Finding God

I meet the most interesting people while walking my dog.

The other day as I walked Addie past the old junior high school, we met a man who asked if he could pet her. Certainly, I said, and as he bent down to pet Addie, he asked about the upcoming renovation of the old school. And as we talked, I told him I was the pastor of the church across the street. I said we were sad to lose some of our parking, but excited to have new neighbors. Then I invited him to worship with us. That's when he said he wasn't from Aledo. Besides, he said he hadn't found God yet.

That was an intriguing confession, and as we parted ways, I continued to dwell on our conversation, and I wondered, *Where might a person find God?*

Ideally, a person would find God at church. But quite honestly, that doesn't always happen. For one thing, churches are generally thought of as buildings. Jesus commands us to "love one another," adding, "By this everyone will know that you are my disciples, if you love one another" (John13:34-35).

That's easily said, but not so easily done. It seems to me that the way in which we love one another is found in Matthew 25:31-40 by feeding the hungry, quenching the thirsty, welcoming the stranger, clothing the needy, tending to the sick, and visiting those who are in bondage. Jesus went on to say that when we do such things, we have actually done it for Jesus. "Truly I tell you," Jesus says, "whatever you did for one of the least of these brothers and sisters of mine, you did for me."

However, if we read the story "backwards," the reverse is also true. If Jesus is in the recipient, then Jesus must also be in the provider. In other words, when we become bearers of God's love in those practical ways, we have effectively become Jesus to the hungry, the thirsty, the stranger, the needy, the sick, and the imprisoned.

And that brings us back to the question, *Where might a person find God?* The answer should be in you and in me. We may be the only Jesus some people will ever meet. So, can your neighbors find Jesus in you? And how is Jesus loving others through you?

Share the Harvest

If you follow the "Vital Statistics" box on the back of our weekly bulletin, you know that we need \$6,310 every week to meet our budget. Thankfully, we do not spend everything that is budgeted every week. Nonetheless, the reality is that our average weekly giving to the general fund is closer to \$4,798, creating a significant shortfall for us again this year.

That's where Share the Harvest comes in. This year, our finance committee has set a Bronze Goal of \$10,000; a Silver Goal of \$25,000; and a Gold Goal of \$40,000.

Please participate in Share the Harvest by giving above and beyond your regular giving, whether that's an extra dollar or an extra \$100. It all adds up, and it all helps us close the gap in our giving. Please mark your extra giving for "Share the Harvest" or simply, "Harvest." If you haven't given at all this year, or if you've given sporadically, anything you give may be marked for Share the Harvest.

This year, Share the Harvest will begin on November 2 and will continue through the end of the year, if necessary.

We'll also be engaging in another spiritual practice in November by making our annual pledges to the church. When we prayerfully make our pledges to the church, we do so by faith, trusting that God will provide us with the means for us to take care of our homes, our families, and our church. Pledge cards have been sent out with our quarterly statements.

We hope to increase our pledged giving by \$10,000. That sounds like a lot, but 100 individuals or families give an extra \$100 this year—just \$2 per week—we will meet that goal.

Another option is to increase your giving by 5 percent. If you give \$100 per week, consider increasing it by 5 percent to \$105. I've already decided to increase my giving by \$10 per month. It's not much, but if we all work together, we will meet our budget.

Looking ahead, our finance team has worked hard at holding the line on expenses. Our 2025 Charge Conference approved a 2026 budget that is \$8,732 *lower* than our 2025 budget. They were able to do that even though we are anticipating paying \$6,600 *more* for insurance in 2026 than we are paying in 2025. We are also anticipating paying \$3,000 more for electric power in 2026. Those are our two largest line-item increases.

The good news is that we are a generous congregation. On October 19, Brooke Watson visited us and we gave \$500 to Cunningham Home with little if any advance notice that there would be a special offering. I know we can meet our budget again this year.

Thank you in advance for your prayerful consideration of how you might participate in our end-of-year "Share the Harvest" campaign and how you might support our church next year through our pledge drive.




