And, since gluten comes from wheat, it is vegan. Seitan which is made from gluten is a common plant-based source of protein.

Vegans eat everything except animal products or foods containing animal products, i.e. we exclude meat, fish and other seafood, dairy, eggs and honey. However, we do eat burgers, lasagna, sushi, pasta, pizza, baked goods, pancakes, veggie bowls, sandwiches, burritos, tacos, as well as Indian, Italian, Thai, Chinese and Japanese foods. This list is endless. The only difference is we substitute plant-based ingredients for meat or dairy-based ones.

Healthy and complete?

Is a vegan diet healthy and complete, nutritionally speaking? No plant-based nor, for that matter, meat-based diet is nutritionally healthy and whole by accident; you need to eat healthy either way. Eating meat does not make you healthy, but nor does being vegan. No matter which diet we follow, everyone should pay attention to what goes on our plates.

Hemp seed dressing

- 1/2 cup hulled hemp seeds
- 1/2 cup water
- 2 tablespoons nutritional yeast
- 2 tablespoons fresh lemon juice
 - 1 clove of garlic, peeled
- ¼ teaspoon fine grain sea salt, to taste

Blend until creamy.

Sheree's Hack: Nutritional yeast may be sprinkled on salads and pasta as a cheese replacement.

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

Government incentives can help first-time buyers

If you're planning to buy a home in the foreseeable future, you already know budgeting is the first step to saving for a down payment. But taking advantage of government incentives can help you realize your dream of homeownership sooner and even more help is on the horizon.

We've put together a list of those programs and tax rebates, one or more of which might help boost your savings. Be sure to click on the links for details Home Buyers' Plan (HBP). Through this program, a first-time homebuyer can withdraw up to \$35,000 in a calendar year from their registered retirement savings plans (RRSPs) to buy or build a qualifying home for themselves or for a related person with a disability. You can withdraw funds from more than one RRSP as long as you're the owner of each account. Some RRSPs, such as locked-in or group RRSPs, don't allow these withdrawals. The HBP allows you to pay back the withdrawn funds within a 15-year period.

Home Buyers' Amount. The Home Buyers' Amount offers a \$5,000 nonrefundable income tax credit amount on a qualifying home acquired during the year For an eligible individual, the credit will provide up to \$750 in federal tax relief. Singlefamily houses, semi-detached houses, townhouses and condominium units are all considered qualifying homes

First-Time Home Buyer Incentive. Eligible first-time homebuyers who have the minimum down payment for an insured mortgage can apply to finance a portion of their home purchase through a shared equity mortgage with the federal government. The program offers five or 10 per cent of the home's purchase price to put toward a down payment, which lowers your mortgage carrying costs. In lieu of interest, you pay the government back the same percentage of your home when you sell or after

GŚT/HST New Housing Rebate. You may qualify for a rebate of part of the GST or HST that you paid on the purchase price or cost of building your new house, on the cost of substantially renovating or building a major addition onto your existing house, or on converting a non-residential property into a house. Ontario Land Transfer Tax Refund (www.ontario.ca/document/land-transfer-

tax/landtransfer-tax-refunds-first-timehomebuyers). If you're a first-time buyer, you may be eligible for a refund of the provincial land transfer tax, which is one of the closing costs that must be paid when buying property. The refund maxes out at \$4,000 for homes with a value higher than \$368,000. No land transfer tax is charged on homes

worth less than that. Home Buyers' Tax Credit. This tax credit is available to Canadians who've purchased a home after not owning one for four years or longer. Eligible buyers can claim up to \$5,000 on their taxes for a rebate of \$750. People who bought their home after January 1, 2022 will be able to claim twice that amount - up to \$10,000 for a rebate of up to \$1,500 - according to the federal government's 2022 budget.
