Gypsum and Amethyst

Gypsum is a mineral used to make Plaster of Paris which is used to set broken bones.

Amethyst is a purple quartz. It often forms in a cool shape clusters of crystals. Found in North America.

Sand Roses

Sand Roses are also known as Desert Roses. The rose crystal tends to occur when the crystals form in arid sandy conditions. Most range from pea sized to four inches in diameter. Rose Rocks are found in Tunizia, Saudi Arabia, Australia and the U.S. A lot of rose was formed over 250 million years. The Rose Rock was selected as the official rock of Oklahoma in 1968. I like this rock because of its weird shape and it's natural color. The end.

Desert Rose

Desert Rose is the name given to rosette formations of the minerals gypsum and barite with sand inclusions. Gypsum is a soft sulfate mineral composed of calcium sulfate dehydrate. It is used to make sheetrock. It is formed by wind and pressure and heat. The desert rose is found in arid sandy conditions. They are mostly from the Sahara Middle East Region, Southwest USA and Mexico. It is also the Oklahoma State Rock. Now you know about my mineral.

Quartz and Muscovite

Quartz is very common. It has a hardness of 7 on Mohs hardness scale. It has hexagonal crystals (6 sides). It is found in most types of rocks. It is the most abundant mineral on earth. It is used in glass, sandpaper, and electronics.

Muscovite is in the mica group. It has a hardness of 2 ½. It is soft but harder than a fingernail. It is flaky. It is used in paint, plastic, makeup, and rubber.

ROCK SAW SAFETY by Max Hatfield

Some of us do not have new rock saws with factory safety instructions.
Listed below some basic safety concerns.

Electric cord and plug in good shape	Blades cutting RPM matches material
Machine is properly grounded.	Blade RPM matches type of blade
Proper switch to turn saw on and off	Correct power feed rate
Provide good lighting	Do not open saw when running
Wear eye protection	Blade stops before opening lid
Provide a well-ventilated cutting area	Clean cutting oil and saw when needed
Wear rubber gloves	Rock is tight in the vice
Train new operators to use properly	DO NOT BREATH OIL VAPORS (ventilation)
Arbor bearings in good shape	Do not leave saw during the cut
Arbor & blade parallel with vice travel	Auto shut-off for power feed is working
Blade is not bent or damaged	Unplug saw when not in use. (protect children)

Slab Saw Cutting Oils

There has been a lot of talk lately about what oil to use in slab saws and trim saws. The list below will help with the knowledge of all known PROPPER rock cutting oil, but I bet there may be more. The Geode mentioned that Superla white Number 7 be used. As far as I know the correct Chevron food grade rock oil for rock cutting is Superla White # 5. I got this information from John Richardson many years ago.

Pat and I purchased from Richardson's and used this oil in her small 12" Lortone slab saw. The only disadvantage to this oil may be the fact that it holds the cutting sediments in suspension for a couple of days before it all settles out. What does this mean? It means that the oil containing small rock particles will be carried back to the blade when cutting instead of settling to the bottom of the saw right away. Does this mean a lesser quality cut or that it does not lubricate as well. You decide.
